REGISTRATION PROCEDURES There are four ways to register:

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Mail-in Registration 👻

Mail-in registration begins April 5, 2010 and ends May 22, 2010. The completed registration form must be accompanied by complete fee payment –check, money order or Mastercard,Visa or Discover account number and expiration date. No cash, please.

Telephone Registration 👻

Telephone registration is available April 5 - May 22, 2010 only with Mastercard, Visa or Discover from 8am-8pm Monday-Thursday, 8am-5pm Friday and from 8am-1:30pm on Saturday. Call (310) 243-3741.

Walk-in Registration 👻

Walk-in registration in EE 1100 begins April 5, 2010 and ends May 22, 2010. You may walk in for late registration May 24-28, 2010. Fees must be paid at the time of registration.

The date of withdrawal is the date the forms are received by the College of Extended & International Education. Nonattendance in a class, notifying the instructor or stopping payment on a check does not officially constitute withdrawal from a course.

Adding Classes -

Classes may be added on May 24-28. You must obtain the signature of your instructor on an add/drop form.

Dropping Classes -

Three Week Courses During the first week, a student may, withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on students transcript. Prior to the last two days of the session, a student may withdraw with a "W" for any reason. Signatures of the instructor and school dean are required. During the last two days of the course, a student may withdraw with a "W" for serious and compelling reasons only and signatures of the instructor and school dean are required.

Four And Five Week Courses During the first week, a student may, withdraw and no grade is assigned. No signatures are required if a four or five week course is dropped during the first week. Prior to the last four days of the course, a student may withdraw with a "W" with the signatures of the instructor and school dean. During the last four days of the course, a student may withdraw with a "W" grade for serious and compelling reasons, only with the signatures of the instructor and school dean.

Six, Seven, and Eight Week Courses During the first two weeks a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. Prior to the last week of the session a student may withdraw with a "W". During the last week of the session a student may withdraw with a

Refunds -

Refunds are granted in accordance with the State refund schedule. If a course is cancelled, the entire course fee will be returned. If you withdraw 24 hours prior to the first class meeting, 100 percent of the course fee will be refunded (less a \$10 processing fee). If you withdraw after the first class and before 25 percent of the course has elapsed, 65 percent of the total fee will be refunded. After 25 percent of the course time has elapsed, no refund will be made; however, a drop form must still be filed. A stop payment on a check is NOT an acceptable withdrawal from the course() and will result in financial penalty.

Grades -

Please check my.csudh.edu for your grades beginning 72 hours after the course end date.

Cancelled Courses -

Courses may be cancelled if there are not enough students enrolled. If a course is cancelled, a full refund will be automatically processed. Please allow six to eight weeks for processing.

Parking -

\$4.00 daily fee is required during the months of May & June.

PRIVACY INFORMATION -

The University complies with Federal and State laws concerning privacy rights of students. These rights are summarized in the University Catalog. Questions about privacy rights may be directed to the Dean of Extended Education at (310) 243-3737 or the Vice President for Student Affairs at (310) 243-3784.

Use of Social Security Number

Students are required to provide the University with their correct social security numbers (individual taxpayer identification numbers) pursuant to the authority contained in Section 41201, Title 5, California Code of Regulations, and Section 6109 of the Internal Revenue Code. The University uses the social security number to identify records pertaining to the student and, if needed, to collect debts owed the University. Also, the Internal Revenue Service requires the University to file information returns that include the student's social security number and other information such as the amount paid for qualified tuition, related expenses, and interest on educational loans. That information is used to help determine whether a student, or a person claiming a student as a dependent, may take a credit or deduction to reduce federal income taxes. Students who do not have a social security number and submit it to the University within sixty days. Failure to furnish a correct social security number may result in the imposition of a penalty by the Internal Revenue Service.

Important Tax Credit Information

If you are enrolled in an eligible degree or certificate program or are taking courses to acquire or improve job skills, you may qualify for a Hope Scholarship or Lifetime Learning Tax Credit.

The Hope Scholarship tax credit is available only to students in their first two years of postsecondary education who are enrolled at least half-time in an eligible program. The tax credits are based on the amount of qualified tuition and fees, less grants and other tax-free educational assistance and the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income. Hope credits apply to fees paid after December 31, 1997.

The Lifetime Learning Tax Credit is available to students at all educational and enrollment levels who are enrolled at an eligible educational institution. As with the Hope Scholarship tax credit, this opportunity is based on the amount of qualified tuition and fees, less grants and other tax-free educational assistance and the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income. The Lifetime Learning credit applies to fees paid after June 30, 1998. Consult IRS Publication 970 or your tax preparer for additional information on both programs.

Disabled Student Services

Students with verified disabilities, which are permanent or temporary (e.g., broken bones, strained back, other sprains, etc.) are eligible for a variety of support services from the Disabled Student Services Office. Information regarding special facilities and services available to students with a disability may be obtained from the Director of Disabled student Services Office, located in the Student Health Center, Room A-106, (310) 243-3660 (voice) or 243-2028 (TDD).



SPRING INTERSESSION 2010 FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is Spring Intersession?

Spring Intersession is defined as special session that begins after spring commencement, but prior to the end of the official academic calendar. In 2010, courses will begin on May 24. Courses must end no later than June 30. Courses are accelerated and may vary in length from three to six weeks.

Who can attend Spring Intersession?

Spring Intersession is open to all CSUDH students, prospective students, students from other colleges and universities, and interested individuals from the community. There is no separate application or admission process required. Please note that if you are not already a CSUDH student, registration in a Spring Intersession course does not constitute admission to the University.

Can I attend Spring Intersession if I am a high school student?

High school students are welcome to attend as long as an official Letter of Recommendation from the high school principal or counselor accompanies the registration.

Will Spring Intersession courses count toward my degree?

Spring Intersession courses are regular University courses and carry residence credit; i.e, Spring Intersession courses may be used for your degree.

How many courses may I take in the Spring Intersession?

We recommend that students take no more than the equivalent of one unit per week with a maximum of six units for the entire Spring Intersession.

How do I register for the Spring Intersession?

All registration options are available for CSUDH students: my.csudh.edu, mail, telephone, and in person. If you have never attended CSUDH before, you may register by mail, telephone, or in person.

How much does Spring Intersession cost?

The Spring Intersession is separate from the regular Spring semester and /or Summer terms and students must pay additional fees. Spring Intersession fees are \$199 per unit unless otherwise indicated.

Is Financial Aid available?

Financial aid may be available for students depending upon their remaining eligibility. Students should contact the Financial Aid Office: WH B260, ext 3691.

Can I drop my classes and receive a refund?

Prior to the first day of the Spring Intersession students may drop a course with a 100% refund less \$10 processing fee. Please refer to the approved College refund policy for information concerning drops which occur after classes have started.

May I count Spring Intersession courses toward spring graduation?

No, units earned in the Spring Intersession may not be used toward the spring graduation date.
