# **COURSE OFFERINGS**

The following courses may be taken for academic progress toward a degree, for professional development, for personal growth — or for any combination of reasons.

#### CREDIT/NON-CREDIT

The credit courses offer transferable degree-applicable, elective credit. They are either regular on-campus catalogue courses or new courses which have been reviewed by the appropriate academic departments. They are deisgnated in units of credit based on the academic quarter system.

The non-credit courses are designed to respond to the variety of interests of those living and working the University's service area.

Some courses may be taken for either credit or non-credit.

#### CREDIT/NOT-CREDIT REQUIREMENTS

For courses that are available as either credit or non-credit, all students attend the same class meetings. However, those taking it for credit will pay a slightly higher fee and will be required to complete a project outside the classroom.

#### **CONTINUING EDUCATION UNITS**

Some of our courses offer C.E.U.s. The Continuing Education Unit is a nationally recognized unit of measurement for a variety of non-credit programs applying towards licensure, promotional, or career advancement. A cumulative permanent transcript of all CEU study undertaken is provided to extension students and is available from the Office of Admissions and Records.

### ASSERTIVE MANAGEMENT SKILLS

(BRN)

Assertive behavior is being able to express thoughts, feelings and beliefs in open, honest, direct and appropriate ways which do not violate another person's rights. Assertiveness training has been quite popular in a variety of settings for the past several years.

This workshop has been designed for people who are concerned with being assertive in the work situation. The major focus will be on the utilization of assertiveness as a management skill. Assertiveness training procedures can be used to help create a positive atmosphere and to help colleagues function more effectively with each other.

# Counseling the Alcoholic

#### Treatment of Alcoholism

Alcoholism is of increasing concern to individuals and organizations nationally. Also it is an increasing problem among the young. The university is offering programs and opportunities to develop persons qualified in early detection and treatment of alcoholism both in professional and home situations.

#### WHAT THE PROGRAM IS ABOUT

The Certificate Program in Counseling the Alcoholic consists of six courses which have been designed to give an essential education to the prospective alcoholism counselor. Each course will present principles and techniques as they relate to the disease of alcoholism. Experienced professionals will present the students with the physiological and psychological bases of alcoholism; alcoholic counseling techniques and supervised field experiences. Each 4-unit course will meet once each week for 10 weeks and will include lectures, discussions and case studies.

#### WHO SHOULD ATTEND

The Certificate Program in Counseling the Alcholoic is designed to help those people who are in the helping professions to become more aware of the unique features of the alcoholic and alcoholism counseling. Additionally, individuals who aspire to any of the helping professions will find this program to be worthwhile in preparing them for their broader responsibilities.



#### WHAT THE PROGRAM IS ABOUT



#### WHO SHOULD ATTEND




#### THE CERTIFICATE

# Spanish Language Media Journalism & Communications

#### WHAT THE PROGRAM IS ABOUT

A special program of studies has been designed to meet the requirements of Hispanic Americans and others seeking professional employment in the Spanish language print and electronic media. This program is co-sponsored by Escuela Hispano Americana De Periodismo and California State University Dominguez Hills.

This program has been carefully tailored to help meet the rapidly increasing need for trained media professionals to staff the nation's growing number of Spanish language newspapers, magazines, advertising and public relation agencies.

The goals of this program are as follows:

1. To prepare students of Latin-American origin to work in the Spanish language, for Spanish language print, Spanish language electronic media and in the growing Spanish language field.

2. To assist the students in improving their abilities to understand spoken and written English and to function as working journalists in a primarily English-speaking society.

To better enhance the employment possibilities of California State University Dominguez Hills students through the granting of this certificate.

#### **ENTRY REQUIREMENTS**

Entry requirements will conform to the regular enrollment policies of the California State University and Colleges Continuing Education programs. These consist of:

(1) Any interested high school graduate, college student and individuals 21 years of age or over.

(2) Students applying for admission to this extension program will need to successfully complete a brief written and verbal Spanish language examination.

#### THE CERTIFICATE

Students successfully completing the Journalism and Communications for the Spanish Language Media will receive a University certificate validating the student's academic performance. The University believes this will greatly enhance the student's employability. A need for such skills is growing rapidly in the area. No other institution of higher education now awards such a certificate.

#### COST

The fees are \$28 per unit or \$112 for each 4-unit course, plus any charges for textbooks and related materials. These fees are subject to any changes mandated by the California State University and Colleges System. Financial aid is available.



# Spanish for Public Service

#### WHAT THE PROGRAM IS ABOUT

"Hablo espanol" now means profit to businesses; quality performance to educators, counselors and service employees; and improved medical response to hospital personnel. The Spanish for Public Service Certificate, a one-year program, provides participants with basic Spanish-speaking competency for present and potential employees. Writing and reading skills are developed to meet functional needs of the particular occupation. A significant additional goal is to increase participants' understanding of the Latino community, thus encouraging an improved relationship between the employee and the public.

#### WHO SHOULD ATTEND

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The program is designed to meet the needs of employees who must "meet and deal" with Spanish-speaking persons. Enrollees use their new skills in work settings almost immediately. Students' use of Spanish on the job is monitored and corrected. Experiential learning reinforces the language skills throughout the program. "Learning by doing" makes this a practical effort to meet everyday needs. Courses are offered on Saturday mornings to accommodate work schedules.

#### **ENTRY REQUIREMENTS**

Total unit commitment of a student entering the program is 22 units. Students should enter the program with little or no Spanish skills. The Experiential Education 212 course requires 4 hours or more per week of active work involvement with Spanish-speaking persons. Students may utilize their own employment as internship for the certificate program if it fulfills the requirements of the program. Students not presently working in positions interfacing with Spanish-speaking clientele will be placed in volunteer bilingual positions.

#### THE CERTIFICATE

Graduates of the SPSC Program will be among the first in California to receive a certificate stating the holder is employable for the purpose of communicating with Spanish-speaking persons in a public service occupation. The need for such skills is growing rapidly in the area. You will have an additional skill that will greatly increase your employability. Employers will be able to serve a greater clientele more efficiently.



SUMMER SESSIONS

Following the close of the spring quarter, the Division of Extended Education conducts a multi-session summer program. A comprehensive schedule of classes from the regular University catalog is offered, as well as special courses designed for presentation during the Summer Sessions only. Classes are offered both days and evenings as well as condensed into shorter, more intensive time frames such as one or two weeks. Students may complete their degree requirements during the summer and graduate at the end of the Summer Sessions.

Students registering are not required to file an Application for Admission or transcripts. However, they must be high school graduates and are expected to have satisfied prerequisites for the courses in which they enroll. Admission to the Summer Sessions does not constitute admission to a regular quarter.

A variety of Travel Study programs will be offered again this summer, by which students may earn academic credit through non-traditional studies.

Extended Education at CSUDH is the continuing education service through which the resources of the University are extended to members of the community, the surrounding Los Angeles Basin, and beyond.

# MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY EXTERNAL DEGREE

GRADUATE

Master of Science in Medical Technology

The Master of Science in Medical Technology is an external degree program open only to licensed California Clinical Laboratory Technologists and/or registered Medical Technologists. The goal of the Program is to meet professional development needs of medical technologists. Through a series of core courses required of all students, the curriculum emphasizes administrative skills, clinical and technical expertise and educational instructional techniques in medical technology. Option courses provide concentration reinforcement in a particular area of interest.

The Program is designed to be completed in a minimum of 6 quarters ( $1\frac{1}{2}$  years) at site-locations convenient to major interest groups.

In addition to the Core Courses required of all students, one of the following options must be selected:

- A. Clinical Laboratory Management
- B. Clinical Sciences
- C. Immunohematology and Blood Transfusion
- D. Clinical Laboratory Practice
- E. Education

Note: Graduates of the program who have completed this option with appropriate elective course work are eligible for the Community College Instructor Credential in Health and Physical Care Services and Related Technologies.

# HUMANITIES EXTERNAL DEGREES

#### UNDERGRADUATE AND GRADUATE

Since their beginning in Fall 1974, the Humanities External Degree Programs have provided students a quality education at either the baccalaureate or master's level using non-traditional teaching techniques. Because the programs receive no state funding, they must charge students \$40 per unit in order to cover instructional and administrative expenses. The fees are the same for residents of California or for students who live elsewhere.

The curricula of both programs have sufficient structure and direction to insure a basic understanding of the Humanities and to give students a range of possibilities for the direction of their studies in order to encourage intellectual freedom and the creative searching spirit. Five humanistic disciplines are involved in the curricula: art, history, literature, music, and philosophy. Students may choose a course of study that has an interdisciplinary focus or one that specializes in a single discipline with work in related disciplines.

The emphasis in both the bachelor's and master's programs is on self-study, off-campus, teacher-guided learning, carried out according to non-traditional processes. Students can progress through either program without ever stepping foot on the CSUDH campus, for neither program has regular classroom instruction. Instead, the programs utilize a variety of non-traditional teaching strategies, including complete course guides for every student, guided instruction via telephone and correspondence by mail, continued supervision by regular full-time CSUDH faculty, monthly newsletters, handbooks containing general information about the programs and suggestions for improving writing skills, lectures on audio cassette tapes, and occasional television program materials.

#### Portal Program in Administration

In the world of business today there exist many persons who have only a few years of college and no bachelor's degree. These people have succeeded on their own merits but may have found their further progress impeded by lack of college degrees.

The Portal Program in Administration provides a means for these persons to obtain entry into a professional degree program which will enable them to seek future advancement.

The Portal Program in Administration leads to certification of successful completion of a sequence of coursework which is preparatory to the Master of Business Administration, California State University Dominguez Hills, or the External Master of Science in Administration. Upon receipt of this certification and completion of the Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT) with an appropriate score (MBA only), the student will be admitted to the MBA or MSA program.

#### **GRADUATE**

#### Master of Business in Administration

The Division of Extended Education anticipates a new cycle of the External MBA to begin in the near future. # FINDING YOUR WAY TO CSUDH

FROM PALMDALE/LANCASTER - 14 SOUTH - Follow Highway 14 to Golden State Freeway (5) South toward Los Angeles. From 5 South, take the Harbor Freeway (11) South toward San Pedro, then exit on the 190th Street off-ramp. Turn left (East) on 190th Street. Follow 190th Street about 2 miles to the Campus (190th Street changes into Victoria Street). The campus entrance is a right turn at the first signal past Avalon Boulevard.

FROM SAN BERNARDINO - 10 WEST - Follow the San Bernardino Freeway (10) West to the San Gabriel Freeway (605) South, take the Artesia Freeway (91) West toward Redondo Beach, then exit on Avalon Blvd. Turn left (South) on to Avalon Blvd. and then left (East) onto Victoria Street. The campus entrance is a right turn at traffic signal on Victoria Street.

FROM LOS ANGELES CIVIC CENTER - 11 SOUTH - Follow the Harbor Freeway (11) to the 190th Street off-ramp. Turn left (East) on 190th Street. This will become Victoria Street. The campus is located approximately 2 miles from the freeway off-ramp on (190th) Victoria Street. The campus entrance is a right turn at the first traffic signal past Avalon Blvd.

FROM SAN FERNANDO VALLEY - 405 SOUTH or 101 EAST - Follow the San Diego Freeway (405) South toward Long Beach. Exit on the Vermont Avenue off-ramp. Turn left (East) at the end of the off-ramp onto 190th Street. Follow 190th Street (East) for approximately 2 miles to the campus (190th Street becomes Victoria Street). The campus entrance is a right turn at the first traffic signal past Avalon Blvd.

FROM SANTA MONICA - 10 EAST - Follow the Santa Monica Freeway (10) East to the San Diego Freeway (405) South toward Long Beach. Exit at the Vermont Avenue off-ramp. Turn left at the end of the off-ramp onto 190th Street. Follow 190th Street East, which becomes Victoria Street East for about 2 miles to the campus. The campus entrance is a right turn at the first traffic signal past Avalon Blvd.

FROM ANAHEIM - 5 NORTH - Follow the Santa Ana Freeway (5) North to the Artesia Freeway (91) West toward Redondo Beach. Exit at Avalon Blvd. Turn left (South) onto Avalon Blvd. Turn left (East) onto Victoria Street. The campus entrance is a right turn at the next traffic signal.


**FROM SAN DIEGO - 405 NORTH -** Follow the San Diego Freeway (405) North toward Los Angeles to the Avalon Blvd. (North) off-ramp. Take Avalon Blvd. north (right) to Victoria Street. Turn right (East) onto Victoria Street. The entrance to the campus is a right turn at the next signal.

FROM SANTA BARBARA - 101 SOUTH - Follow the Ventura Freeway (101) South toward Los Angeles to the San Diego Freeway (405) South toward Long Beach. Take the Vermont Avenue off-ramp and turn left (East). You will be on 190th Street. Follow 190th Street East (this becomes Victoria Street) for about 2 miles. The entrance to the campus is a right turn at the first traffic signal past Avalon Blvd.

FROM BAKERSFIELD - 99 SOUTH - Follow Interstate 99 South to the Golden State Freeway (5) South toward Los Angeles. Take the San Diego Freeway (405) South toward Los Angeles/Long Beach. Exit at the Vermont off-ramp. Turn left (East) at the end of the off-ramp. You will be on 190th Street, follow 190th Street for about 2 miles (this will become Victoria Street). The entrance to the campus is a right turn at the first traffic signal past Avalon Blvd.

#### PARKING ON CAMPUS

Parking on campus is free for visitors but a permit is required which can be obtained from the Kiosk.

# **GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### **ELIGIBILITY:**

Any interested high school graduate, college student and individual 21 years of age or over, may enroll for Extension Study. Formal admission to the university is not required. However, registration for courses may be limited to those who have completed certain prerequisites, or who can demonstrate to the instructor's satisfaction equivalent preparation for upper division work.

#### STANDARDS:

Work in credit courses in extension adheres to the academic standards of the university. All the activities usually associated with the regular university coursework are integral parts of the extension credit instructional program

#### **EXTENSION FACULTY:**

Extension faculty are either members of the resident faculty of the university or highly qualified persons approved by the resident faculty. In all cases, they are requested to explain to students the scope, content and organization of their courses, and to be explicit with regard to objectives and grading standards.

#### **REGISTRATION:**

Pre-registration is suggested for all classes and required for some. By completing the pre-registration form and returning it with the required fees, the student is assured of a place in the class. Registration may, however, be accomplished at the first meeting of most extension classes by completing and returning a registration form with the required fee to the instructor or a representative from the Office of Extended Programs.

#### **COURSE CANCELLATION:**

The usual minimum enrollment in extension classes is twenty students. Classes with fewer than twenty students may be continued upon approval of the Office of Extended Programs.

#### PARKING:

Since regular classes will be in session, parking permits will be required for on-campus classes.

#### **CREDIT FOR EXTENSION COURSES:**

The maximum extension (and/or correspondence) credit which may be used toward bachelor's degree requirements at California State University Dominguez Hills, is 36 units, and 13 quarter units for graduate credit. Extension work is considered the same as transfer credit.

#### LIBRARY SERVICES:

Library facilities available upon request.

#### **AUDITORS:**

Students may audit extension courses with the instructor's approval. Auditors are required to pay the same fees as those taking the course for credit.

#### TEXTBOOKS:

Textbooks may be purchased in class

#### WITHDRAWAL:

To avoid receiving a failing grade, students who withdraw from class must do so by filling out an official withdrawal card. These cards may be obtained from the Office of Extended Programs. Please note the deadline for withdrawal for your class.

#### **REFUND OF FEES:**

Refunds are granted in accordance with the state refund schedule.

- If an extension course is discontinued, the entire registration fee will be automatically refunded.
- If a student withdraws after the first class (before the first 25% of the course has elapsed), 65% of the total fee will be refunded
- After 25% of the course time has elapsed, no refund will be made.
- Courses of four meetings duration or less, no refund.

#### IMPORTANT:

The time of withdrawal is determined by the date by which the Office of Extended Programs, California State University Dominguez Hills, receives written notification of the student's withdrawal.

#### FEES:

Registration fees for extension classes are normally \$28.00 per unit. The fees for each course are listed in this announcement. The fees are the same for residents and non-residents. Payment may be made by check, money order, VISA draft, written to CSUDH in the exact amount required. Registration will not be considered complete until the check has been honored by the bank on which drawn. Veterans' benefits may be applied to extension courses.

## EXTENSION GRADING PROCEDURES:

Unless a course is offered for a grade of Credit/No Credit only all extension courses are offered for letter grades. However, an undergraduate student in an extension class offered for letter grade may choose to be graded on the Credit/No Credit basis by informing the instructor in writing at the beginning of the class.


