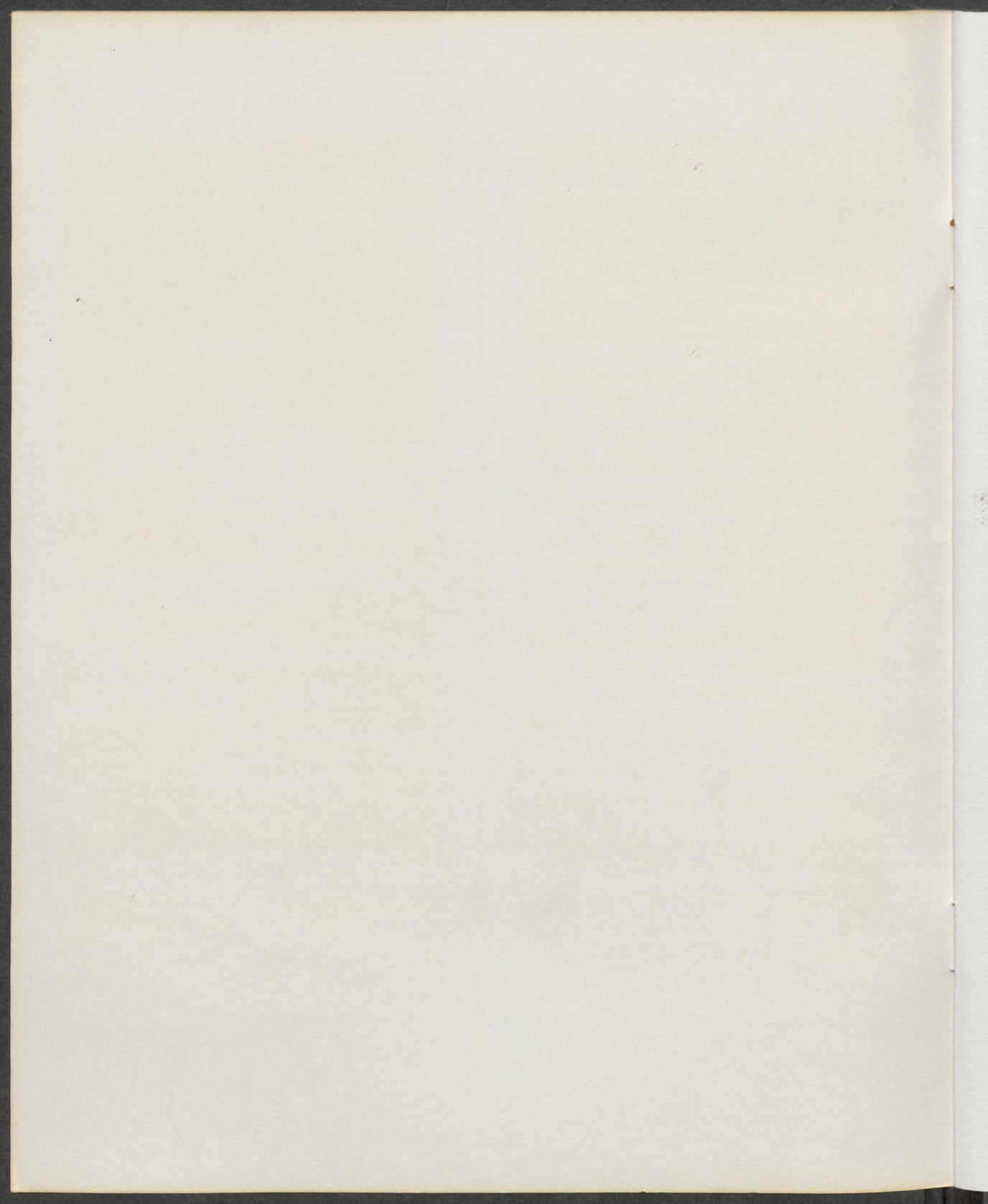

Admission Requirements

You are eligible to attend Winter Session if you:

- Are a high school graduate or 18 years or older
- Are a student at CSUDH or other collegiate institution
- Have met course prerequisites
- Are a teacher holding credentials valid for teaching in California

When selecting courses, you are advised to refer to the course descriptions for prerequisites or special qualifications which may be required for certain courses. In some instances, permission to enroll in a course must be obtained from the instructor.

You are not required to file transcripts or formal admission to Winter Session. Registration in Winter Session courses does not constitute admission to the University for the regular term. Spring 1996 applications may be obtained from the Admissions Office or call (310) 516-3696.

Registration Procedures

There are three ways to register:

Mail-in Registration: Mail-in registration begins Wednesday, November 8, 1995 and ends Friday, December 15, 1995. Registrations postmarked after December 15 will be returned. The completed registration form must be accompanied by complete fee payment -- check, money order or Mastercard/VISA account number and expiration date. No cash, please.

Walk-in Registration: Walk-in registration in SCC B141 begins Wednesday, November 8, and ends Friday, December 15, 1995. You may walk in for late registration January 2 through January 3, 1996. Fees must be paid at the time of registration.

FAX Registration: Complete the attached registration form and FAX it to (310) 516-3971. Fee payment must be made by Mastercard or VISA. FAX registrations are accepted from November 8, 1995 - January 1, 1996.

Late Registration: Late registration for Winter Session is permitted through Wednesday, January 3 only. It requires the approval of the instructor. A \$25.00 late fee is charged.

Maximum Unit Load: The maximum number of credit units which may be earned without department approval is 4 credit units.

Change of Program

Adding classes Classes may be added on January 2 and 3. You must obtain the signature of your instructor on an add/drop form.

Dropping Classes Students may drop/withdraw without academic penalty until the end of the first week of the session. Students may withdraw with a "W" at any time prior to the last two days of class with the instructor's and the dean's signature. Students may only withdraw during the last two days of class (January 18-19) for serious and compelling reasons. Late withdrawals are permitted only in cases of documented accident or serious illness where the cause of withdrawal is due to circumstances clearly beyond the student's control and where the assignment of an Incomplete is not practical. The effective date of withdrawal is the date the forms are received by the Division of Extended Education. Non-attendance in a class, notifying the instructor or stopping payment on a check does not officially constitute withdrawal from a course.

Refunds Refunds are based on the date a student officially withdraws from a class and are calculated as follows: Prior to January 2, 1996, the refund will be the total fee paid, less \$10 administrative costs. On the first two days of the session (January 2 & 3, 1996), the refund will be the total fee paid, less the fee for one unit. During the remainder of the first week, the refund will be 65% of the first 2 days' refund. After that date, there will be no refunds.

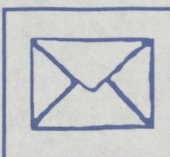

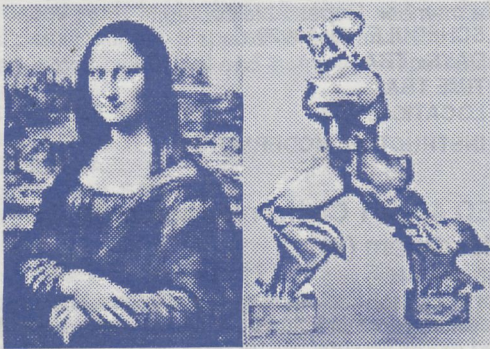

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The Sea of Cortez

A field study and research cruise, conducted by Certified Yachting Adventures, co-sponsored by CSUDH and offering 3 units of credit (as BIO 495), will take participants to the Sea of Cortez and the coastal islands of Southern Baja.

This environment boasts one of the greatest densities of marine life found in the world. Tropical and cold-water species intermingle in the nutrient-rich waters around the islands. Deep oceanic canyons, large coastal reefs and shallow sand flats are among a few of the different habitats available for study. Large manta rays, sea turtles, whale sharks and over 25 species of marine mammals are common to this area.

The vessel is equipped with an array of oceanographic equipment for sampling and analysis. The waters of Southern Baja are very clear and warm and are perfect for diving and snorkeling. The terrestrial animals and plants found on the remote islands along the coast of Baja are perfect for studying endemic species and desert ecology.

cost: \$1500 per person includes air fare, all meals for length of trip (January 8-15) and all fees for credit (there is no reduction in price if credit not taken).

vessel: The *Rapture* is a 115-foot Coast Guard certified excursion vessel equipped with oceanographic research equipment for comprehensive analysis. Specified research equipment will be available on demand. *Rapture* capacities 49 for multiple day research expeditions. Two twenty-foot tenders are available for multiple site research and island access and SCUBA diving. Kayaks and snorkeling equipment are available for shoreline exploration. A dive compressor is available for SCUBA tank fills. The crew includes certified ocean lifeguards, two dive-masters and a resident marine biologist.

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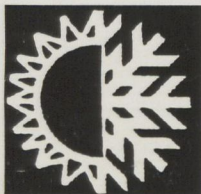
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
