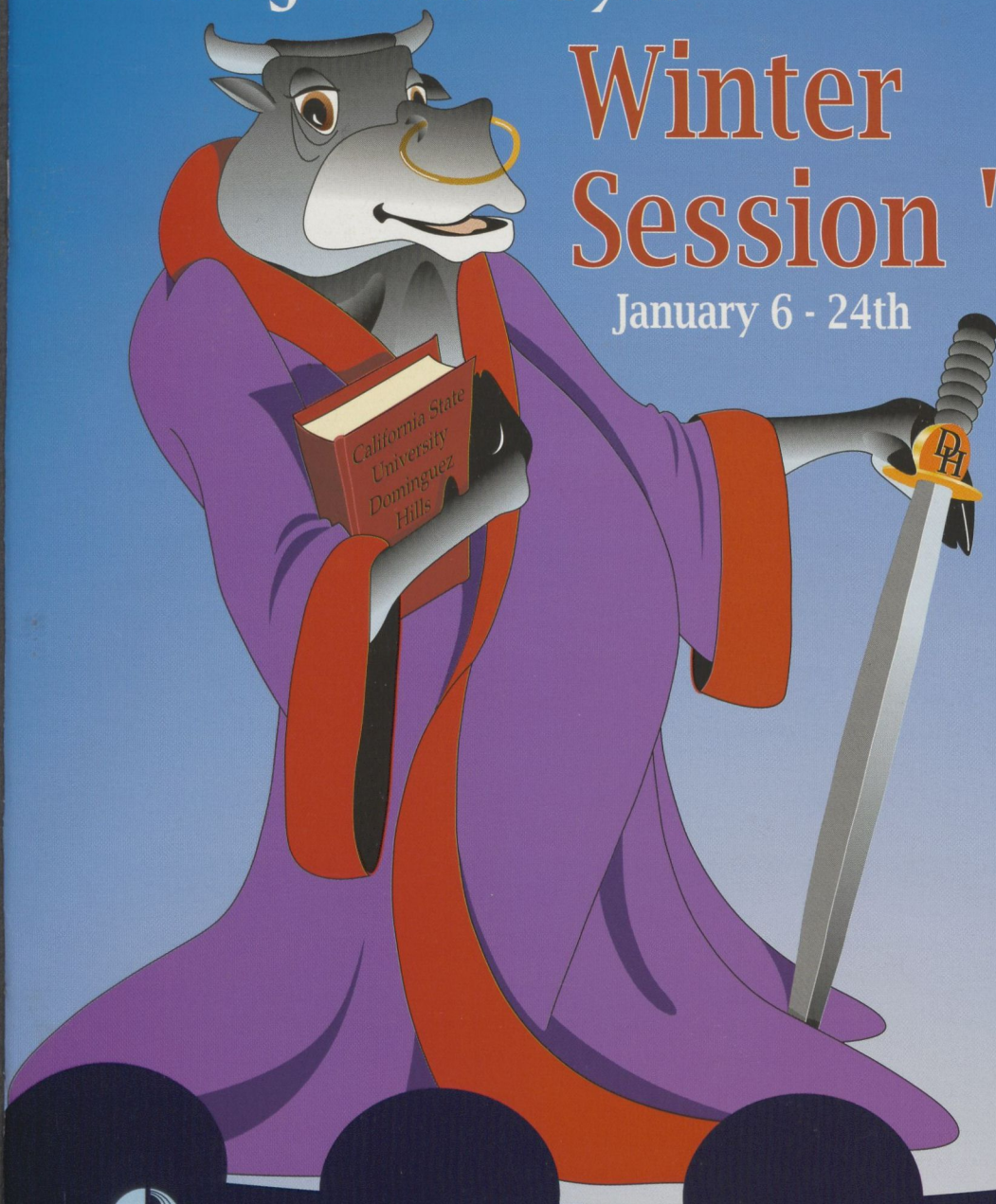

Admission Requirements

You are eligible to attend Winter Session if you:

- a) Are a high school graduate or 18 years or older
- b) Are a student at CSUDH or other collegiate institution
- c) Have met course prerequisites
- d) Are a teacher holding credentials valid for teaching in California

When selecting courses, you are advised to refer to the course descriptions for prerequisites or special qualifications which may be required for certain courses. In some instances, permission to enroll in a course must be obtained from the instructor.

You are not required to file transcripts or formal admission to Winter Session.

Registration Procedures

There are four ways to register:

Mail-in Registration: Mail-in registration begins Monday, November 4, 1996 and ends Friday, December 20, 1996. Registrations post-marked after December 20 will be returned. The completed registration form must be accompanied by complete fee payment -- check, money order or Mastercard/Visa account number and expiration date. No cash, please.

Walk-in Registration: Walk-in registration in SCC B141 begins Monday, November 4, 1996 and ends Friday, January 3, 1997. You may walk in for late registration January 6 through January 7, 1997. Fees must be paid at the time of registration. It is important to note that the Extended Education Registration Offices will not accept any registration forms from 12 noon on December 24 through January 1, 1997. The Registration Office will resume regular office hours on Thursday, January 2, 1997.

FAX Registration: Complete the attached registration form and FAX it to (310) 516-3971. Fee payment must be made by Mastercard or VISA. FAX registrations are accepted from November 4, 1996 - January 5, 1997.

Telephone Registration: Telephone registration is available December 3-20, 1996 only with Mastercard or Visa from 8am-6pm Monday-Thursday and 8am-5pm Friday.

Late Registration: Late registration for Winter Session is permitted through Tuesday, January 7, only. It requires the approval of the instructor. A \$25.00 late fee is charged.

Maximum Unit Load: The maximum number of credit units which may be earned without department approval is 4 credit units.

Change of Program

Adding Classes: Classes may be added on January 6 and 7. You must obtain the signature of your instructor on an add/drop form.

Dropping Classes: Students may drop/withdraw without academic penalty until the end of the first week of the session. Students may withdraw with a "W" at any time prior to the last two days of class with the instructor's and the dean's signature. Students may only withdraw during the last two days of class (January 23-24) for serious and compelling reasons. Late withdrawals are permitted only in cases of documented accident or serious illness where the cause of withdrawal is due to circumstances clearly beyond the student's control and where the assignment of an Incomplete is not practical. The effective date of withdrawal is the date the forms are received by the Division of Extended Education. Non-attendance in a class, notifying the instructor or stopping payment on a check does not officially constitute withdrawal from a course.

Refunds: Refunds are based on the date a student officially withdraws from a class and are calculated as follows: Prior to January 6, 1997, the refund will be the total fee paid, less \$10 administrative costs. On the first two days of the session (January 6 & 7, 1997), the refund will be the total fee paid, less the fee for one unit. During the remainder of the first week, the refund will be 65% of the first 2 days' refund. After that date, there will be no refunds.

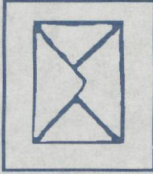

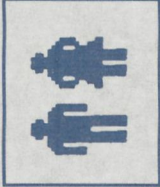

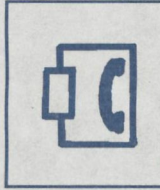

Explore the CHANNEL ISLANDS January 12-19

Take BIO 495 (3 unit option) aboard *The Rapture*



Each day of your trip will bring you to a new location. We will be traveling to Anacapa, Santa Cruz and Santa Rosa Islands. At these islands we will be observing the rich wealth of life that is protected in this sanctuary. Our multiple-day trips include activities such as snorkeling, kayaking, hiking and possibly water-skiing for recreation.

The Rapture

This vessel has been outfitted with collection and holding equipment to capture and harbor some of the local species. This will allow students to engage in a hands-on approach to learning about many of the species. Plankton nets will also be used for the collection of the micro-marine animals. Microscopes will be available for the observation of the animals that are not commonly apparent to the immersed snorkeler. Oceanographic devices such as secce disks, oxygen electrodes and meters and sediment grabs will be used to measure the varying parameters of the physical characteristics of the different sites of study. The students will learn to measure simple visibility and the water quality (dissolved oxygen, nitrates, pH, etc.). There will be an emphasis to instruct the students on simple taxonomy of the local species. Keys to local species will be available on the vessel for immediate referencing. Wet suits, snorkels, masks and fins will also be available to any student or passenger that does not have their own. Onboard, laptop computers can be used for data entry and statistical analysis.

The Sanctuary

The Channel Islands Marine Sanctuary boasts wide variety of marine life and habitats. These islands are positioned at a junction where the warm water from the tropics meets the cold water of the North. This mixing brings together varying species of marine plants and animals. These islands are surrounded by large kelp forests and rocky reefs. The kelp forests are a habitat that is ideal for many different kinds of animals. The forests may include the sea otter or an occasional gray whale feeding on the small crustacean.

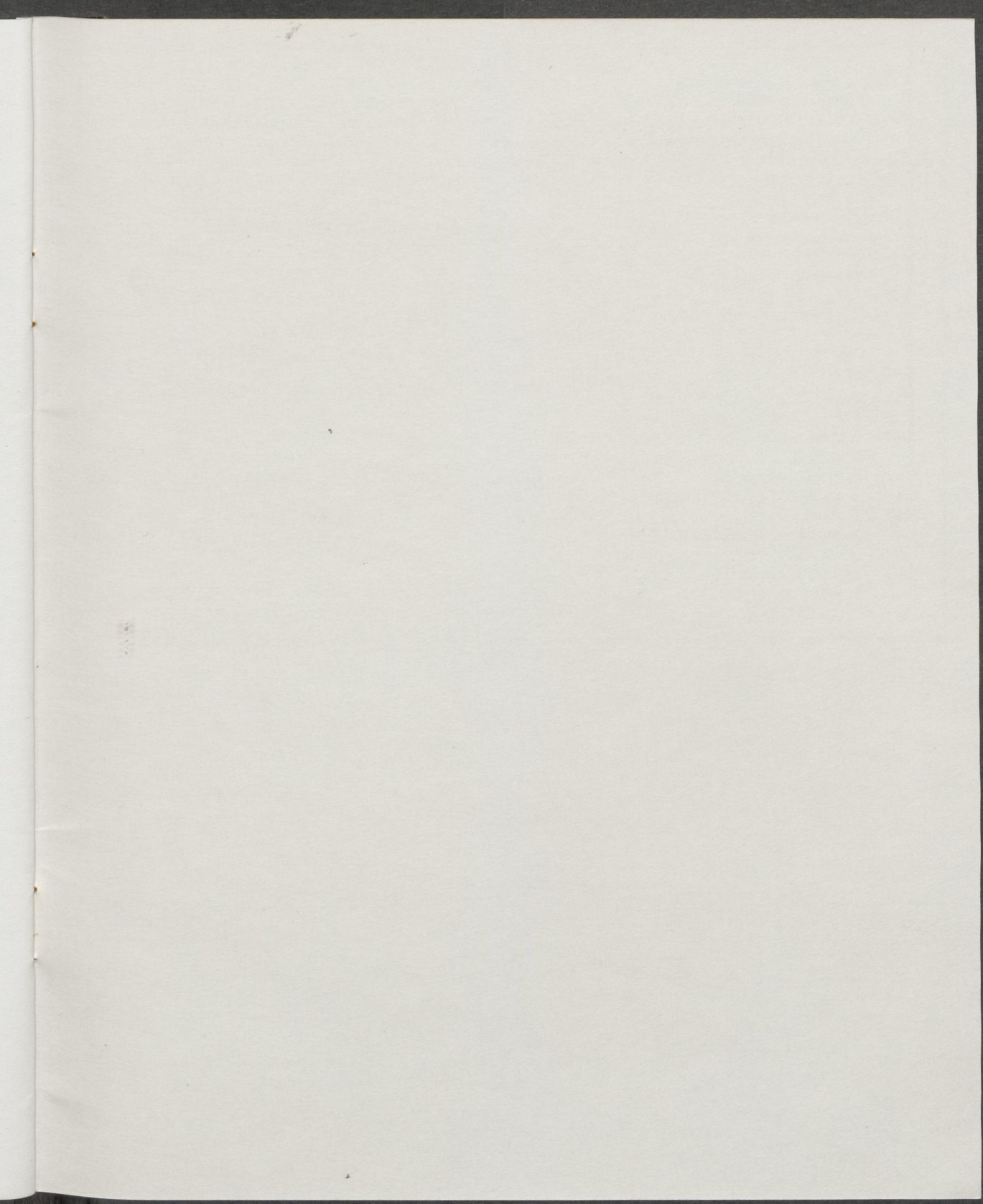
The Channel Islands are rich in marine mammal populations. There are five species of pinnipeds found along the shorelines of the various islands. On our cruises you may have the opportunity to observe communities of Elephant seals or Sea lions. There are more than 25 species of sharks that live within the Sanctuary. These sharks vary in size from a 2-to-3-foot horn shark up to the harmless, 45-foot basking shark. These islands are famous for the more than 27 species of Cetaceans (whales and dolphins) that frequent the area. Pods of Killer Whales, Pilot whales and Bottlenose dolphins can be found hunting for prey. Large baleen whales, such as the gray whale, the blue whale or possibly the fin whale may be witnessed feeding on frill or migrating up or down the coast, depending on the time of year.
