Admission Requirements

You are eligible to attend Winter Session if you:

a) Are a high school graduate or 18 years or older or

b) Are a student at CSUDH or other collegiate institution or

c) Have met course prerequisites or

d) Are a teacher holding credentials valid for teaching in California

When selecting courses, you are advised to refer to the following course descriptions for prerequisites or special qualifications which may be required for certain courses. In some instances, permission to enroll in a course must be obtained from the instructor.

You are not required to file transcripts or formal admission to Winter Session.

Registration Procedures

There are five ways to register:

Mail-in Registration: Mail-in registration begins Wednesday, November 1, 2000 and ends Friday, December 22, 2000. Registrations postmarked after December 22 will be returned. The completed registration form must be accompanied by complete fee payment -- check, money order or Mastercard, Visa or Discover account number and expiration date. **No cash, please.**

Walk-in Registration: Walk-in registration in EE 1100 begins Wednesday, November 1,2000 and ends Tuesday January 2, 2001. You may walk in for late registration January 3, 4 and 5, 2001. Fees must be paid at the time of registration. It is important to note that the Extended Education Registration Office will be closed from December 22, 2000 through January 1, 2001. The Registration Office will resume regular office hours on Tuesday, January 2, 2001.

FAX Registration: Complete the attached registration form and FAX it to (310) 516-3971. Fee payment must be made by Mastercard, Visa or Discover. FAX registrations are accepted from November 1, 2000 - January 5, 2001. <u>Telephone Registration</u>: Telephone registration is available December 1- 22, 2000 only with Mastercard, Visa or Discover from 8am-6pm Monday-Thursday, 8am-5pm Friday and from 8am-1:30pm on Saturday. Call (310) 243-3741.

<u>Touchtone Registration</u>: Touchtone registration is available November 1, 2000 - January 1, 2001 only. See next page for information.

Late Registration: Late registration for Winter Session is permitted Wednesday, January 3, Thursday, January 4, and Friday, January 5 only. It requires the approval of the instructor. A \$25.00 late fee is charged.

<u>Maximum Unit Load</u>: The maximum number of credit units which may be earned without department approval is 4 credit units.

<u>Adding Classes:</u> Classes may be added on January 3 and 4. You must obtain the signature of your instructor on an add/drop form.

Dropping Classes: Students may drop/withdraw without academic penalty until the end of the first week of the session. Students may withdraw with a "W" at any time prior to the last two days of class with the instructor's and the dean's signature. Students may only withdraw during the last two days of class for serious and compelling reasons. Late withdrawals are permitted only in cases of documented accident or serious illness where the cause of withdrawal is due to circumstances clearly beyond the student's control and where the assignment of an Incomplete is not practical. The effective date of withdrawal is the date the forms are received by the Division of Extended Education. Non-attendance in a class, notifying the instructor or stopping payment on a check does not officially constitute withdrawal from a course. <u>Refunds</u>: Refunds are based on the date a student officially withdraws from a class and are calculated as follows: Prior to January 2, 2001, the refund will be the total fee paid, less \$10 administrative costs. On the first three days of the session (January 2, 3 & 4 2001), the refund will be the total fee paid, less the fee for one unit. On the 5th and 8th of January, the refund will be 65% of the first 2 days' refund. After that date, there will be no refunds.

Touchtone is available between 6am-midnight, Monday-Saturday. If you need additional assistance, you may select the option to transfer to an operator during office hours. During the Fall and Spring semesters, you may register and drop courses by Touchtone up to the day before the course begins. During the Winter and Summer Sessions, you may register and drop courses only up to the day before the session begins. Touchtone Registration for Extended Education courses is available only to students paying in FULL at the time of registration by credit card, and/or students with approved Financial Aid Award from CSUDH. You may pay by VISA, DISCOVER CARD, OR MASTERCARD. You will receive written confirmation of your registration within seven days from the date of registration.

T.O.R.O.S. Information

Making your Entries Permanent: It is very important to make your entries permanent before exiting T.O.R.O.S. Failure to so will result in cancellation of your request(s). Co-requisites: Some courses require concurrent enrollments in laboratory or activity sections as well as in lecture or seminar sections, or concurrent enrollment in one or more other courses. Failure to add/waitlist both or all co-requisites will result in being dropped from your original request.

Enrollment restrictions: Some courses are restricted to students in specific degree programs, to specific class levels (e.g. seniors) or to certain student levels (e.g. graduates).

Some departments may choose not to print course reference numbers (CRN's) in the Course Listing section of the Class Schedule in order to screen students for eligibility. Other courses may not be available through T.O.R.O.S. but may be added with the instructor's approval.

Students who are not eligible for restricted courses may be able to obtain approval from the department in special circumstances. A signature of approval must be obtained from the appropriate department representative.

Failure to make your entries permanent will result in the cancellation of your registration and in losing all your entries. Stay on the line until the system completes this step and confirms the courses you are enrolled in. Press 2 for MasterCard.

3. Enter your credit card number (The number you have entered will be spoken back for verification).

Press 1 if the number repeated is correct.

4. Enter your credit card Expiration Date ((The expiration date you have entered will be spoken back for verification)

Press 1 if the expiration date repeated is correct. Press 2 if the expiration date is incorrect and reenter the expiration date.

5. Select the amount you wish to pay. Press 1 to pay the full amount you currently owe. Press 1 if the amount entered is repeated correctly. Press 2 to enter a different amount.

The system will place you on hold while your credit card is authorized. The system will inform you that your credit card has been accepted and will instruct you to hold while your payment is applied to your account. If you credit card is denied, you may start over with a different credit card. (Note: you will need to contact your credit card issuer if you wish to find out why your card has been denied.)

When the payment is applied to your account, the system will indicate the remaining amount due for the account, if any.

Privacy Information

The University complies with Federal and State laws concerning privacy rights of students. These rights are summarized in the University Catalog. Questions about privacy rights may be directed to the Dean of Extended Education at (310) 243-3737 or the Vice President for Student Affairs at (310) 243-3784.

Use of Social Security Number

Students are required to provide the University with their correct social security numbers (individual taxpayer identification numbers) pursuant to the authority contained in Section 41201, Title 5, California Code of Regulations, and Section 6109 of the Internal Revenue Code. The University uses the social security number to identify records pertaining to the student and, if needed, to collect debts owed the University. Also, the Internal Revenue Service requires the University to file information returns that include the student's social security number and other information such as the amount paid for qualified tuition, related expenses, and interest on educational loans. That information is used to help determine whether a student, or a person claiming a student as a dependent, may take a credit or deduction to reduce federal income taxes. Students who do not have a social security number at the time of enrollment will be required to obtain a social security number and submit it to the University within sixty days. Failure to furnish a correct social security number may result in the imposition of a penalty by the Internal Revenue Service.

Important Tax Credit Information

If you are enrolled in an eligible degree or certificate program or are taking courses to acquire or improve job skills, you may qualify for a Hope Scholarship or Lifetime Learning Tax Credit. The Hope Scholarship tax credit is available only to students in their first two years of postsecondary education who are enrolled at least half-time in an eligible program. The tax credits are based on the amount of qualified tuition and fees, less grants and other taxfree educational assistance and the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income. Hope credits apply to fees paid after December 31, 1997.

The Lifetime Learning Tax Credit is available to students at all educational and enrollment levels who are enrolled at an eligible educational institution. As with the Hope Scholarship tax credit, this opportunity is based on the amount of gualified tuition and fees, less grants and other tax-free educational assistance and the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income. The Lifetime Learning credit applies to fees paid after June 30, 1998. Consult IRS Publication 970 or your tax preparer for additional information on both programs.

Disabled Student Services

Students with verified disabilities, which are permanent or temporary (e.g., broken bones, strained back, other sprains, etc.) are eligible for a variety of support services from the Disabled Student Services Office. 
