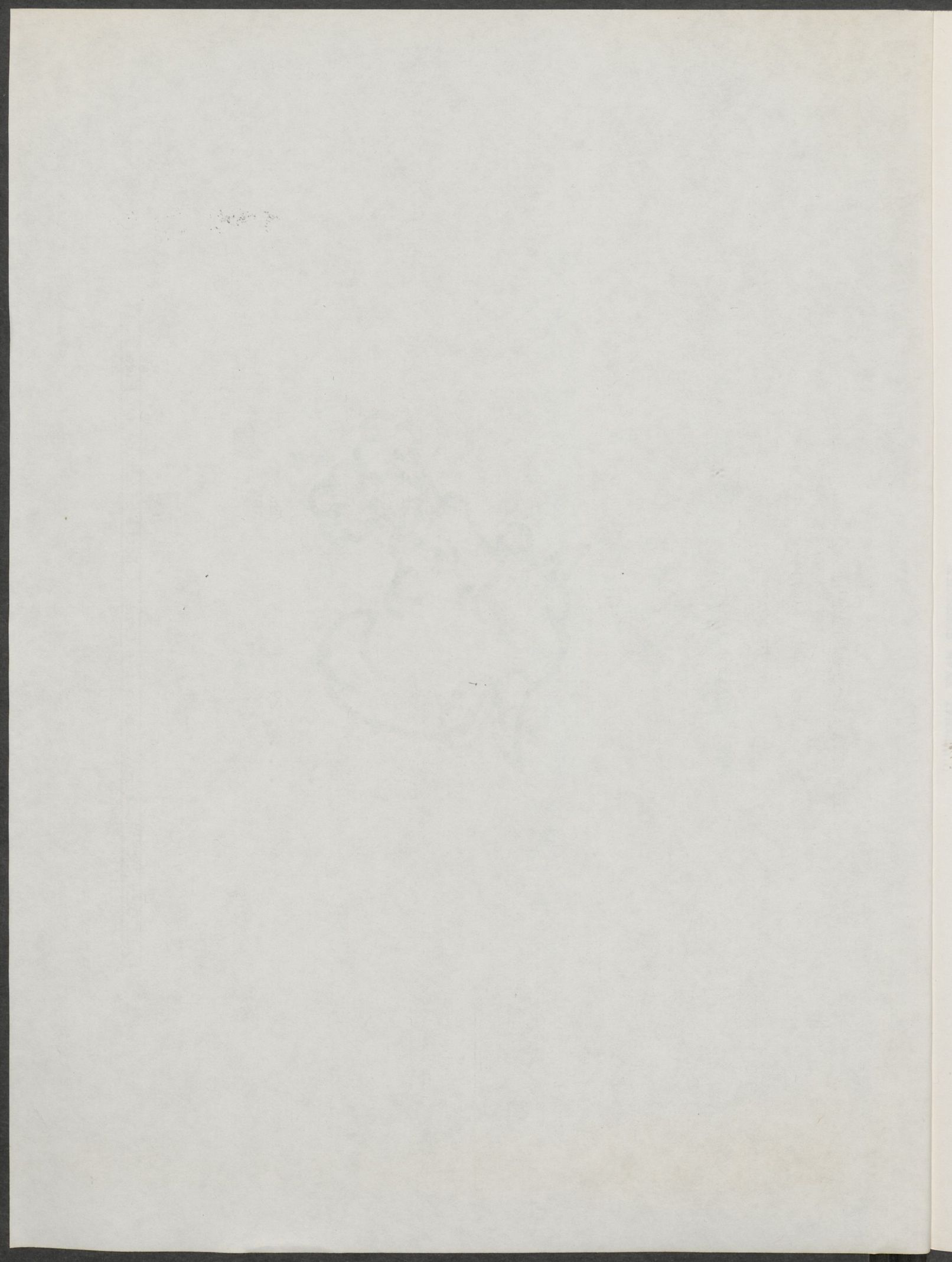


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GENERAL NOTES TO CLASS SCHEDULE

(See p. 66 for footnotes to courses)

1. This class schedule is published so that students may more effectively plan their schedules. It must be recognized, however, that changes to the schedule are unavoidable. Therefore, students are urged to check the bulletin board at the Office of Admissions and Records periodically in order to note changes that have been made to the schedule.

2. All classes listed in this schedule are subject to cancellation if pre-enrollment does not reach the following levels:

Lower Division Courses	13
Upper Division Courses	10
Graduate Courses	5

3. Unless otherwise specified, classes will meet for a 50-minute period beginning at the time shown.

4. Indented classes signify portion of the class above (normally lab or discussion sessions of a lecture course). In such cases one must enroll in both the class above and one of the indented classes.

5. A final exam schedule is published on page two, for all three quarters, and students may desire to consider the timing of their final exams at the time they select their course schedule.

6. The college catalog, as well as the general information pages which follow, should be reviewed carefully prior to registration.

7. Classes are not normally scheduled on Wednesday, noon to 2:00 pm, so that student and faculty organizations may schedule meetings, and so that from time to time all college events, such as convocations, concerts, etc. may be scheduled.

8. Application to teacher education programs should be made by March 1 of the preceding year. Application forms are available at the School of Education, SBS A-226.

FINAL EXAM SCHEDULE

1973-74

1. Except for laboratory courses, all classes are required to meet at the time set aside below for a Final Examination Meeting, even if the instructor prefers to use that meeting for a different educational purpose.
2. The exam date and time is determined by the day, time, and (in certain instances) length of the first regular class meeting each week. Those relatively few classes which are not thus determined will have as their Final Exam Meeting one of the alternatives shown. The alternative will be selected by the instructor after insuring that no conflicts exist.
3. Exams will be held in the regular classroom, except that instructors using one of the alternative times must first check with Academic Affairs, extension 393, to ascertain that the regular class is available.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Admission

Prospective students, whether for part-time or full-time programs of study, must file an application for admission and other supporting documents within the announced filing period. To enroll in classes, applicants must be formally admitted to the college for that quarter. Procedures for admission are published in the College Catalog. Application forms may be obtained from the Office of Admissions and Records (J-103C)

Health Clearance

A physical examination and health interview are required of each new student prior to registration. These should be completed prior to the time of registration. Students will not be allowed to pick up registration materials until they have secured health clearance from the Health Office.

Advising

New students are assigned faculty academic advisers during the first quarter of attendance. Each student is responsible for maintaining his own personal copies of college transcripts for advising purposes and should take these transcripts with him when meeting with an adviser. We suggest that each student meet with his Faculty Academic Advisers at least once a year. We require at least three meetings with Faculty Academic Advisers: 1) upon entering the college; 2) at the completion of 90 quarter units (beginning of junior year) and 3) at the completion of 135 quarter units (beginning of senior year). Both departmental and interdepartmental Faculty Academic Advisers signatures are required on the COURSE REQUEST CARD or on the REGISTRATION ADVISEMENT FORM for new students. CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT

A student enrolled at the college may enroll concurrently for additional courses at another institution only by filing a PETITION FOR CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT with the Office of Admissions and Records (J-103C) after securing written approval from his academic adviser. Permission will not be granted when the study list in the proposed combined program exceeds the units authorized at this college for full-time study.

REGISTRATION

Each student registers in the California State College, Dominguez Hills, at times scheduled for this purpose. Early registration is available to continuing students and certain new students admitted early in the admissions cycle. New students eligible for early registration will be notified by mail; others register just prior to the beginning of instruction. Registration covers filling out official cards, enrolling in courses, paying fees, and receiving a STUDENT IDENTIFICATION CARD.

The continuing student should consult the academic calendar, official bulletin boards and student newspaper for information regarding early registration schedules.

CLOSED CLASSES

During registration a number of classes close and not all students are able to obtain either a complete program or the most desired program. Outlined below are some suggestions which should enable almost all students to resolve the difficulties created by closed courses or sections:

1. ADDED COURSES ON BULLETIN BOARD. Check the bulletin board outside the Office of Admissions and Records for added courses. There may be a course which could be added to your program to fulfill degree major or elective requirements.
2. ALTERNATE SECTIONS. Check the CLASS SCHEDULE to see if there are other sections of the same course available at different times.
3. ALTERNATE COURSES. Consider alternate courses which could be substituted this quarter in place of the original course preference.
4. WAITING LIST. Ask to be placed on a waiting list for closed courses. Departmental or interdepartmental offices maintain waiting lists for closed courses. Upon request you will be added to the waiting list. As spaces become available because of other students dropping or withdrawing once the quarter has begun, students on the waiting list are allowed to add the course.
5. FIRST CLASS MEETING. Go to the first scheduled meeting of a closed class. Students who do not attend the first meeting of a course are dropped by the instructor and others waiting to enroll may add the course.
6. CONSULT ADVISER. If, after considering all of the above alternatives, you still have less than the number of units in which you wished to be enrolled, seek the help of your adviser. He may be able to suggest alternatives that have been overlooked.

One final point to remember is this: The closer you are to graduation, the higher your priority for registration and thus chances for obtaining a complete program are greatly increased.

SCHEDULE OF REGISTRATION FEES

Tuition is not charged to legal residents of California. All students pay the regular fees shown below. Auditors pay the same fees as students registering for credit. All fees are subject to change by the Trustees of the California State Colleges.

Fees for each quarter are payable at the time of registration. No individual will be admitted to class prior to payment of registration fees.

REFUND OF FEES

Refunds are not automatic. Applications for refund of fees are obtained from the Cashier, and must be filed in the Office of Admissions and Records within the time limits specified. Applications received by the Registrar on or before the first day of instruction of each quarter are considered as having an effective date of the first day of instruction of that quarter.

Penalty fees (unless collected in error), the Late Registration Fee, and the Facilities Fee are not refundable.

Materials and Service Fee

To be eligible for partial refund, a student who is withdrawing from the College must file a refund petition with the Registrar not later than 14 days after the first day of instruction. \$10.00 will be retained by the College to cover the cost of registration. Refunds are not granted when units are dropped.

Non-Resident Tuition Fee

If the refund petition is filed with the Registrar before or during the first week of the quarter, 100% of the tuition fee will be refunded; during the second week of the quarter, 75%; during the third week of the quarter 50%; during the fourth week of the quarter, 25%.

Parking Fee

Petitions for refund of the Parking Fee must be filed with the Campus Security Office. If the petition is filed before or during the first 25 calendar days of the quarter, 66% of the Parking Fee will be refunded; from the 26th to the 50th calendar days of the quarter, 33%; on or after the 51st calendar day, 0%.

Consult the Business Office of the College for further information.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

Excess Units

Study List Limits

For undergraduate students in good academic standing, the normal program load is the equivalent of four full courses. To this may be added activity courses having a value of one-half course or less. A student may enroll in a maximum of 18 units during the registration period. This will provide a better opportunity for more students to have a complete program. Students who wish to enroll in more than 18 units may add additional courses beginning the first day of instruction with the signature of the instructor and written approval of the adviser on the Change of Program form.

Full-Time Status

Undergraduates are considered to be full-time students during any quarter in which they are enrolled in twelve units or more. Graduate-level students enrolled in eight or more units are considered to be full-time.

First Class Meeting

Students should report to the first meeting of their scheduled classes. Check the Schedule of Classes for room numbers. Each student is responsible for attendance in the courses and specific sections in which he has enrolled.

Students who enroll in a class but do not attend its first scheduled class meeting and do not contact the instructor beforehand WILL BE AUTOMATICALLY DROPPED BY THE INSTRUCTOR from the class and their places given to waiting students who were unable to enroll at the time of registration.

Change of Program

A Change-of-program after registration is any change that is made in a student's official study list. Such a change includes dropping a class, adding a class, changing the number of units for a class in which the student is registered, changing the section of the same course.

A Change-of-program must be made before the deadline date listed for each quarter in the official college calendar. Change-of-program forms are available at the Office of Admissions and Records. No change is effective until the change-of-program form has been filed with the Registrar. If a student officially drops a class by the end of the third week of instruction, the course will not be recorded on the student's permanent record. Policies for dropping a class after the third week are outlined below:

GENERAL REGULATIONS (cont.)

Beginning with the fourth week and prior to the final three weeks of each quarter, an administrative grade of W may be assigned provided the student's withdrawal request form lists serious and compelling reasons. Permission to withdraw during this time period is to be granted only with the approval of the instructor and department chairperson.

During the final three weeks of each quarter, the administrative grade of W shall not be assigned unless the student's request form indicates a serious accident or illness. Medical verification may be required. In addition to the signatures of both the instructor and department chairperson, the approval of the School Dean is required on the withdrawal request form. Ordinarily withdrawals in this category involve total withdrawal from the college.

Credit/No Credit Option

Students selecting the Credit/No Credit option must do so by the end of the second week of instruction of the quarter. For additional conditions and limitations of the Credit/No Credit option, consult the College Catalog for 1973/74.

Official Withdrawal from the College

Students who wish to withdraw from the college are urged to consult the Dean of Students prior to official withdrawal. Official withdrawal is necessary if a student leaves the College at any time after registration and does not intend to complete the quarter. The forms for initiating this process may be obtained from the Office of Admissions and Records.

When official withdrawal from the College occurs before the quarterly deadline for dropping classes (the third week of instruction), there is no record of enrollment. However, if official withdrawal occurs after the third week of instruction, different procedures must be followed. Refer to the current college catalog for procedures regarding withdrawal after the third week.

Conditions for readmission shall be clearly indicated on the withdrawal form. A student who withdraws under satisfactory conditions shall be classified as a continuing student for the next quarter.

Credit by Examination

A student in residence may receive credit by examination for courses in which he is eligible to enroll. The student should contact the office of the appropriate departmental chairman to initiate the procedure for credit by examination. The student may choose to

CREDIT BY EXAMINATION (cont.)

receive either a credit/no credit grade or a traditional letter grade for a course taken by examination according to the rules established for regular course enrollment. Ordinarily, the examination will be scheduled within thirty days after the petition has been approved by the department chairman. Credit by examination will not be given for course work which an academic department deems inappropriate or impossible to evaluate as, for example, might be the case in a laboratory science course. If a student enrolls in a course and then petitions for credit by examination, the examination must be taken prior to the "add-course" deadline.

Auditors

Auditors must register in the usual way and pay the same fees as would be charged if the courses were taken for credit. Enrollment as an auditor is subject to the approval of the instructor; a student registered as an auditor may be required to participate in any or all classroom activities at the discretion of the instructor. Credit for courses audited will not subsequently be granted on the basis of the audit. No record of audit appears on the student's permanent record card nor are transcripts issued for audited courses.

An enrolled student who wishes to audit a course in addition to his regular program must obtain the approval of the instructor on the Approval for Audit form available in the Office of Admissions and Records and pay the fees required as if the course was taken for credit. The approval may not be obtained before the first day of instruction.

An audited course should be taken into consideration when planning a program so that the study load will not be excessive.

A student not admitted to, nor enrolled in, the college must file a Statement of Residence prior to auditing a course. A residence determination must be made so that appropriate fees may be charged. The student must then follow the procedures as outlined above.

Degree Candidates--RESPONSIBILITY FOR COMPLETION OF DEGREE REQUIREMENTS IS THE STUDENT'S AND THEREFORE, EACH STUDENT MUST BE THOROUGHLY FAMILIAR WITH THE PROCEDURES AND INFORMATION ABOUT GRADUATION.

1. Candidates for a baccalaureate degree must file an application for graduation with the Office of Admissions and Records in accordance with the following schedule:
File first week of Fall Quarter for graduation at the end of Winter Quarter.
File first week of Winter Quarter for graduation at the end of Spring Quarter.
File first week of Spring Quarter for graduation at the end of Summer Session.
File first week of Spring Quarter for graduation at the end of Fall Quarter.

DEGREE CANDIDATES (cont.)

2. Candidates for a graduate degree must file an application for graduation by the end of the first week of classes of the quarter in which they plan to graduate. Summer Session candidates must file the first week of the Spring.
3. Undergraduate degree candidates will be provided an official evaluation (Report for the Bachelor's Degree) indicating final requirements yet to be completed for their degree objective. Those candidates filing in accordance with the above schedule will receive this evaluation prior to the first day of classes of their final quarter.
4. Failure to apply for graduation in accordance with the above schedule will result in the following:
 - a. Report for the Bachelor's Degree not available prior to the first day of classes of the final quarter.
 - b. Degree verification for graduate schools and job placement not available on schedule.
 - c. Your name not appearing in the commencement program.
 - d. Your diploma not being available on schedule.
5. Change in Graduation Date: If all graduation requirements, as shown on the "Report for the Bachelor's Degree" are not completed by the filed, anticipated date of graduation, you are required to file a "Request for Change of Graduation Date". An additional fee is not required. Failure to file a request for change of date will result in:
 - a. Your name not appearing in the commencement program.
 - b. Your diploma not being available on schedule.
 - c. Degree verification for graduate schools and job placement not available on schedule.

GRADUATION WITH HONORS

Effective with Spring 1973 graduation, recognition is given to undergraduates who have achieved outstanding academic performance. The honor designations and the requirements for each are as follows: Graduation with Distinction, an overall average of 3.50 to 3.79 in the last 90 quarter units attempted at CSCDH, and a 3.50 to 3.79 average in the major; Graduation with Great Distinction requires an overall average of 3.80 or better in the last 90 units attempted and 3.80 or better in the major.

GRADUATION WITH HONORS (cont.)

The major program for the bachelor's degree has three options. They are:

1. Major with Dual Fields of concentration.
2. A Major and a Minor.
3. A Single Field Major.

GRADUATING SENIORS WHO PLAN TO CONTINUE INTO GRADUATE STATUS

Graduate applicants who were enrolled as undergraduate students at the college in the term immediately preceding the term for which they now wish to apply must complete all the required forms and submit the \$20.00 application fee. Each applicant may file only one application for any one term within the California State University and College system. Alternate choice campuses may be listed on the application.

Prospective graduate students are encouraged to contact the various Graduate Departments for specific graduate admissions criteria of the Master's degree programs. Upon fulfillment of admission criteria, students are accepted as either conditionally-classified or classified graduate students.

CHANGE OF NAME OR ADDRESS

If you have made a change of name or address which has not been reported to the Office of Admissions and Records, please come to the Office of Admissions and Records and request the CHANGE OF ADDRESS form. It is very important that the Office of Admissions and Records is informed of any change, so that you will receive all mailings.

EVENING COORDINATOR

The coordinator of Evening Academic Programs, is available during the quarter, Monday through Thursday, 5:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., in room SC A-122. His phone number is 532-4304.

CHANGE OF MAJOR

Any student changing his major should request a new Major/Minor Card from the Office of Admissions and Records, indicating the appropriate change.

For the 1973/74 year, the total costs of operation is \$555.1 million, which provides continuing support for 233,290 full-time equivalent (FTE*) students. This results in an average cost per FTE student of \$2,379 per year. Of this amount, the average student pays \$225. Included in this average student payment is the amount paid by nonresident students. The remaining \$2,154 in costs are funded by State and federal taxes.

Averages do not fit all students alike or even any specific student. To arrive at an average figure that is meaningful, the costs outlined above exclude "user fees" for living expenses, housing, and parking, as well as costs for extension and summer session work. Computations are based on full-time equivalent students, not individuals, and costs are prorated by system totals, not by campus. The average costs for a full-time equivalent student in the system are depicted in the following chart:

*For budgetary purposes, full-time equivalent (FTE) translates total head count into total academic student load. The term assumes that a full-time student in The California State University and Colleges is enrolled for 15 units of academic credit. Some students enroll for more than 15 units; some students enroll for fewer than 15 units.

**The average costs paid by a student include the materials and service fee, health facilities fee, college union fee, student body fee, and the nonresident tuition. This amount is derived by taking the total of all student fees and dividing by the total full-time equivalent student enrollment. Individual students may pay more or less than \$225 depending on whether they are part-time, full-time, resident or non-resident students.

***The system's more than 14,000 acres of land and the wide range of facilities and equipment on the 19 campuses are currently valued at approximately \$1.2 billion. Amortized over a 40-year period, they are valued at \$125 per FTE student.

Books will be bought back for the full purchase price during the third week of class, IF you have PROOF OF WITHDRAWAL FROM YOUR CLASS OR WITHDRAWAL FROM THE COLLEGE in addition to your dated cash register receipt. Books must be in new condition.

After this time period, there is a 24 hour refund on books. (If you bought it Wednesday, you can return it Thursday). Supplies and non-required books are ALWAYS on 24 hour refund.

BOOK STORE SERVICES:

Checks can be cashed in the Bookstore for up to \$ 5.00 over the amount of purchase. To cash a check you will need as identification, your driver's license or photo student body card.

During finals weeks of each quarter, the Bookstore will buy back for half price, any textbook that is being used during the following quarter. A buyer from a wholesale company will be here at that time to offer students a wholesale price on any textbook that the Bookstore will not be needing. Please keep in mind the fact that most of the courses are not taught every quarter and you may have to keep your books until that class is being taught again. Old editions of textbooks have no value either to the Bookstore or the wholesalers.

Class rings may be purchased at any time. We have two ring companies to choose from. Both require a minimum of \$ 10.00 deposit at the time of the order. Allow from 5-6 weeks to delivery. Delivery time may be slightly longer in June as that is the busiest time of year for ring companies.

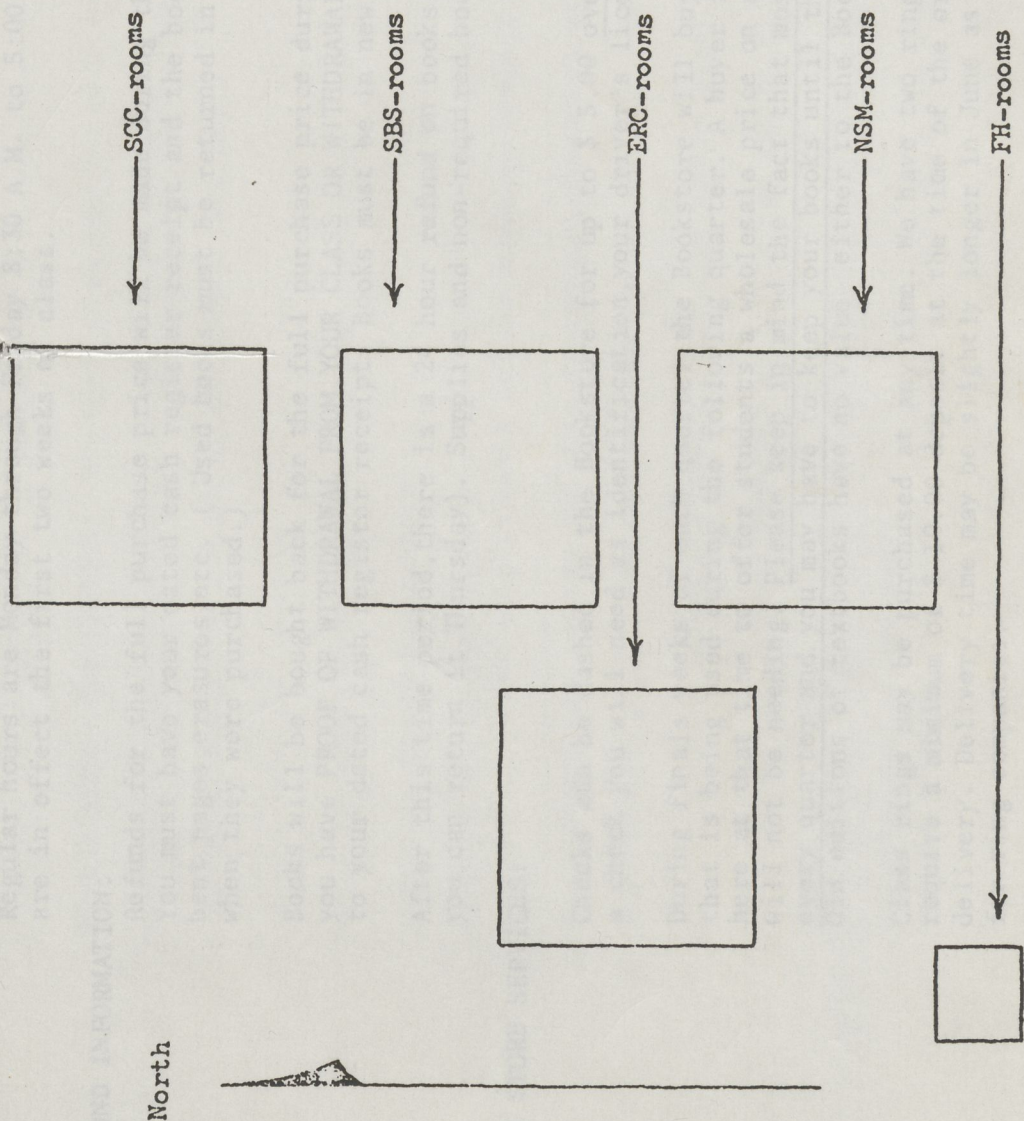
