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# HERE'S HOW TO REGISTER...

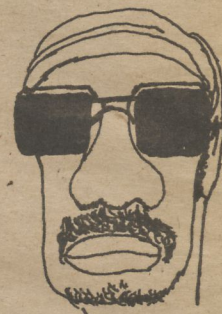
1. Complete the following *four* steps:

2. Find your classification below: **NEW (or Readmitted) STUDENT**  
or  
**CONTINUING STUDENT**

Read the information in that section and complete the indicated instructions.

3. When you have your REGISTRATION PACKET, secure all required pre-Registration advisement and signatures.
4. Complete your COURSE REQUEST CARD.
5. Go to REGISTRATION at the hour (or later) indicated on your Priority Registration Card.

That's it. Registration usually takes 30-45 minutes!



## 2. CONTINUING STUDENTS

If you attended CSUDH as a regular (non-extension) student this past spring, or the previous winter or fall, you should receive a Registration packet in the mail. (If you have NOT received the packet by Sept. 13, call 515-3600 to see why.)

Continue to Step 3 below . . . UNLESS

- A. You attended another academic institution since last attending CSUDH, or
- B. You graduated from CSUDH and you wish to begin post-baccalaureate studies.

In either case you must REAPPLY, and should read the NEW STUDENTS section to the right.

## 2. NEW (or Readmitted) STUDENTS

- A. Have you APPLIED for admission?
- B. Have you RECEIVED a LETTER OF ACCEPTANCE?  
(A letter is generally sent a minimum of 15 days after receipt of ALL required application material.)
- C. Have you RECEIVED a REGISTRATION PACKET -- or been told to pick it up at the Admissions and Records window?  
(Packets are prepared AFTER you have been accepted.)

Prospective students, part-time or full-time, must file an application for admission, pay the \$20 application fee (or qualify for a fee waiver), and provide supporting documentation within the announced filing period. To enroll in classes, applicants must be formally admitted to CSUDH for that quarter. Procedures are explained in the CSUDH Catalog, and Admissions Advising is available at the University Service Center. Applications may be obtained from the Admissions and Records window or at the Center.

YES . . . . If you answer YES to ALL 3, continue to Step 3.

NO . . . . If you answer NO to ANY of the 3, contact Admissions and Records, SC-J 103 (515-3603) 8-6 M-Th, 8-5 F. For Admissions Advising, contact the University Information and Service Center, SC A-130 (515-3696) 8 am - 10 pm M-Th, 8-5 F.

New students awaiting acceptance are strongly encouraged to attend classes FROM THE FIRST DAY for a maximum of three weeks or until their admission is confirmed or denied. See LATE REGISTRATION on the next page.

## 3. ADVISEMENT and SIGNATURES

### ACADEMIC ADVISING

While it is the student's responsibility to seek academic advisement, the faculty requires students to meet with their advisor at the following three times:

1. Upon entering the University
2. At the completion of 90 quarter units (range 83-97 units)
3. At the completion of 135 quarter units (range 128-142 units)

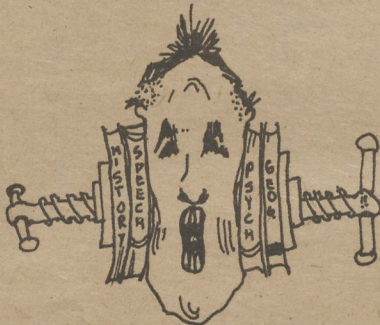
### E.O.P. STUDENTS

E.O.P. students will not be admitted to Registration without receiving a prior signature from James Clayton (E.O.P. Director) or Honey Anang, regardless of the number of units in which they are enrolling.

### SPECIAL CONSENT(S) FOR ENROLLMENT

Certain classes listed in this Schedule require special consent(s) for enrollment. A card, INSTRUCTOR APPROVAL FOR ENROLLMENT, should be obtained at the department office or at the Admissions and Records window. To expedite your registration, have the card(s) signed before your priority time.

At the end of each meeting, those NEW students who have decided on a major will be directed to the appropriate Departmental Major Office for advising. The list of 'Locations of Advising Areas' will be available at the General Advisement Meeting, and is also printed on page 10 in this Schedule.

### NEW GRADUATE AND NEW CREDENTIAL STUDENTS

The Orientation and General Advisement meeting are intended primarily for undergraduate students; however, new graduate students are welcome to attend. MASTER'S DEGREE CANDIDATES in specific disciplines should consult advisors in these departmental offices; UNDECLARED GRADUATE STUDENTS should go to the Graduate Studies Office (ERC D-514); SECOND BACHELOR'S DEGREE students should go to the University Information and Service Center; and EDUCATION GRADUATE STUDENTS should go to SBS B-115 for advisement.

### CONTINUING GRADUATE AND CREDENTIAL STUDENTS

Continuing M.A. and Credential students should see their advisors before registration.

### ALL LIBERAL STUDIES MAJORS

All Liberal Studies majors must see an advisor in SBS B-103 just prior to entering the Registration area.

## 4. COURSE REQUEST CARD

Complete the COURSE REQUEST CARD before Registration. The example to the right is a guide. Note that the first three letters appear under DEPARTMENT. COURSES are designated by three digits, followed by a two-digit SECTION number (such as EDU 210-02). Indicate LAB or DISCUSSION by the first letter of that word, then write the number of units awarded for satisfactory completion of the class. ## 5. FALL REGISTRATION

FALL REGISTRATION is held on:

MONDAY, SEPT. 18	9 a.m. - 7:30 p.m.
TUESDAY, SEPT. 19	8:30 a.m. - 7:30 p.m.

CLASSES BEGIN ON THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 21

Each student eligible for Registration shall report to the east entrance, middle level, of the Social and Behavioral Science (SBS) Building at the time shown on his/her PRIORITY REGISTRATION CARD. (Students without this card will NOT be allowed to register, and should see Step 2, NEW STUDENTS.) PLEASE DO NOT REPORT AT AN EARLIER TIME than that noted. You may come later, however, but no later than 7:30 p.m. on Monday or Tuesday.

REGISTRATION PRIORITY NUMBERS, that appear on your card, are sent to each student. Priority for all students, new and continuing, is based upon units completed toward graduation; the more units completed, the higher the priority number. If you have a question regarding your priority number, contact the Office of Admissions and Records.

## Answers to often asked questions...

You can tell if a class has been closed during Registration by checking the boards at the east end of the SBS Building, middle level.

Yes, another person can register for you and pay your fees. They can also make mistakes in your name which you will have to rectify, if possible.

Students interested in participating in Intercollegiate Athletics should contact either the Physical Education Department (515-3761) or the respective coach of the team sport.

Upon receipt of a bachelor's degree at any of the 19 CSUC campuses, to continue post-baccalaureate studies the student must reapply to the campus of his/her choice, to pursue graduate studies, an undeclared major, or a second baccalaureate. More details at the University Information and Service Center.

Admission requirements are the SAME for part-time or full-time students or for those attending during the day, evening, or Saturday.

Evening students (attending at 6 p.m. and later) can complete 12 units per quarter by attending two evenings and a Saturday morning, or by starting the two-evening sequence at 4 p.m.

Physical education and health classes are not general CSUDH requirements for graduation.

Copying machines are available day or evening at the Library and the Bookstore, at 5 cents a page.

Smoking is not allowed in the classrooms. Simply ask the instructor to enforce the regulation.

If you drop your class during the first three weeks it will not appear on your transcript.

A new Catalog is available either July or August of each academic year. The Catalog includes the major and minor requirements for all academic programs at CSUDH. A sheet for each major, undergraduate and graduate, with the same information is available at the University Information and Service Center beginning each fall.

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## Late Registration

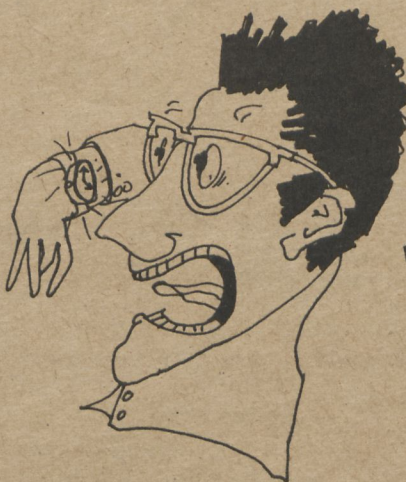
Continuing and new students who did not take advantage of the in-person Registration may register late beginning on Thursday, September 21, the first day of classes. New students may not register until they have been formally admitted to the University. Students MUST report to the Late Registration area if they fall into one of the following categories:

ELIGIBLE CONTINUING and NEW STUDENTS who did not register during the in-person registration period must bring their Course Request Card and data sheet. The Course Request Card is the permit to register late.

STUDENTS who had their CLASS CARDS PULLED during Registration but did not pay fees must report to the Late Registration area, bringing with them their copy of the Course Confirmation Card.

NEW STUDENTS who were ADMITTED too LATE for the in-person Registration must bring their Letter of Acceptance from the Office of Admissions before they may begin Late Registration.

Each student will be provided with a special Late Registration form and instructions on procedures to follow to register for classes. The students must complete the Late Registration process including payment of fees by the date shown on the AGREEMENT TO COMPLETE LATE REGISTRATION form.

Students seeking a baccalaureate degree from the University must complete specific requirements as determined by the Trustees of the California State University and Colleges: the California Administrative Code, Title 5; and, California State University Dominguez Hills.

Briefly summarized, the college-wide requirements include all of the following:

1. Completion of 186 quarter units of credit.
2. Completion of General Education (60 quarter units).
3. Satisfaction of statutory requirements in American history and government by completing courses History 101 or examination and Political Science 101 or examination.
4. Completion of one of the following: a Major and a Minor; or a Major in one of the eight designated Single Fields; or a Double Major. This requirement also can be satisfied through the Areas of Concentration in the Small College combined with a Thematic Project, a Minor, or another Major. Specifications for each field are outlined under their appropriate headings elsewhere in the University catalog.
5. Completion of elective courses (beyond the requirements in 2, 3, and 4 above) to reach the total of 186 quarter units of credit.

## General Education

Completion of a minimum of 60 quarter units in General Education, as specified in The California Administrative Code, Title V, is required of all students graduating from California State University Dominguez Hills.

The flexible design of the academic program makes it possible for each student to select courses which meet his personal goals. Courses used to fulfill requirements in General Education may not be used to fulfill major course requirements, except as specified in the Liberal Studies major.

### Refund Fee

Refunds are not automatic. If you are changing fee categories (going from more than six units to less than six units) you should pick up an application for refund from the Office of Admissions and Records. If you are withdrawing from school completely, you should get the application form from the University Information and Service Center. Refunds are calculated based on the date the application is received in Admissions and Records. It is important therefore to file as soon as possible. \$5 will be retained by the University to cover the cost of registration.

### Installment Payment of Non-Resident Tuition

Effective January 1, 1976, a non-resident student who is a citizen and resident of a foreign country and not a citizen of the United States may pay the required non-resident tuition fee on an installment basis. This is limited to two equal payments established at the time of registration.

A 10% non-refundable service charge will be added to each installment payment.

Payments are made to the University Cashier. Failure to make an installment payment on schedule will incur a penalty fee. Unless the installment and penalty fee are paid within three additional days after the deadline, registration will be cancelled.

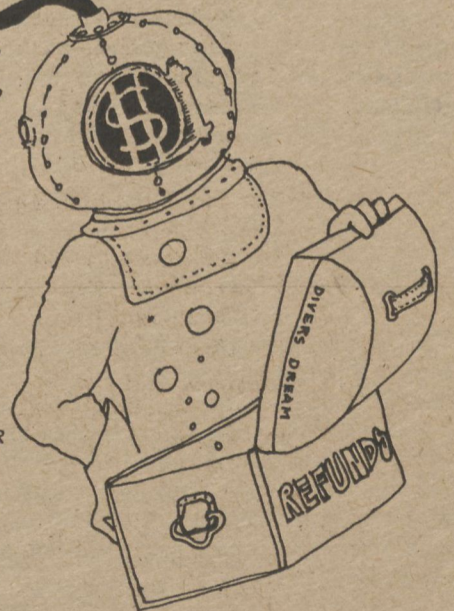

# GENERAL INFORMATION...



## ADD or DROP CLASSES DURING THE FIRST THREE WEEKS

- Complete the ADD/DROP information on the Change of Program form, using the department name (3 letters), course number (3 numbers), and section (2 numbers).
- If adding, obtain the signature of the instructor.
- Return the Change of Program form to the Late Registration area (first week) or to the Admissions and Records window (thereafter).
- Present your ID card for name and date embossing.
- Conditions for dropping a course after the third week are outlined in the current CSUDH Catalog and on the attachment provided with the Change of Program form. A student who enrolls in a course, discontinues attendance, and does not officially drop the course will automatically receive an F grade for the course.

## ETHNIC SURVEY INFORMATION

When you pick up your registration packet at Step 2 of the registration process, many of you will find a new card: the Ethnic Group Survey Card. If this card is included in your packet, please take a moment to fill it out.

The diversity of students at Dominguez Hills is one of the University's greatest strengths and, although providing ethnic information is voluntary, your participation will enable the institution to acquire accurate data for campus planning, to comply with state and federal regulations, and to allow the University to better know and serve its students.

Furthermore, many companies and corporations in the Los Angeles area are required to have an Affirmative Action plan which includes goals for hiring and promotion. Accurate goals can only be set when companies know how many qualified candidates are available for open positions.

CSUDH provides companies and agencies, upon request, with information about group characteristics and ethnic composition of its graduating classes. This information helps companies set accurate goals for hiring and promotion.

Filling out the Ethnic Group Survey Card helps the University — and may help you too. Please take a second to check the appropriate box.

## FIRST CLASS MEETING

Students should report to the first meeting of their scheduled classes. Check this Schedule of Classes for room numbers. Each student is responsible for attendance in the courses and specific sections in which he/she has enrolled.

Students who enroll in a class but do not attend its first scheduled class meeting and do not contact the instructor beforehand may forfeit their space in the class and their place may be given to waiting students who are unable to enroll at the time of registration. **IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE STUDENT TO OFFICIALLY DROP ANY COURSE IN WHICH HE/SHE IS ENROLLED.** Students who do not OFFICIALLY drop a course in which they have enrolled will receive an F grade for the course.

## CREDIT/NO CREDIT OPTION (Undergraduates only)

Undergraduate students selecting the Credit/No Credit option must do so by the end of the third week of instruction, OCTOBER 11, 1978. Credit/No Credit Cards are available from the Office of Admissions and Records or the University Service Center and must be submitted by the OCTOBER 11, deadline. For additional conditions and limitations of the Credit/No Credit option, consult the current CSUDH Catalog.

## EXCESS UNITS — STUDY LOAD LIMITS

For undergraduate students in good academic standing, the normal program load is the equivalent of four full courses. To this may be added activity courses having a value of one-half course or less. A student may enroll in a maximum of 20 units during the registration period. Students who wish to enroll in more than 18 units must obtain the written approval of the advisor on the Class Request Card during Registration and on the Change of Program form during the quarter. A student who wishes to enroll in more than 24 units after registration must secure the approval of one of the following individuals:

- The Dean of the School in which the student is majoring.
- The Director of the Small College for Small College students.
- The Coordinator of Liberal Studies for Liberal Studies majors.
- The Coordinator of Academic Advising.

## OFFICIAL WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY

Students who wish to withdraw from the University are urged to consult the University Service Center prior to official withdrawal. Official withdrawal is necessary if a student leaves CSUDH at any time after registration and does not intend to complete the quarter. The forms for initiating this process may be obtained from the University Information and Service Center.

When official withdrawal from the University occurs before the quarterly deadline for dropping classes (the third week of instruction), there is no record of enrollment. However, if official withdrawal occurs after the third week of instruction, different procedures must be followed. Refer to the current CSUDH Catalog for those procedures. A student who does not officially withdraw will automatically receive F grades in all courses for which he/she is enrolled.

Conditions for readmission are indicated on the withdrawal form. A student who withdraws under satisfactory conditions shall be classified as a continuing student for the next quarter.

## PROCEDURE FOR RETAINING CONTINUING STUDENT STATUS

### a. Procedure

A student at the University may 'sit out' or miss one or two consecutive quarters of attendance and retain his or her continuing student status without filing a new application for admission. Students who choose to 'sit out' the one or two consecutive quarters will be regarded as continuing students and will receive registration information and related materials as if they were currently enrolled. This procedure will apply to students who do not attend any other institution in their absence from Dominguez Hills. A student who attends another institution would be required to submit a new application for admission and the application fee. A student who is absent for more than two quarters will also be required to submit a new application and fee.

### b. Retention of Catalog Rights

A student utilizing the continuing student status procedure will retain his or her catalog rights. The student will be able to use the requirements of the catalog under which he or she was admitted or are in effect at the time of graduation.

## AUDITORS

Auditors must pay the same fees that would be charged if the course were taken for credit. Enrollment as an auditor is subject to the approval of the instructor. A student registered as an auditor may be required to participate in any or all classroom activities at the discretion of the instructor. Credit for courses audited will not subsequently be granted on the basis of the audit. No record of audit appears on the student's permanent record card nor are transcripts issued for audited courses.

An enrolled student who wishes to audit a course in addition to his regular program must obtain the approval of the instructor on the Approval for Audit form available in the Office of Admissions and Records and pay the fees required as if the course was taken for credit. The approval may not be obtained before the first day of instruction. A student may not opt to audit a course after the end of the third week or change from credit to audit status after that date.

An audited course should be taken into consideration when planning a program so that the study load will not be excessive.

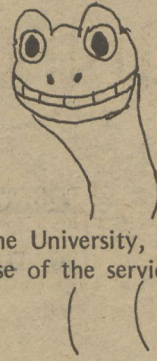
A student not admitted to, nor enrolled in, the University must file a Statement of Residence prior to auditing a course. A resident determination must be made so that appropriate fees may be charged. A student must then follow the procedures as outlined above.

## ATTENTION NON-RESIDENT STUDENTS

If you were admitted to California State University Dominguez Hills as a non-resident student you should be aware of the following:

- If your non-resident status changes, you are required to file a new residency form with the Admissions Office.
- The appropriate forms are available at the Admissions and Records window.
- The completed form will be reviewed and a determination made. If you are eligible for residency status, your registration packet will be changed to reflect your new status and you will be notified.

# MORE General Information...



## CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT

A student enrolled at the University may enroll concurrently at another institution only by filing a PETITION FOR CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT with the Office of Admissions and Records after securing written approval from his academic advisor. Permission will not be granted when the study list in the proposed combined program exceeds the units authorized at this University for full-time study.

## ENROLLMENT IN CONFLICTING CLASSES

Students are NOT allowed to enroll in two classes which meet at the same time, without specific approval on the PETITION FOR PERMISSION TO REGISTER FOR COURSES WITH A TIME CONFLICT. A student found to be enrolled in conflicting courses without the form on file will be required to resolve the conflict.

## CHANGE OF NAME OR ADDRESS

If you have made a change of name or address which has not been reported to the University, please come to the Office of Admissions and Records and request the CHANGE OF NAME/ADDRESS form. It is very important that the University be informed of any change so that you will receive all mailings.

## USE OF THE ID CARD

The ID card provided to all students will be used in transactions with the Office of Admissions and Records, the Library, and other campus offices. Please carry the card with you. Change of Program forms will not be processed without the ID card.

## VETERANS BENEFITS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

It is the responsibility of each veteran to request certification for Veterans Educational Benefits at the time of registration, if this request was not previously completed. Continuing students are normally certified for the school year, September through June, and must make arrangements for any variations, including discrepancies in the number of units reported. New students are, upon request, certified for the current quarter through the end of the school year. Please verify your certification with the veterans clerk at the veterans station during Registration.

It is also the responsibility of the veteran to report to the Office of Admissions and Records any changes of enrollment affecting his/her certification status.

## FULL-TIME STATUS

Undergraduates are considered to be full-time students during any quarter in which they are enrolled in 12 units or more. In order to graduate in four years, however, a student must complete approximately 16 units each quarter. Graduate-level students enrolled in eight or more graduate-level (300 or 400) units are considered to be full-time.

## STUDENT HEALTH SERVICES

With the letter of admission to the University, each student is provided information regarding requirements for use of the services offered by the Student Health Center.

## USE OF SMALL COLLEGE COURSES AS ELECTIVES

University students not enrolled in the Small College may complete Small College courses as electives toward the baccalaureate degree. This policy, however, does not extend to the 60-unit General Education requirement.

## TITLE IX OF THE EDUCATION AMENDMENTS OF 1972

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 and the Departmental Regulation (45 CFR Part 86) promulgated thereunder prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex in the operation of most federally assisted education programs. The regulation became effective on July 21, 1975. The Affirmative Action Coordinator, Office of Faculty and Staff Affairs, has been assigned the administrative responsibility for reviewing such matters.

## FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT OF 1974

All student records of the California State University and Colleges, including California State University, Dominguez Hills, are kept in accordance with the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974.

Students may request access to those campus records which personally identify the student; the student may challenge the accuracy of the record or the appropriateness of its retention in the campus records. Student consent is needed for the release of records covered by the Act to outside parties (e.g., prospective employers) except for those agencies entitled to access under the provisions of the Act (e.g., campus officials, other schools, federal officers, and requests in connection with the application or receipt of financial aid).

A student may request a copy of a record which the student has requested or consented to be released. Students must pay a charge for copies of records for which such a charge has been established. Copies of the full text of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 are available at the Office of the Dean of the University College or the campus library. Particular questions with respect to a student's prerogatives under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 should be directed to the Office of the Dean of the University College.

## CREDIT BY EXAMINATION

A student in residence may receive credit by examination for courses in which he/she is eligible to enroll. The student should contact the office of the appropriate department chairperson to initiate the procedure. The student may choose to receive a credit/no credit grade or a traditional letter grade for a course taken by examination according to the rules established for regular course enrollment. If the petition is approved, the examination will be scheduled within 15 days. Credit by examination will not be given for course work which an academic department deems inappropriate or impossible to evaluate as, for example, might be the case in a laboratory science course. If a student enrolls in a course and then petitions for credit by examination, he/she must discontinue attendance, officially drop the course before the third week deadline, and complete the exam within the 15-day period.

## SMALL COLLEGE

The Small College is virtually a 'college within a college' at California State University Dominguez Hills. Students enrolled in the University may take all or part of their undergraduate programs through the Small College, and the Small College should be viewed as an additional and alternative resource available to students at the University. Many students choose to complete their entire degree programs through the Small College frameworks, others find that part of their undergraduate program can best be fulfilled at the Small College, and there are many students who simply take an occasional course in the Small College to complete their elective requirements. If you are a regularly enrolled student at California State University Dominguez Hills, and if you are interested in finding out more about what the Small College can offer you, please call 515-3640 or visit SC E-173. There are a number of ways in which you, as a student, can increase your undergraduate program options and flexibility, and the policies governing these options are explained in the section that follows.

## SMALL COLLEGE PROGRAMS

1. The Small College Program consists of four components:
  - a. General Education
  - b. Areas of Concentration (analogous to a Major)
    - Civilizations
    - Human Studies
    - Science, Technology & Society
    - Environmental Studies
  - c. Thematic Project (analogous to a Minor)
  - d. Elective Courses

Any student in the University may therefore combine Small College program components of the University to complete the baccalaureate degree.

2. A Thematic Project may be considered in place of a Minor. Students interested in pursuing the possibilities of producing a Thematic Project in lieu of or in addition to a Minor should contact the Small College office, SC E-173. Information will also be available during registration in the Small College registration area.

3. Students pursuing a University Major or Minor may, on occasion, wish to apply a Small College course toward the completion of that Major or Minor. Since the Departments offering the Major customarily determine which courses will be applied for credit, students who are interested in using a Small College course should seek the written approval of the Department, preferable before registration for the course. Students may use the petition process to attempt to have courses counted retroactively for the Major.

4. Courses taken for elective credit may be taken from any academic unit on campus, including the Small College. Small College courses usually focus on interdisciplinary studies or on innovative course formats and learning methods.
