## ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

California State University Dominguez Hills is a quality university in a cosmopolitan setting. The University is on a park-like, attractive campus of 346 acres. The University celebrated its 30th anniversary in the fall of 1990.

With an on-campus enrollment of over 12,500 students, CSU Dominguez Hills provides a friendly atmosphere with generally small classes and individual attention from faculty.

CSU Dominguez Hills faculty has one of the highest percentages of doctoral degrees in the CSU system—more than 90 percent. These faculty place an emphasis on teaching while also engaging in research and scholarly activity, and provide an environment of caring about the needs of individual students. The University is fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges and by professional associations in several academic specialties.

With moderate size, modest costs and a beautifully landscaped campus surrounding modern and attractive buildings, CSU Dominguez Hills represents an attractive alternative to much larger and more expensive universities. CSU Dominguez Hills provides many of the nearby advantages of a large metropolitan area, while at the same time offering a pleasant and easy-to-get-to location.

## ADMISSIONS INFORMATION

Prospective students, part-time or full-time, or returning students, who have been out of school for two or more semesters, must file an application for admission, pay the \$55 application fee (or qualify for a fee waiver), and provide supporting documentation within the announced filing period. Late applicants will be assessed a late processing fee in addition to the \$55 application. To enroll in classes, applicants must be formally admitted to CSU Dominguez Hills for that semester. Procedures are explained in the *University Catalog*, and admissions advising is available at the Information and Service Center. Applications may be obtained from that center.

Eligibility varies depending on the applicant's previous academic background. There are four applicant groups:

**I. FIRST-TIME FRESHMAN** - A California high school graduate and legal resident of the state must present a high school grade point average (GPA) from the last three years of high school (excluding physical education and military science) and a test score from either the American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). The combined GPA and test score must place the applicant in the upper one-third of the statewide California high school graduating class. In addition, students must have satisfactorily completed ("C" grade or better) a comprehensive pattern of college preparatory course work (See the *University Catalog* for a comprehensive eligibility table and details regarding the subject requirements).

Students who are not legal residents of California and are graduating from high school in other states or United States possessions must have a GPA and test score placing them in the upper one-sixth of California high school graduates.

### II. TRANSFER STUDENTS - Requirements:

To qualify for admission as a transfer student you must have a grade point average of 2.0 ("C") or better in all transferable units attempted. You must be in good standing at the last college or university attended and meet any of the following standards:

1. Freshman admission requirements must be met that are in effect for the term to which you are applying (see "Freshmen Requirements" section).
2. a. Freshman eligibility was attained at the time of high school graduation and you have been in continuous attendance in an accredited college since high school graduation, *or*

- b. Freshman eligibility was attained at the time of high school graduation except for the subject requirements; you have made up the missing subjects, and have been in continuous attendance in an accredited college since high school graduation.
3. At least 56 transferable semester (84 quarter) units have been completed and you have made up any missing subject requirements (see "Making Up Missing College Preparatory Subjects" section). Nonresidents must have a 2.4 grade point average or better.

For this section, transferable courses are those designated for that purpose by the college or university offering the courses.

**Making up Missing College Preparatory Subject Requirements:**

Undergraduate applicants who did not complete the subject requirements while in high school may make up missing subjects by any of the following ways:

1. Complete appropriate courses with a "C" or better in adult school or high school summer sessions.
2. Complete appropriate college courses with a "C" or better.
3. Earn acceptable scores on specified examinations.
4. If you have 56 or more semester (84 quarter) units you may complete one of the following alternatives:
  - a. *1987 or earlier high school graduates:* complete the CSU general education requirements in communication in the English language (at least 9 semester units) and mathematics (usually 3 semester units), with a "C" or better in each course;
  - b. *1988 and later high school graduates:* complete a minimum of 30 semester (45 quarter) units with a "C" or better in each course, to be chosen from the courses in English, arts and humanities, social science, science and mathematics of at least equivalent level to courses that meet general education or transfer curriculum requirements. You must complete all CSU general education requirements in communication in the English language (at least 9 semester units) and mathematics (usually 3 semester units) as part of the 30-unit requirement.

For this section, one course of at least three semester (four quarter) units will be considered equivalent to one year of high school study. For further information about alternative ways to satisfy the subject requirements, call the Information Center.

**III. GRADUATE STUDENTS** - A graduate applicant must have a minimum 2.5 GPA in the last 60 semester units attempted, possess an accredited baccalaureate degree, and be in good standing at the last institution attended to be admitted to unclassified standing. Unclassified admission does not constitute admission to a graduate degree curriculum. (Please note that beginning fall 1985 lower division courses and extension courses completed after the bachelor's degree will be excluded from the GPA calculation. Upper division course work taken through Open University will be included in the GPA calculation)

**IV. INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS** - International students are required to have a 2.4 GPA on all units attempted from college.

All students, regardless of citizenship, who have not attended school at the secondary level for at least three years or beyond where English is the principal language of instruction, are required to earn a minimum score of 550 on the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL).

All newly-admitted international students must attend the International Student Orientation Program on Aug. 8, 1990 from 9 a.m. to 12 noon in the University Center. This orientation program is specially designed to review INS Regulations and introduce foreign students to the University.

**New Undergraduate Student Orientation Programs**

Each new student must obtain an advisor's written approval on the **Registration Ticket** before registering. To expedite the advising process, to introduce students to the campus and to answer general questions about the policies and procedures of the University, orientations are provided at the beginning of the semester.

The mini-orientation session provides a brief campus overview and academic planning program for all new students. During the mini-orientation, new students will be welcomed to the campus, will be given an explanation of advisement procedures and will receive general or major advising, as appropriate.

**PLEASE NOTE: NEW UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS ARE EXPECTED TO ATTEND AN ORIENTATION.**

**Advising for New Graduate and New Credential Students**

The above orientation sessions are intended primarily for undergraduate students; however, new graduate students are welcome to attend.

**Master's degree candidates** in specific disciplines should consult advisors in departmental offices. Unclassified post baccalaureate students who are second baccalaureate students or who are preparing for admission to credential or graduate programs should contact the chair or the coordinator of the program for advising. Graduate special majors and unclassified post baccalaureate students who are taking classes unrelated to a campus academic program should contact the dean of Graduate Studies at (213) 516-3693.

# ADVISEMENT

## GENERAL ADVISING SUGGESTIONS

Academic advising is a means by which students become involved in their academic programs, educational goals and career pursuits. Students should seek academic advising after admittance to the University and each semester thereafter. Academic advisors are usually faculty members in academic departments.

Students with declared majors or minors receive advising through their departments. Major advisors usually provide both major and General Studies advising. The University Advisement Center provides academic advisors for students without majors and for General Studies advising.

Academic advisors help students select courses, explain academic regulations, and offer perspective and career advice for their disciplines. Students should seek and obtain an advisor with whom they are compatible and meet with her/him on a regular basis.

All new students should attend the New Student Mini-Orientation described on page 5 of this *Class Schedule*.

Use the following guidelines for obtaining academic advisement:

### Undergraduate Students

**Declared majors and minors** should contact their major/minor department. Locations and phone numbers are listed on pages 35-37 of this *Class Schedule*. Business administration majors/minors should contact the Business Administration Advisement Center, SBS A-306, telephone 516-3561.

- ☑ **Undeclared majors** must contact the University Advisement Center, SCC M-110, telephone 516-3538.
- ☑ **Special majors and minors** should contact the Dean of Undergraduate Studies, ERC D-514, telephone 516-3862.
- ☑ **Educational Opportunity Program (EOP)** students must contact the EOP Office, SCC C-127, telephone 516-3632.
- ☑ **Admission Exceptions (Special Admits)** students must contact the University Advisement Center, SCC M-110, telephone 516-3538.

Students with General Studies advising needs, unresolved advising problems, or those experiencing academic difficulty should contact the University Advisement Center, SCC M-110, telephone 516-3538.

### Second Baccalaureate Degree Students

**Second Baccalaureate Degree** students should contact the University Advisement Center for General Studies advising and seek major advising at their department.

### Post-Baccalaureate Unclassified Students

**Post-Baccalaureate Unclassified** students are those who possess a bachelor's degree but are not currently enrolled in a graduate or credential program. Contact the Graduate Studies Office, ERC E-506, telephone 516-3693, for objective and degree advice. Contact academic departments for course and major advisement.

### Post-Baccalaureate Classified Students

**Post-Baccalaureate Classified** students are those who possess a bachelor's degree and are enrolled in a credential or certificate program. Contact the Program Office for advisement.

### Graduate Students

**Graduate Students** are those who are enrolled in a graduate program. Contact the graduate Program Office for advisement. M.A./M.S. Interdisciplinary Studies (Special Majors) should contact the Graduate Studies Office, ERC E-506, telephone 516-3693.

An advisor's signature signifies that the student has met with an advisor who has given approval for the courses listed on the **Registration Ticket**. Such approval denotes that the student has met course prerequisites, is prepared for this coursework, and that the courses are appropriate for the student's goals. Furthermore, the signature attests that the number of units is suitable for the student's circumstances and that special consent (see below), if required, has been obtained.

Advisor's written approval for **Registration Tickets** are required on at least three occasions:

- ☑ Upon entering the University
- ☑ At the completion of 60 semester units
- ☑ At the completion of 90 semester units

However, students may be required to obtain written approval on a more frequent basis. Use the following guidelines:

- ☑ **Declared Majors** - Since some departments require written approval every semester, check with your major department to determine its policy.
- ☑ **Undeclared majors** - Students must obtain an advisor's written approval from the University Advisement Center each semester.
- ☑ **Educational Opportunity Program (EOP)** - Such students must obtain written approval from an EOP academic advisor.
- ☑ **Admission Exceptions (Special Admits)** - For their first year on campus, Special Admits must obtain an advisor's written approval at the University Advisement Center.
- ☑ **Post-Baccalaureate Unclassified Students** - Advisor's written approval may be obtained at the Graduate Studies Office or the University Advisement Center once course consent has been acquired from the appropriate department.
- ☑ **All other Post-Baccalaureate and Graduate Students** - Obtain required written approval at department or Program offices.

## SPECIAL CONSENT FOR COURSE ENROLLMENT

Certain courses require special consent for enrollment from either the instructor or the department. Students should obtain such consent prior to registering. The required stamp or signature must appear in the "Authorization" column on the **Registration Ticket**.

## ADVISEMENT DURING LATE REGISTRATION

Students are encouraged to seek advisement as soon as possible. Follow the procedures outlined under "General Advising Suggestions" and "Advisors Written approval for Registration Tickets."

**Admitted students** should obtain a revised Registration Ticket at the Registrar's Office and begin attending courses immediately. At the first course meeting have the instructor sign your **Registration Ticket** in the "Authorization" column. Continue to attend courses and submit your **Registration Ticket** on the specified date.

**Contract students** will receive a **Registration Ticket** from the Admissions Office. While waiting for official admission to the University, attend courses as soon as the semester begins and continue attending until you notification of admission is received. At the first course meeting have the instructor sign your **Registration Ticket** in the "Authorization" column. Submit your **Registration Ticket** on the specified date. Students who have been denied admission can contact the University Advisement Center for possible options.

## REGISTRATION INFORMATION

### FALL REGISTRATION DATES

**Note** - You must register during your priority time or during any "open" period after your designated hour.

#### *Advance Registration:*

**Tuesday, April 30 through Monday May 6, 1991**

#### *Payment Deadline for all advance registrants :*

**Friday, July 19, 1991**

Students who do not pay advance registration fees will be "disenrolled" and must register during the regular or late registration periods.\*

#### *Regular Registration:*

**Wednesday, August 28 through Friday, August 30, 1991**

#### *Late Registration:*

**Tuesday, September 3 through Friday, September 20, 1991**

\***Note:** Late registrants will incur a \$25.00 late registration fee.

### REGISTRATION TICKET

Complete the **Registration Ticket** before registration.

### NEW OR RETURNING STUDENTS

Students admitted by the published deadline for the term are notified of eligibility by mail and sent materials for regular registration.

Students applying late and students processed for conditional (contract) registration are issued registration tickets and are assessed an additional late fee of \$25.

Questions regarding admission should be directed to the Office of Admissions or call (213) 516-3696.

### CONTINUING STUDENTS

If you attended CSU Dominguez Hills as a regular non-extension student this past spring or fall, you should receive registration materials in the mail. If you have not received the materials or notification regarding ineligibility by April 19, 1991, please call the Office of the Registrar (213) 516-3608.

If you have received your registration materials, continue to **Advisement and Signatures unless:**

- ☑ You attended another academic institution since last attending CSU Dominguez Hills, or
- ☑ You graduated from CSU Dominguez Hills and you wish to begin postbaccalaureate studies.

In either case, you must reapply and should read the item **New or Returning Students**.

### ADMINISTRATIVE AND FINANCIAL HOLDS

Students with administrative and/or financial holds are reminded that your registration **cannot** be processed until all holds are released from your CSU Dominguez Hills records. Please make sure that all holds are cleared by the appropriate office *before* entering the registration site.

### INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

All international students must clear their "registration hold" due to lack of health insurance coverage and full-time enrollment. To do so, contact Dan A. Joseffini, international student advisor, in the Small College Complex (SCC), Information Center, Room A-130.

International students *must provide proof of health coverage* prior to registration. This proof must be a membership card or official letter indicating the expiration date and amount of coverage for personal policy.

If students have not made prior insurance arrangements and do not have proof of insurance on the day of registration, they will be required to take out and pay for the Hartford Insurance Plan (minimum cost of \$324 per year) in order to register. This plan is the only health insurance plan available to international students on campus. The term of coverage must be from August 21, 1991 through May 27, 1992. If there are any questions, please call (213) 516-4215 to make an appointment with the international student advisor.

### CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT

A student enrolled at the University may enroll concurrently at another institution by filing a **Petition for Concurrent Enrollment or the Intra System Concurrent Enrollment Form** for enrollment in a CSU system campus with the Office of the Registrar after securing written approval by the academic advisor. Permission will not be granted when the schedule for the proposed combined program exceeds the units authorized at this University for full-time study.

Students planning to apply for Concurrent Enrollment at another campus are urged to register and pay fees at CSU Dominguez Hills during Advance Registration to facilitate early application and registration at the host campus.

## EXCESS UNITS: STUDY LOAD LIMITS

For undergraduate students in good academic standing, the normal program load is the equivalent of five full courses. To this may be added activity courses having a value of one-half course or less.

Students may enroll in 15 units without an advisor's signature unless otherwise required. Students enrolling in 16 - 21 units are required to have an advisor's signature. Students enrolling in more than 21 units also must obtain the approval of the dean of the school in which the student is majoring. Undeclared majors must obtain the approval of the coordinator of the University Advisement Center.

## ENROLLMENT IN OPEN UNIVERSITY FOR MATRICULATED STUDENTS

Effective with fall quarter 1984, a matriculated student who is eligible for enrollment as a regular student may not enroll partially or completely in courses through Open University.

## ENROLLMENT IN CONFLICTING CLASSES

Students are **not** allowed to enroll in two classes that meet at the same time, without specific approval on the **Petition for Permission to Register for Courses with a Time Conflict**. A student found to be enrolled in conflicting courses without the form on file will be required to resolve the conflict. The petition form is available at the Office of the Registrar and must be approved and be on file at the Office of the Registrar by the census date.

## FULL-TIME STATUS

Undergraduates are considered to be full time students during any semester in which they are enrolled in 12 units or more. In order to graduate in four years, however, a student must complete approximately 16 units each semester. Graduate-level students enrolled in eight (8) or more graduate-level (500 level) units are considered to be full time.

## NON-RESIDENT STUDENTS

If you were admitted to CSU Dominguez Hills as a non-resident student you should be aware of the following:

- ☑ Chapter 102 of the *1981 Statutes of California* requires that the "financial independence" of a student must be considered when a non-resident student is requesting reclassification as a resident.
- ☑ If you are seeking reclassification as a resident, you are required to complete and file new residency forms with the Office of Admissions. The completed forms will be reviewed and a determination made. If you are eligible for residency status, you will be informed and your registration packet will be changed to reflect your new status. The appropriate forms are available at the Office of Admissions.
- ☑ The residence questionnaires by which your status may be changed must be submitted to the Office of Admissions at least two weeks prior to registration.

## PRE-MEDICAL/PRE-DENTAL

All pre-medical, pre-dental, pre-pharmacy, pre-veterinary, pre-optometry, pre-etc. students should also seek advising from a pre-medical professional advisor in addition to their major advisor. Please call the SMT School Office (516-3373) for information.

## VETERANS' BENEFITS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

It is the responsibility of each veteran to request certification for veterans' educational benefits at the time of registration, if this request was not completed previously. Continuing students are normally certified for the school year, September through June, and must make arrangements for any variations, including discrepancies in the number of units reported. Upon request, new students are certified for the current semester through the end of the school year. Please verify your certification with the veterans clerk prior to registration.

It is also the responsibility of the veteran to report to the Office of the Registrar any changes of enrollment affecting certification status.

For new students who are being certified for the first time, and for continuing students who were not certified previous to registration, it will take six to eight weeks from the date of certification before veterans educational benefits are received.

## REGISTRATION PROCEDURES

Each CSUDH student who is eligible to register will be mailed a preprinted **Registration Ticket**. The student must bring this completed form to the registration site (SCC J-127) during the indicated priority hour.

Prior to coming to the registration site (SCC J-127), the student must:

1. Review the data preprinted on the front of the form and, if inaccurate, file the appropriate form (i.e. *Change of Address*) to make the corrections.
2. If required, secure advisor's written approval. See bottom right corner on the front of the **Registration Ticket** for "advisor's signature required" notation.
3. Clear all holds indicated on the front of the **Registration Ticket**. Bring hold clearance form with you to the registration site.
4. Complete **Program Planning Sheet** on the back of the **Registration Ticket**; *complete and have authorizations for both the preferred and alternate course selections.*
5. If you are registering for over 15 units, you must secure an advisor's written approval to authorize the unit load. If you are registering for over 21 units, you must additionally secure the signature of your school dean.
6. Secure appropriate authorization for classes requiring special permission. Check the *Class Schedule* footnotes for courses requiring special authorization. Students who do not have appropriate authorization for designated courses will be asked to leave the registration site to secure such approval; students will then be permitted to reenter the registration site and complete the registration process.

7. Obtain EPT/ELM approval on the **Registration Ticket**. Early EPT/ELM advising and approval will be available for continuing students from April 22 through April 25 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the University Advisement Center (SCC B-3 M110).

- ☑ At the completion of the registration process, each student will receive a **Schedule Confirmation and Account Statement**.
- ☑ Students with financial aid awards will have the awards credited on their account statement.
- ☑ Fees can be paid by cash, check, money order, VISA or MASTERCARD. Payment of the "Total Due" reflected on the **Account Statement** must be received in the Cashier's Office by the stated due date. Students who fail to satisfy this requirement will be disenrolled and must register during the regular or late registration periods.

## LATE REGISTRATION AND SCHEDULE CHANGES

### LATE REGISTRATION

**Deadline: September 20, 1991**

Continuing and new students who do not take advantage of advance or regular registration may register late beginning at 8 a.m., Tuesday, September 3, 1991. Students may begin late registration on the first day the class meets (not necessarily the first day of classes). Students must use their mailed **Registration Ticket** for late registration processing. Late registration will take place in the Office of the Registrar. New students may not register until they have been formally admitted to the University or issued a "Conditional Registration Contract."

Students must report to the late registration area if they fall into one of the following categories:

**Eligible Continuing and New Students** who did not register during the advance or regular registration periods must bring their **Registration Ticket** to the Office of the Registrar.

**Students who registered during advanced or regular registration but were disenrolled** because they failed to pay fees must report to the late registration area.

**New Students who were admitted too late** for the regular registration must bring the completed **Registration Ticket** sent to them at the time of admission.

**Contract Registration Students** who signed a contract for Conditional Registration who have not been processed for admission must bring the completed **Registration Ticket** and a copy of the contract.

Each student will be provided with a "Late Registration" ticket and instructions on procedures to follow to register for classes. The students must complete the late registration process by September 20; payment of the "Total Due" reflected on the **Account Statement** must be received in the Cashier's Office by the stated due date. All students registering late will be charged a \$25 late registration fee.

**Students who are registering late must obtain proper signatures on the Registration Ticket.** Signatures obtained on a "Change of Program" form will not be accepted.

### CHANGE OF PROGRAM

A change of program is any change that is made in a student's official schedule. Such a change includes: dropping a class, adding a class, changing the number of semester units for a class in which the student is registered, changing the section of the same course. It is the student's responsibility to verify the classes listed on the **Schedule Confirmation**.

A change of program must be made before the deadline date listed for each semester in the official University calendar. NO change is official until the appropriate forms have been signed by the instructor, when required, and processed by the Office of the Registrar.

Change of Program deadlines are as follows:

#### Add and Drop Processing

The student must obtain a **Change of Program** form from the Office of the Registrar and follow these procedures:

- Complete appropriate sections of the **Change of Program** form per the instructions on the back of the form.
- If adding a class, you must obtain the instructor's signature.
- If dropping a class during the first three weeks, instructor signature is not required.
- The completed **Change of Program** form must be personally returned to the Office of the Registrar for immediate processing. You will be required to present your validated ID card or receipt for processing.
- Conditions for dropping a class after the third week are outlined in the current *University Catalog*.

*NOTE: A student who enrolls in a course, discontinues attendance and does not officially drop or withdraw from the course, will automatically receive an "F", "NC", or "U" grade for the course.*

#### Official Withdrawal from the University

Official withdrawal is necessary if a student leaves CSU Dominguez Hills at any time after registration and does not intend to complete the semester. The forms for initiating this process may be obtained from the Office of the Registrar.

When official withdrawal from the University occurs before the semester deadline for dropping classes (the third week of instruction), the record indicates official withdrawal. However, if official withdrawal occurs after the third week of instruction, different procedures must be followed. Refer to the current *University Catalog* for those procedures. Students who do not officially withdraw will automatically receive "F" or "U" grades in all courses for which they are enrolled.

Conditions for readmission are indicated on the withdrawal form. A student who withdraws under satisfactory conditions shall be classified as a continuing student for the next semester.

## FEES, REFUNDS, FINANCIAL INFORMATION

### TUITION IS NOT CHARGED TO LEGAL RESIDENTS OF CALIFORNIA

All students pay the regular fees shown below. Auditors pay the same fee as students registering for credit. All fees are subject to change without notice by the Trustees of the California State University.

Fees for each semester are part of the registration process and are payable at the time of registration.

In addition to these fees, non-residents of the state of California are charged tuition.

Fees can be paid by cash, check, money order, Visa or MasterCard.

### NON-RESIDENT TUITION FEE REFUNDS

Total or partial refund of this fee can be obtained if a refund application is filed with the Office of the Registrar on or before the dates listed in the "Refund Deadlines" chart on this page. Refund applications are available from the Office of the Registrar.

### INSTALLMENT PAYMENT OF NON-RESIDENT TUITION

Effective January 1, 1976, a non-resident student who is a citizen and resident of a foreign country and not a citizen of the United States, may pay the required non-resident tuition fee on an installment basis. This is limited to three equal payments established at the time of registration.



A 15% non-refundable service charge will be added to each installment payment. If payment of either installment is not made on or before the due date, a \$10.00 late fee is also added.

Payments are made at the Cashier's Office, SCC B135.

**NOTE:** Failure to pay any installment within ten (10) calendar days of the due date will result in complete disenrollment for the remainder of the semester and the student will not be eligible to pay non-resident tuition on an installment basis in subsequent terms.

### DISHONORED CHECK POLICY

Once a check has been dishonored, no personal checks will be accepted from that person for a period of at least two academic semesters.

This rule applies to any check returned from any financial institution for any reason. The person will be required to pay all university-related debts by cash, a certified check, money order or travelers check(s) including the \$10.00 returned check fee and, if applicable, a \$25.00 late fee. No personal checks will be accepted. Those passing a dishonored check will be notified at the time the check is dishonored.

### REFUND DEADLINES

**Refunds are not automatic.** If you are withdrawing completely from school, or reducing the number of units in which you are enrolled, you should request a "Refund Application" from the Office of the Registrar. Refunds are calculated based on the date the application is received. It is, therefore, important to file for a refund application as soon as possible. Please review the refund deadlines shown below. No exceptions can be made to the dates noted. A \$5.00 service charge will be retained by the University to cover the cost of processing each refund application. Refunds are processed after the add and drop period.

**The last day to apply for a refund of regular fees is September 20, 1991. No refund applications will be accepted after this date, unless a student withdraws upon the advice of a physician and can document this fact.**

The student activity fee, student center fee, facilities fee and instructionally related activities fee are refundable only upon complete withdrawal from the University.

## GENERAL ACADEMIC INFORMATION

### AUDITING A CLASS

Auditors must pay the same fees that would be charged if the course were taken for credit. Enrollment as an auditor is subject to the approval of the instructor. A student registered as an auditor may be required to participate in any or all classroom activities at the discretion of the instructor. Credit for courses audited will not subsequently be granted on the basis of the audit. No record of audit appears on the student's permanent record card nor are transcripts issued for audited courses.

An enrolled student who wishes to audit a course in addition to his regular program must obtain the approval of the instructor on the "Approval for Audit" form available in the Office of the Registrar and pay the fees required as if the course was taken for credit. The approval may not be obtained before the first day of instruction. A student may not opt to audit a course after the end of the third week or change from credit to audit status after that date.

An audited course should be taken into consideration when planning a program so that the study load will not be excessive.

A student not admitted to, nor enrolled in, the University must file a "Statement of Residence" prior to auditing a course. A resident determination must be made so that the appropriate fees may be charged. An application for admission is not required. A student must then follow the procedures as outlined above.

### CANCELLATION OF CLASSES

The University reserves the right to make changes in the *Class Schedule* as printed. When enrollment in any class is not sufficient to justify its continuance, the course may be cancelled.

If the University cancels a class, the student will receive a full refund of applicable fees **upon application for refund** or will be allowed to register in another class without payment of a late fee.

### CHANGE OF GRADE PROCEDURES

If a student wishes a grade changed for any reason, he/she should initiate the process through the academic department. If a change is made, a "Change of Grade" form, with appropriate signatures, is prepared in the department and sent to the Office of the Registrar. The student will be notified of the change of grade by the Office of the Registrar.

### CHANGE OF NAME OR ADDRESS

If a student has made a change of name or address which has not been reported to the University, he/she should go to the Office of the Registrar and request the **Change of Name/Address** form. It is very important that the University be informed of any changes so that students receive all mailing. A "Change of Name" must be accompanied by a legal document verifying the change.

### CHANGE OF INSTRUCTOR

The University reserves the right to make changes in the *Class Schedule* as printed. When classes are split or sections are cancelled due to lack of enrollment, it may be necessary to assign an instructor different from the one listed in the class schedule.

### CREDIT BY EXAMINATION

Effective with the fall term of 1978, "Credit by Examination" is governed by the following regulations:

#### General Conditions

1. Registered students may receive "credit by examination" for courses in which they are eligible to enroll.
2. The student should contact the office of the appropriate department to initiate the procedure.
3. Each department will maintain an up-to-date listing of courses that may/may not be taken as "credit by examination."
4. The student will select a traditional letter grade or the CR/NC option in accordance with the policies applicable to regular course enrollment.
5. "Credit by examination" will not be given for course work that an academic department deems inappropriate or impossible to evaluate by examination.
6. The same course can be taken only once by "credit by examination."
7. "Credit by examination" will not be given for a course if the student already has received credit for a similar but more advanced course.
8. Units earned by "Credit by Examination" may not be used to fulfill the minimum residence requirement.

#### Procedure for Courses Listed in the *Class Schedule*

1. The student secures a petition for "credit by examination" from the appropriate department office and obtains the signature of the instructor and department chair.
2. If the petition is approved, the student enrolls in the course during registration and is given the examination during the first two weeks of the semester.
3. The student is notified of the results of the examination during the third week of the semester. If the examination is passed, the grade is submitted to the Office of the Registrar by the end of the third week. The student's name will remain on the roster and the grade will appear on the semester grade report. If the examination is failed, the student has two options: (a) remain enrolled in the course and complete it according to standard procedures, or (b) officially drop the course before the end of the third week.
4. The course grade will appear on the student's permanent record card with the other grades for the semester with the designation that the course was completed by examination.
5. The Dean of Undergraduate Studies (for undergraduate students) and the Dean of Graduate Studies (for post-

baccalaureate students) may waive the course enrollment requirement if the student through petition can demonstrate that such enrollment creates an unusual and significant hardship. If such a waiver is granted, the credit by examination shall be processed under the procedure delineated for courses not listed in the class schedule.

#### Procedure for Courses Not Listed in the *Class Schedule*

1. The student secures a petition for "credit by examination" from the appropriate department office and obtains the signature of an appropriate and willing instructor and the department chair.
2. If the petition is approved, the examination will be scheduled within 15 days.
3. Upon completion of the exam, a grade is recorded on the petition and the petition is forwarded to the Office of the Registrar.
4. The Office of the Registrar notifies the student of the grade provided by the department.
5. Only a passing grade will be recorded on the student's permanent record card. A non-passing grade will not be recorded.

### CREDIT/NO CREDIT OPTION

#### Undergraduate Students

Undergraduate students selecting the credit/no-credit option must do so by the end of the fourth week of instruction, September 27, 1991. "Credit/No-Credit" forms are available from the Office of the Registrar and the Information Center and must be submitted to the Office of the Registrar for processing by the deadline. For additional conditions and limitations of the Credit/No-Credit option, consult the current *University Catalog*.

#### Graduate Students

"CR/NC" grades may be allowed in courses numbered below 500, which will not be used to satisfy the requirement of a graduate degree program.

For full information on "CR/NC" grading, see current *University Catalog*.

### CREDIT FOR OPEN UNIVERSITY, EXTENSION AND CORRESPONDENCE COURSES

The University allows transfer credit or appropriate college-level courses completed in extension, including "Open University", or by correspondence from accredited colleges or universities and the United States Armed Forces Institute. A maximum of 24 semester (36 quarter) units earned through extension, completed at CSU Dominguez Hills or elsewhere, through correspondence, and USAFI may be accepted toward a bachelor's degree. For graduate level students, a maximum of 9 semester (13 quarter) units of extension work may be applied to a degree. Please note that these credits do not satisfy CSU Dominguez Hills residence requirements for the degree. For more detailed information, please refer to the current *University Catalog*.

### DOUBLE COUNTING OF GENERAL STUDIES COURSE

Lower division General Studies may be "double-counted" in both the major and the minor. Upper division General Studies courses may be double-counted in the following majors only: liberal studies, medical technology, and interdisciplinary studies. (Majors in these programs should consult their faculty advisor for details.) Upper division General Studies courses may be double-counted in the minor if: (a) at least 12 semester units are taken in the minor exclusive of General Studies courses and (b) General Studies courses used in the minor have the approval of the chair/coordinator responsible for the minor. Even though students may double-count certain General Studies courses, they will not receive additional unit credit towards graduation by double-counting. A double-counted course counts three (3) units (not six) towards graduation.

### FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT OF 1974

All student records of The California State University, including CSU Dominguez Hills, are kept in accordance with the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974.

Students may request access to those campus records that personally identify the student. The student may challenge the accuracy of the record or the appropriateness of its retention in the campus records. For records covered by the Act, student consent is needed to release records to outside parties (e.g. prospective employers) except for those agencies entitled to access under the provisions of the Act (e.g., campus officials, other schools, federal officers, and requests in connection with the application or receipt of financial aid).

A student may request a copy of a record that he/she has requested for release. Students must pay a charge for copies of records for which such a charge has been established. Copies of the full text of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 are available at the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs (ERC C532) or the campus library. Specific questions with respect to a student's prerogatives under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 should be directed to the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs.

If a student wishes to restrict the release of directory information, a request may be made at the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs. The request is valid from the semester requested through the end of the academic year. Requests for restriction of release of information for a subsequent academic year require a new form.

### FIRST CLASS MEETING

Students should report to the first meeting of their scheduled classes. Check the *Class Schedule* for time, day and room numbers. Each student is responsible for attendance in the courses and specific sections in which he/she has enrolled.

Students who enroll in a class but do not attend its first two meetings (or first meeting of once a week classes) and do not contact the instructor beforehand, may be dropped from the class by the instructor and their space given to other students

waiting to add the class. It is the responsibility of the student to make sure that he/she has been dropped by the instructor. Students who are in doubt regarding their drop status should file their own official "change of program" form.

NOTE: Failure to officially drop or withdraw from a course will result in a grade of "F", "U", or "NC".

## GRADUATION, APPLICATION FOR

All degree candidates must file an "Application for Graduation" with the Office of the Registrar in accordance with the following schedule:

### Baccalaureate Degree

To GRADUATE at the end of: You must file by:

Fall Semester ..... April 1

Spring Semester ..... September 1

Summer Session ..... February 1

### Graduate Degree

To GRADUATE at the end of: You must file by:

Fall Semester ..... August 15

Spring Semester ..... January 15

Summer Session ..... May 1

If you do not qualify for graduation at the end of the semester for which you applied, you must submit a **Change of Graduation Date** card to the Graduation Unit. Failing to do so will place a hold on your registration for the next regular semester.

Completion of degree requirements is the student's responsibility and, therefore, each student must be thoroughly familiar with the procedures and information about graduation. If you have questions, please consult a *University Catalog* or check with the Office of the Registrar. Please

note that a master's degree requires a minimum of 21 semester units earned in residence after admission to graduate standing in the program offering the degree. Resident extension (Open University) units do not satisfy residence requirements for a degree. A maximum of 9 semester (13 quarter) units of credit at the graduate level taken in Extension may be used toward degree requirements.

## GRADUATION WITH HONORS POLICY

Effective with the 1978-79 academic year, to graduate with honors, a student must complete 36 units in residence and receive a minimum of 3.40 GPA on all units taken at CSU Dominguez Hills, with the overall GPA based on transferable undergraduate work. The honor categories are as follows:

*Cum Laude* (3.40-3.59)

*Magna Cum Laude* (3.60-3.79)

*Summa Cum Laude* (3.80-4.00)

All students graduating under the 1978-79 or earlier catalogs will be evaluated for graduation using the new criteria. If they meet the new criteria, they will be designated as graduating *cum laude*, *magna cum laude* or *summa cum laude*. If they do not meet the new criteria, they will be evaluated as graduating with honors as stipulated in earlier catalogs and, if eligible, will be designated as graduating "With Distinction" or "With Great Distinction". Students graduating under the 1978-80 catalog and subsequent catalog years will be evaluated using the new criteria only. Graduation with honors is available only to undergraduate students earning a first baccalaureate degree.

Candidates for graduation with honors will be listed in the commencement program based on grades earned through the previous fall semester. Official placement in one of the honors categories will be based on all grades earned including the final term. Therefore, it is possible to be listed as a candidate in the commencement program, but not graduate with honors after all grades have been calculated. Students who do graduate with honors will have the appropriate designation inscribed on their diplomas.

## HONORS PROGRAM

The CSU Dominguez Hills Honors Program offers special opportunities to especially able and highly motivated students. New and continuing students may participate in "Honors" sections of General Studies and advanced courses. Open only to Honors Program students, these stimulating classes enrich student learning in required courses. (See the course listing section in this schedule for current offerings, which are listed at the end of the General Studies section under "Honors Program Courses.")

Honors Program students also are eligible to arrange Honors Contracts, whereby any upper-division course may become an Honors course for the individual student. Honors Program students may apply to become Honors apprentices who receive a stipend for working on teaching or research-related projects with faculty members in their fields. Additional components of the program include advising from faculty mentors, special activities and senior thesis option.

## ID CARD

The ID card must be carried at all times and be validated each term. A current ID card is necessary to perform certain transactions in the Office of Admissions, the Office of the Registrar, the Library, the Business Office and other campus offices, and is necessary to obtain services covered by the student service fee, such as personal and career counseling, and employment and health services.

The ID card also is required by the Student Association to establish eligibility to participate in student activities and elections.

## REPEAT AND CANCEL POLICY

The Repeat and Cancel Policy has been amended effective fall semester 1986. The following procedures are applicable to all CSU Dominguez Hills students:

1. "Repeat and Cancel" may be used by students working toward a baccalaureate degree.
2. "Repeat and Cancel" may not be used by graduate/post-baccalaureate students working on master's degrees, graduate certifications, teaching credentials, or by "undeclared" graduate students, even when they might take undergraduate courses.
3. In the case of a repeated course, the subsequent grade is substituted for the earlier grade in the computation of units attempted and grade point average (GPA). The previous course grade(s) remain(s) on the record, but is annotated as being discounted from GPA calculations.
4. "Repeat and Cancel" may be used on courses taken and repeated at CSU Dominguez Hills, and other CSU campuses during summer sessions or as a CSU visitor/concurrent student.
5. "Repeat and Cancel" may be used for no more than 18 semester units taken at CSU Dominguez Hills.
6. "Repeat and Cancel" may be used only on grades of "U", "F", "D", "D+", "C."

## RETAINING CONTINUING STUDENT STATUS

### Procedure

Students may elect to be absent for one semester without losing eligibility for re-registration, subject to the following conditions:

1. A Registration Ticket will not be released to students who were scholastically disqualified following their most recent semester of attendance at CSU Dominguez Hills.
2. Students who attend another college or university during an absence from CSU Dominguez Hills must file an application for admission as a returning student and must have official transcripts of work attempted sent to the Office of Admissions. The non-refundable \$55 application fee is required.
3. Undergraduate students who graduate from CSU Dominguez Hills and wish to continue as graduate students must file a new application for admission. An application fee of \$55 is required.

## Retention of Catalog Rights

A student utilizing the continuing student status procedure will retain catalog rights. The student will be able to use the requirements of the *University Catalog* under which they were admitted.

## TITLE IX OF THE EDUCATION AMENDMENTS OF 1972

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 and the Departmental Regulation (45 CFR Part 86), promulgated thereunder, prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex in the operation of most federally assisted education programs. The affirmative action coordinator, Office of Faculty and Staff Affairs, has been assigned the administrative responsibility for reviewing such matters.

## DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

### REQUIREMENTS FOR THE BACHELOR'S DEGREE

Students seeking a baccalaureate degree from the University must complete specific requirements as determined by the Trustees of The California State University, the California Administrative Code, Title 5, and CSU Dominguez Hills.

Briefly summarized, the college-wide requirements include all of the following:

1. Completion of a minimum of 124 semester units of credit. Students earning a B.S. degree may be required to take up to 132 semester units.
2. Completion of General Studies program (52-59 semester units).
3. Satisfaction of statutory requirements in U.S. History, Constitution and American Ideals by completing courses History 101 or examination and Political Science 101 or examination.
4. Satisfaction of the Graduate Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR).
5. Satisfaction of the Entry Level Mathematics (ELM) requirement.
6. Completion of one of the following: a major and a minor, or a major in one of the designated single fields or a double major. This requirement also can be satisfied through the Areas of Concentration in Interdisciplinary Studies combined with a thematic project, a minor or another major. Specification for each field are outlined under their appropriate headings in the *University Catalog*.
7. Completion of elective courses (beyond the requirements above) to reach the total of a minimum of 124 semester units of credit.
8. The term, residence units, applies to those units earned at CSU Dominguez Hills while an officially admitted student in a degree program. Fees must be paid through the regular registration process. Residence requirements for a bachelors degree include a minimum of 30 semester units in residence

of which 24 units must be in upper division courses and 12 upper division units must be earned in residence. The maximum credit that may be taken in Extension (Open University) and used toward degree requirements is 24 semester (36 quarter) units at the undergraduate level and 9 semester (13 quarter) units at the graduate level. Resident extension units or units earned by "credit by examination" do not satisfy residence requirements for a degree.

## ACADEMIC SKILLS ASSESSMENT PLAN

The California State University (CSU) system and California State University, Dominguez Hills (CSU Dominguez Hills) recognize each student's need for adequate preparation in mathematics, English, reading and critical thinking for successful continuation and completion of his or her college education.

The CSU system requires all freshmen and those transfer students who have not completed appropriate college courses to demonstrate entry level skills in two areas: English composition and mathematics. To ensure that students who need additional work in one or more of the basic skills receive this preparation early in their college career, CSU Dominguez Hills implemented the Academic Skills Assessment Plan (ASAP) in fall, 1984, for newly admitted freshmen and transfer students. All new and returning undergraduate students, admitted fall 1986 or later must meet these requirements.

The Academic Skills Assessment Plan has three skill levels:

1. Entry Level Skills
2. Basic Skills
3. Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement

### 1. *Entry Level Skills*

The CSU requires new non-exempt and returning students to be tested in English and mathematics after they are admitted. These are not admission tests, but provide a way to determine if students are prepared for college work. A student might be exempted from one or both of the tests if he/she has scored well on other specified tests or completed appropriate courses. For a list of exemptions see the section on the English Placement Test and/or the Entry Level Math test in the catalog.

#### English Placement Test (EPT)

Non-exempt students who score below "T151" on the EPT, must enroll in ENG 099, "Basic Writing Workshop", or in IDS 006 "Intensive Writing Skills Workshop". Non-exempt students who score "T141" or lower on the EPT must enroll in ENG 088, Developmental Reading, prior to or concurrently with enrollment in ENG 099 or IDS 006. Both ENG 088 AND 099 or IDS 006 are prerequisites to ENG 110.

#### Entry Level Mathematics (ELM) Test

All new and returning non-exempt undergraduate students must take the ELM test and pass it (score = T480 or above) before enrolling in a course that satisfies the quantitative reasoning requirement of the general

education program. Non-exempt students who score below "T480" on the ELM must enroll in MAT 003 or MAT 005 (course selected upon advisement). No course(s) satisfies passage of the ELM test.

### Attempting Entry Level Skills Tests

Unless exempt, students must take the EPT and ELM no later than their first semester of attendance at CSU Dominguez Hills. (See entry describing the EPT and ELM in the Admissions section of the Catalog.) Students who are exempt will be notified when admitted. Non-exempt students who do not ATTEMPT these tests by the end of their first semester of enrollment will receive special advisement and will be required to enroll in the appropriate college preparatory English and/or mathematics courses until they have fulfilled the EPT and/or ELM requirements. Non-exempt students who have not taken the EPT by the end of two semesters will be ASAP disqualified (ref. Executive Order No. 393, V. Administrative-Academic Disqualification) and may not enroll in subsequent terms. Similarly, non-exempt students who have not taken the ELM by the end of two semesters will be ASAP disqualified (ref. Executive Order No. 393, V. Administrative-Academic Disqualification) and may not enroll in subsequent terms.

### Completing the Entry Level Skills

Students who have not completed their Entry Level requirements (ELM and college preparatory math and English courses) by the end of their second semester of enrollment at CSU Dominguez Hills will be placed on ASAP and receive special advisement. In addition, they will be required to take the appropriate college preparatory courses and may not take more than 12 units including the college preparatory courses. Within 4 semesters (total) of enrollment all students must complete their Entry Level requirements in English composition and mathematics. Students who have not completed the Entry Level requirements will be ASAP disqualified (ref. Executive Order No. 393, V. Administrative-Academic Disqualification) and will not be readmitted to CSU Dominguez Hills until they have fulfilled the requirements.

### 2. *Basic Skills*

The ASAP Basic Skills are those skills that are obtained through course work in English composition and quantitative reasoning. Course work must be passed with grade of "C" or better.

#### English Composition:

- ☑ Successful completion of ENG 110 and ENG 111 or six units of IDS 107 or any combination of ENG 110, ENG 111 and IDS 107 totalling six units or more.

or

- ☑ Equivalent transfer course(s) with a grade of "C" or better.

or

- Approved English examinations with appropriate scores (see the English department chair for information on these examinations).

#### Quantitative Reasoning:

- MAT 105 or any higher level course offered in mathematics other than MAT 107, MAT 131, and MAT 207.

or

- Mathematics courses approved for transfer credit with a grade of "C" or better (these are mathematics courses above the level of intermediate algebra taken before the student last enrolled at CSU Dominguez Hills as a continuing student).

#### Completion of the ASAP Basic Skills requirements:

Students who have not completed their Basic Skills requirements in English composition and mathematics by the end of their fourth semester (total) of enrollment at CSU Dominguez Hills will be placed on ASAP probation and receive special advisement.

Students who have not completed their Basic Skills requirements in English composition and mathematics within six semester (total) of enrollment at CSU Dominguez Hills will be ASAP disqualified (ref. Executive Order No. 393, V. Administrative-Academic Disqualification) and will not be readmitted to CSU Dominguez Hills until those requirements have been completed.

#### 3. Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR)

All students subject to degree requirements in the 1979-80 and subsequent general catalogs must demonstrate competency in writing skills as a requirement for graduation through one of the options listed under the entry for the Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement in the catalog.

#### Completion of the Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement:

Students who do not meet this requirement within two (2) semesters after completing the English Composition section of the Basic Skills requirements (or 90 semester units total, whichever comes last) will receive special advisement. In addition, they will be required to enroll in ENG 350 or another approved upper division course until they successfully complete the requirement.

#### Voluntary Testing

A test, for which a fee will be charged (Graduation Writing Examination, GWE) is available to students at regularly scheduled intervals. Students wishing to pursue this option are encouraged to take the test early in their junior year, if they are undergraduate students, or upon entrance to a graduate program if they are graduate students. Students are allowed to take the test only twice. The voluntary test is administered each semester. Information on test date and procedures for sign-up are available in the Information Center at (213) 516-3696

## ADVANCED COMPOSITION COURSES (offered by the English Department)

The English Department regularly offers two types of advanced composition courses: a general purpose advanced composition course (ENG 350), and a course designed for students capable of profiting from instruction in sophisticated techniques of prose discourse (ENG 456).

## UPPER DIVISION WRITING ADJUNCT

The Writing Adjunct (IDS 397, 2 units and IDS 398, 2 units) currently offered by the Interdisciplinary Studies Program provides individualized instruction in composition that is adjunctive to study in another subject area.

## UPPER DIVISION COURSES (offered by Departments other than English)

Some departments presently offer courses, though not solely composition courses, that stress instruction in writing, require frequent writing assignments, and provide regular response to students about their writing. Courses currently available in this category are (HIS 300) Research and Writing Skills (3), (CHE 460) Chemical Literature and Technical Report Writing (3), (SOC 300) Writing Skills in Sociology (3).

## TRANSFER CERTIFICATION

Students who have satisfied the Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement at a CSU campus prior to admission to CSU Dominguez Hills may request to waive the CSU Dominguez Hills graduation requirement. The request and an official certification that the requirement has been met should be submitted to the Coordinator of Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement at (213) 516-3649.

The voluntary (GWE) test is administered each semester. Information on test date and procedures for sign-up are available in the Information and Service Center.

For further information regarding this requirement, students should contact Dr. David Heifetz, coordinator, University Composition Committee, SCC E-173 (516-3649).

## GRADUATE STUDENTS

All graduate students entering in fall of 1983 and thereafter, are required to satisfy the Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR) in accordance with the following policy:

- Students who have made either a score of eight (8) on the Graduation Writing Examination (GWE) or at least a grade of "B-", or its equivalent, in one of the undergraduate certifying courses at CSU Dominguez Hills are adjudged to have met the graduate writing requirement. Information regarding the schedule of test administrations and the list of approved courses is available in the Information and Service Center. (Also, see above B,C, and D.)
- All students who did not meet the requirement as undergraduates, as in (1) above, must take the GWE and make a score of at least eight (8) or take one of the undergraduate certifying courses at CSU Dominguez Hills and make at least a grade of "B."

3. Students in the graduate program in English may fulfill this requirement by satisfactory performance on the Graduate Exercise administered by the departmental graduate committee.
4. Students who fail to make at least an eight (8) on GWE have the option of taking the exam a second time.
5. Students who fail twice to make a score of at least eight (8) on the GWE must take one of the undergraduate certifying courses and make at least a grade of "B" to meet the requirement.
6. Writing competency must be certified no later than the point of advancement to candidacy. Individual programs may require such certification at an earlier point in the student's program.
7. CSU Dominguez Hills will accept certification of graduate writing competence from another CSU campus.
8. Special arrangements will be made for some external degree programs. Students should consult with the program coordinator.

### ENGLISH PLACEMENT TEST - (EPT)

All students wishing to enroll in English 110 must take the English Placement Test unless they meet one of the exemptions listed in the current *University Catalog*. Verification of exemptions in the form of letters of notification or scores reported by testing agencies is required at the time of registration for the course.

Additionally, students who are bound by the EPT requirement must take the test in their first semester on campus whether they plan to take English 110 that semester or not.

**The test dates for the EPT:** The EPT is given at least once each semester and during the summer. Test dates are listed on page \_\_ of the *Class Schedule*.

### ENTRY-LEVEL MATHEMATICS (ELM)

All students who entered CSU Dominguez Hills in fall 1983 or later must demonstrate basic competence in mathematics. New freshmen must demonstrate competence by successful completion of the CSU Entry-Level Mathematics (ELM) Examination. All students who have not achieved a grade of "C" or above in an intermediate algebra course (or more advanced algebra course) prior to fall 1988 are subject both to the ELM requirement and to the fall 1988 quantitative reasoning requirement. Satisfactory performance on any of several alternate examinations may exempt students from taking this examination. For more information, contact the Office of Admissions.

Students required to take this examination should do so as soon as possible after admission. Failure to take the examination before the end of the first term may lead to probation and disqualification.

**The test dates for ELM:** The test dates for ELM: The ELM is given at least once each semester and during the summer. Test dates are listed on page \_\_ of the *Class Schedule*.

## GENERAL STUDIES

### STATUTORY REQUIREMENT

In addition to the General Studies/General Education requirements, students also must satisfy the requirements in U. S. history and government by completing the following:

HISTORY 101 or examination  
and  
POLITICAL SCIENCE 101 or examination  
or  
POLITICAL SCIENCE 312  
(State and Local Government: Organization and problems)  
or examination

### CERTIFICATION (For General Studies Only)

Accredited junior and four-year colleges may certify that all or part of the general education requirements (post 1980) have been met. Transfer students with complete certification of Title 5 requirements may not be required to complete additional lower division courses in general education. However, all transfer students are required to take three courses (9 semester units) in General Studies at CSU Dominguez Hills. Students should make sure that their transcript shows that they have a general education certification.

### CURRENT GENERAL STUDIES

The General Studies program, which is divided into three components, requires 52-59 semester units:

- 14-17 units of (A) Basic Skills
- 29-30 units of lower division General Education divided among : (B) Natural Sciences (9 units); (C) Humanities (9 units); (D) Social Sciences (9 units); (E) The Whole Person (2-3 units)
- 9 units of (F) Upper Division Integrative Studies.

In addition, students must take a course emphasizing cultural pluralism (0-3), which can satisfy General Studies or other graduation requirements as well. All students must take three upper division courses in General Studies, and all students must take three General Studies courses at CSU Dominguez Hills. The statutory requirement in American Institutions (HIS 101 or examination and POL 101 or examinations) is NOT part of the General Studies program, but is a graduation requirement.

The current General Studies program is required of all students who enter CSU Dominguez Hills or a California Community College as first-time freshmen beginning fall 1986. Continuing students (other than 1980-81, 1981-82, and 1986-87 first-time freshmen) and transfer students in continuous enrollment at a California Community College or a CSU campus since 1980-81 may have the option of choosing the former General Education program.



If you are uncertain about which program applies to you, consult your academic faculty advisor or the University Advisement Center, (213) 516-3538.

For the campus policy on "double-counting" General Studies courses in the major and minor, see page 13 of the *Class Schedule*.

The California State University System requires all students to complete nine (9) semester units in general education (General Studies at CSU Dominguez Hills) at the campus from which they graduate.

5. **Library Skills (0-2)**  
This category is optional. However, students are encouraged to strengthen their library skills. This can be accomplished by taking:

**B. Area of the Natural Sciences (9)**

## TESTING INFORMATION

### CHALLENGE EXAMINATION FOR HEA 300: "HEALTH IN PUBLIC EDUCATION"

Students wishing to take the Challenge Examination for HEA 300 on **September 12, 1991, 4-6 p.m.**, may sign up during the spring semester registration period. Petitions must be turned in to the Health Science Office by **September 10, 1991**.

Students must:

1. Register for the course.
2. Fill out a petition to take the test.
3. Earn a grade of "C" or better on exam.

*Note: The exam may be taken only once.*

### CREDIT BY EXAMINATION for English 110, 111, 350 and 352

Students wishing to earn credit by examination for English 110, English 111, English 350 or English 352 must take an examination at 10:00 a.m. on **Saturday, September 14**.

Students taking the Graduate Exercise or examinations in English 350 or 352 are asked to report to SBS B215.

Students taking examinations in English 110 and 111 are asked to report to SBS B203.

To be admitted to the testing room, each student must:

1. Register for the course.
2. Fill out a petition to take the test. Petition forms are available in the English Department Office, (HFA E-315) and must be on file in that office before noon, **Thursday, September 5, 1991**;

*and*

3. provide verification of satisfactory performance on tests or in courses. Verification in the form of letters of notification, scores reported by testing agencies, grade slips, or transcripts will be checked before the petition forms are accepted by the English Department Office.
4. Present an official picture ID such as a CSUDH Student Identification Card or a driver's license to the test administrator.

Each student petitioning to take:

**English 110** is required to have an English Placement Test (EPT) score of: T-155 and E-8 or higher. A student exempted from the EPT on the basis of a satisfactory score on the EEE, AP, SAT-Verbal, ACT, or College Board Achievement Test in English Composition with essay may attempt to earn credit by examination. (Only test scores will be used to determine the eligibility of a student.);

**English 111** must have completed English 110, or its equivalent, with a grade of "B" or better. Eligible students may challenge both English 110 and 111 at the same time.

**English 350** is required to have completed English 110 and 111 or their equivalents with an average grade of "B" or better;

English 352 must show a passing score of at least eight (8) on the graduation competency in writing examination or have successfully completed English 350, Advanced Composition, or the equivalent with a grade of "B" or better. They also must have completed English 110 and 111 or their equivalents.

Students who are unsuccessful in their attempts to earn credit by examination may remain in the class, complete the work, and be awarded credit at the end of the semester. Students who pass the challenge examination may NOT remain in the class to earn grades better than those earned on the challenge examination. They may, however, retake the course in a later semester to improve their grades.

The Alumni Association sponsors a number of activities during the year, provides scholarship assistance to students, presents Outstanding Achievement Awards annually to outstanding seniors and generally supports the University.

Today the alumni of the University number more than 24,000 and are found throughout the world. All CSU Dominguez Hills students are eligible for membership in the Alumni Association. ### ASSOCIATED STUDENTS, INC.

The Associated Students has been in existence in one form or another since 1967. During that time, they have been dedicated to furthering the educational, social, cultural and recreational welfare of the students at CSU Dominguez Hills.

In essence, the students are the Associated Students' main concern. The membership fees (activity fees paid at the beginning of each semester) constitute the yearly budget, which is expended for student-run activities that benefit students, such as intercollegiate activities, tutorials, the Child Development Center and cultural programming. Students making decisions about activities that benefit students - that's what the Associated Students is all about!

Nearly 50 student volunteers are needed yearly to fill University and Associated Students committees that make important decisions concerning the educational welfare of students. ### Student Activities

The Student Activities and Cultural Programs Commission (S.A. and C.P. ### ATHLETICS

The intercollegiate athletic program at CSU Dominguez Hills (the Toros) boasts a unique balance between men's and women's sports programs that have built a national reputation for both academic and athletic excellence. The department sponsors four men's and four women's sports that serve approximately 150 student-athletes: men's and women's basketball, men's and women's soccer, baseball, softball, men's golf and women's volleyball.

CSU Dominguez Hills competes on a national level in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division II and is a member of the California Collegiate Athletic Association, recognized nationally as the NCAA Division II "Conference of Champions."

All Toro athletic teams have garnered distinction recently by either winning conference or regional championships, competing for national championships and earning national rankings. During the 1988-89 season, five of eight sports earned a berth in the NCAA Final Four tournament, just a step away from the national championship.

A source of even greater pride that the Toro's considerable athletic achievements has been the success of the Toro student-athletes in the classroom. CSU Dominguez Hills has been represented on the GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America teams for eight consecutive years, an achievement few schools can match. Toro athletics also have produced a pair of Rhodes Scholar finalists in basketball players John Nojima and Kathy Goggin. Both Nojima and Goggin also received the prestigious Woody Hayes Scholar Athlete Awards, making CSU Dominguez Hills the first institution with two winners of the award.

Athletic facilities such as the weight room, swimming pool, tennis courts, track and all-purpose field can be made available for the use of enrolled students, faculty and staff. Students, faculty and staff are encouraged to use the facilities as long as there is no conflict with classes or other scheduled events and approved supervision is provided. ### **CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER (Casa Dominguez)**

Students, faculty or staff members with children ages 2-1/2 to 14, may be eligible to utilize the on-campus Child Development Center.

Under the auspices of the School of Education, the center is a professional school for child development. Teachers and student interns observe and assist the children in the carefully prepared indoor and outdoor activities.

Funded by a variety of sources, including Associated Students, parents are charged a sliding fee scale. All children must be toilet trained and in good health. Each is given breakfast, noon-time hot lunch and afternoon snack. The center hours are Monday through Thursday, 7:45 a.m. to 7 p.m., and Friday 7:45 a.m., to 5:00 p.m. when the University is in regular session. For further information, call (213) 327-2880.

### **DISABLED STUDENT SERVICES**

### **EOP**

The Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) is an alternate admissions program for individuals who are not eligible for regular admission directly from high school, either because of their grade point average or their SAT/ACT scores. The program also is open to community college students who have less than 56 transferrable semester units or 84 quarter units. There are both income guidelines that must be met as well as firm deadlines for applying for admissions through the EOP program.

CSU Dominguez Hills Re-admits who were formerly EOP and EOP students transferring from another CSU campus should contact the EOP office first when applying for admissions. Former CSUDH EOP students or CSU EOP transfer students going through contract registration must also go to the EOP Office to either confirm their continuing EOP status or to get a release from the EOP program. ### **EVENING SERVICES**

Evening Services are provided in the Information Center, SCC A-130, (213) 516-3696, for students, staff and faculty. On Monday through Thursday evenings, 5 to 7 p.m., the staff is available to assist students with admission information, University academic policies, after-hours support for the Office of Admissions and the Office of the Registrar and pick-up and drop-off services.

Generally, we attempt to assist evening students so that they may function with the same effectiveness and convenience as daytime students.

### **FINANCIAL AID OFFICE**

Information concerning student financial assistance may be obtained at the Financial Aid Office, SCC C-138E, phone 516-3647.

The University participates in the following financial aid programs: Pell Grant; Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (SEOG); Educational Opportunity Grants (EOP); State University Grants (SUG); Cal Grant A; Cal Grant B; the State Graduate Fellowship Program; Graduate Equity Fellowship Program; College Work Study (CWS); Perkins Loan; Stafford Loan; Supplemental Loan for Students (SLS). The Financial Aid Office also has listings of off-campus, part-time jobs.

The purpose of student financial aid is to provide appropriate financial assistance to eligible students in order to help them achieve their educational objectives. To be considered for financial assistance, students must complete the "Student Aid Application for California" (SAAC). Students should file the application (allow six weeks for processing) and complete supporting documentation on or before April 15 of the school

year in order to be considered for priority funding. SAAC application for the 1991-92 school year are currently available in the Financial Aid Office. All students who are applying for financial aid, including Stafford or SLS, must file a SAAC.

## DINING SERVICE

During regular session, Monday through Friday, Cafeteria hours are from 7:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m., and Friday, 7:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. The Cafeteria features breakfast cooked to order and fresh baked pastries until 10:30 a.m. Home-cooked lunch and dinner entrees, as well as full salad bar, grill, mexican food, desserts and an exhibition cooking station are available from 11:00 a.m. - 1:30 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. - 7:00 p.m.

### The Pub

The Bullseye Cantina is open from 11 a.m. - 9 p.m., Monday - Thursday.

### Vending Machines

Food vending machines are located outside of the first floor of the Educational Resources Center (ERC) building, Social and Behavioral Sciences (SBS) building and across from the Cafeteria at the front of campus.

## HEALTH CENTER

All regularly enrolled students can benefit from many services offered by the Health Center. Not only is care provided for illness and injury, but doctors, nurses and lab technicians do screening tests including those for diabetes, hypertension, anemia, pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. The Center stresses the "health and wellness" concept and assists students by providing health care consultations in such areas as nutrition, birth control counseling and weight control.

The Center offers immunizations against measles and Rubella, which are easily prevented and are considered to be serious diseases for college age populations. The CSU system requires all new students born after January 1, 1957 to either submit proof of immunity to measles and rubella or to be immunized against these diseases. Students can get a combined measles/rubella vaccination free of charge at the Student Health Center.

The Center also features a licensed pharmacy where students may get prescriptions filled and purchase over-the-counter items as well. Costs are much lower than at private pharmacies and students are invited to consult with the pharmacist. X-ray services are also available.

Also offered are health education seminars on various health concerns, as appropriate, and referrals to community resources.

Located in the building north of the University Theater, the Center is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday, Tuesday and Friday and from 8:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday.

## HOUSING

### On-Campus Housing

Living on campus makes university life more fulfilling and interesting. The convenience and reasonable fees are yet other reasons for living in the student apartments. Furnished one- and two-bedroom units are offered and unlike traditional residence halls, they include full-size kitchens. As there are a limited number of units available, apply as soon as possible. ## INFORMATION CENTER

The Information Center, located in SCC A130, at the front of the campus, assists the campus population, prospective University applicants, and community members by providing essential, centralized information on campus resources, activities and programs. The Center also makes appropriate referrals to other campus units. Brochures, maps, directories and other materials are available to students and visitors.

Center functions include handling all application requests, providing information on admission policies and procedures, giving preadmission advising, maintaining a centralized calendar of campus activities, conducting tours and answering questions regarding fees, refund policies, withdrawal deadlines and other general academic policies. The Center's hours are: Monday - Thursday, 8 a.m. - 7 p.m.; Friday, 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. the telephone number is (213) 516-3696. Evening Services also are located in the center.

## LEARNING ASSISTANCE CENTER

The Learning Assistance Center offers a broad range of support services to students to include tutoring and assistance with study skills (listening/notetaking; exam preparation; reading development, vocabulary and computation skills development).

Other support assistance includes review sessions for students who are preparing for the following tests: CBEST, GWE, ELM. The NovaNET Computer system offers 7,000 hours of computer assisted instruction in mathematics, English grammar/usage, reading, business subjects and other subject areas. Students can use the NovaNET system to enhance and expand their understanding of classroom subjects and prep for the CBEST, GWE, ELM, GRE, GMAT, LSAT, MAT.

### OFFICE OF ACTIVITIES (AND TEMPORARY UNION)

The Office of Activities (and Temporary Union) is located in the north and west wings of the Commons. The staff is dedicated to providing a rich, multi-faceted schedule of events throughout the year.

The Office of Activities (and Temporary Union) has been designed as a place where students, faculty and staff can meet together between classes. It offers an activity lounge, meeting room, television-viewing area, activity game area (with pool tables, ping pong, electronic and table games), The Dominguez Express (a mini do-it-yourself postal service) and a Service Desk, which provides information on campus-wide student activities and a check-out service for games and other equipment. The Office of Activities (and Temporary Union) is located in the Commons (CSA) A-140; telephone (213) 516-3559.

### PARKING

All vehicles which park on campus must display a valid parking permit (Section 21113a CVC). Semester permits are purchased at the university Cashier's Office (SCC B135). Daily parking permits are purchased from the dispensing machines located at: Lot 1, Information Booth, Lot 3a, Lot 3, and Lot 4. Vehicles are to park head-in, using marked stalls only.

Daily parking permits must be displayed on the dashboard. Semester parking permits are displayed inside the front windshield on the driver's side. Permits must be in plain sight at all times (car covers are not recommended).

Motorcycles and scooters have special areas for parking. They are located at: Southwest corner of Lot 2, southeast corner of Lot 3, and northwest corner of Lot 4. There are also motorcycle parking areas in Lot 5 at Student Housing.

Visitor parking areas are located in front of Small College, outside of Lot 3a on the perimeter road, and the Gymnasium Lot. These stalls are free for 30 minutes.\* (\*Overtime parking may be granted by calling the University Police at x3639.)

Loading zone areas are located adjacent to major campus buildings. No permit is required for 30 minutes or less.\*

(\*Overtime parking may be granted by calling the University Police at x 3639 or by securing a permit from the department's front desk.)

Those who receive parking citations are reminded that pursuant to sections 40202 and 40500 CVC, these citations **cannot be cancelled or rescinded by the University Police.** Should there be a significant error on the part of an officer or campus official, the issuing officer will request the court to rescind the citation. Failure to resolve a parking citation will result in difficulty with renewing the vehicle's registration.

### OLDER ADULT CENTER

### TAKE II: The Program for Adult Learners

## SERENITY CENTER

## STUDENT ESCORT SERVICE

Under the direction of the Department of Public Safety, student assistants are employed to escort the University community to their parked vehicles during the evening hours. The service is available Monday through Thursday evening from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m. People wishing to use this service should phone ext. 3639. The student assistants wear distinctive yellow jackets identifying them as "Student Patrol."

## STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

### Counseling Groups

Personal counseling is offered individually and in groups. Some of the groups and workshops that may be offered this semester include:

- ☑ *Adult Children of Alcoholics*: A therapy group for students who grew up with alcoholic parents.
- ☑ *Latina!*: A group focusing on identifying cultural strengths and/or weaknesses that enhance or undermine the goals of Latinas.
- ☑ *"Do the Right Thing"*: A support group for African-American men that focuses on discussing feelings and experiences which especially involve campus culture, racism and cultural awareness.
- ☑ *Men's Support Group and Women's Support Group*: A supportive environment for sharing feelings and discussing issues that affect men and women students respectively.
- ☑ *Personal Awareness*: This group provides participants with opportunities to improve their quality of life as well as to deal with specific interpersonal and intra-personal problems.

### Services for Adult Learners

Your needs are special ones and we have special services to meet those needs. The main purpose of the program is to introduce adult learners to the system on campus—to show you how it works, to encourage you to make it work.

Initially, adult learners draw support from the program and then ease away from it as their own confidence in dealing with the campus structure increases. The office is located in SCC C-128.

## Career Development and Employment Services Workshops

- ▣ *Campus Interview Preparation:* A brief explanation of the interview program, mandatory for all students wishing to be interviewed on campus.
- ▣ *Resume Preparation:* A two-hour workshop designed to assist students in preparing and updating their resumes.
- ▣ *Interview Skills (Part I):* How to prepare for an effective employment interview.

- ▣ *Graduate School:* Discusses the motivations for graduate study, explores the preparation, selection and application processes; also covers getting ready to go, tips on making the transfer, graduate school expectations, and answers to general questions about graduate study.

## STUDENT PROGRAMS

Involvement in campus life gives students an opportunity to balance academic work with a variety of co-curricular activities that contribute to personal growth. Students who are involved in the campus community generally are better informed and prepared for success in their careers following graduation.

Student Programs is concerned with the personal development of students through participation in campus organizations and activities out of the classroom.

Nearly 50 student clubs, honor/service societies and Greek organizations are in existence on the campus, and many students at CSU Dominguez Hills belong to a campus organization because it increases the value of student life. The numbers and types of student organizations vary with each year.

Student organizations include cultural clubs, departmental-professional clubs, fraternities and sororities, honor/service societies, recreational and sports clubs, religious clubs, service clubs and special interest clubs. Many of these organizations have local, state and/or national affiliations.

In addition, there are over thirty campus and statewide committees that have student members. Students are urged to apply for nomination or selection to these committees.

Student Programs is responsible for new student orientation and provides personal advising with respect to campus activities.

Working with the Activities Office (and temporary Union), Student Programs schedules all student programs on the campus, including all union programming.

The Office is also responsible for the supervision of Disabled Student Services, the Women's Center, the Activities Office (and temporary Union), the Office of Housing, Veterans' Affairs and the Serenity Center, the campus program on Alcohol and Other Drug Education and Prevention, and serves as a liaison to the Associated Students.

To provide the campus with comprehensive and useful information, the Office of Student Programs offers several publications, including *Campus Publicity and Posting Regulations*, *The Student Organizations' Directory*, *The Club Handbook*, *The Policies and Procedures Guidelines for Fraternities and Sororities* and *Campus Scheduling Policies*. ## VETERANS' AFFAIRS

The Office of Veterans' Affairs provides a variety of services and programs to assist veterans and veterans' dependents in reaching their educational and career goals. ## WOMEN'S CENTER

The center has a number of resources for women and men, a growing collection of books, periodicals, magazines, newsletters and journals; works by, for and about women, women's issues and the women's movement; resource files, bulletin boards with up coming events, news items and interesting information about women throughout the world.

The center also maintains references that include information on civil and legal rights, divorce procedures, the filing of discrimination complaints, medical and counseling services, and many other practical concerns. The Women's Center staff is available to assist women and men in using these materials and in locating services and information. Students may obtain academic credit as Women's Center interns through selected programs.

## CAMPUS SMOKING POLICY (PM 91-01)

California State University Dominguez Hills has a responsibility to its students and employees to provide a safe and healthful learning and working environment. The University recognizes the harmful effects of involuntary contact with smoke. It also recognizes the need to preserve the reasonable individual rights of smokers as long as doing so does not interfere with the right of the non-smoker to a smoke-free environment.

The following policy shall be effective August 15, 1991:

1. Smoking is prohibited in all campus buildings; including offices, work areas, classrooms, lecture halls, laboratories, libraries, theatres, practice rooms, listening rooms, gymnasiums, the Student Union, meeting rooms, lobbies, lounges, supply rooms, kitchens, hallways, stairwells, elevators, eating areas, and restrooms. Certain areas external to buildings which do not have adequate ventilation (e.g. patios, stairways and walkways) may also be designated as non-smoking areas by the Director of Environmental Health and Safety.
2. Smoking is also prohibited in all State automobiles, vans and trucks.

3. Exceptions include: designated smoking areas in the cafeteria and other buildings as determined by the Director of Environmental Health and Safety, Student Housing (which shall be governed by its own policy), and the Velodrome (which shall be governed by the Velodrome Governing Board).
4. When artistically required, smoking is permitted as part of a university-sponsored theatre or dance performance/rehearsal.

Effective implementation of this policy depends upon all members of the University community acting with common courtesy and sensitivity to others. Members of the campus community who willfully violate the University smoking policy will be subject to disciplinary action through recognized administrative channels and/or in accord with the applicable collective bargaining agreement. Alleged violations of this policy should be reported through the appropriate complaint procedure. There shall be no reprisals against anyone seeking assistance in enforcing this policy. For information regarding the appropriate procedure, please contact the following: for faculty, the Associate Vice President for Faculty Affairs; for students, the Vice President for Student Affairs; and for staff, the Director of Personnel.

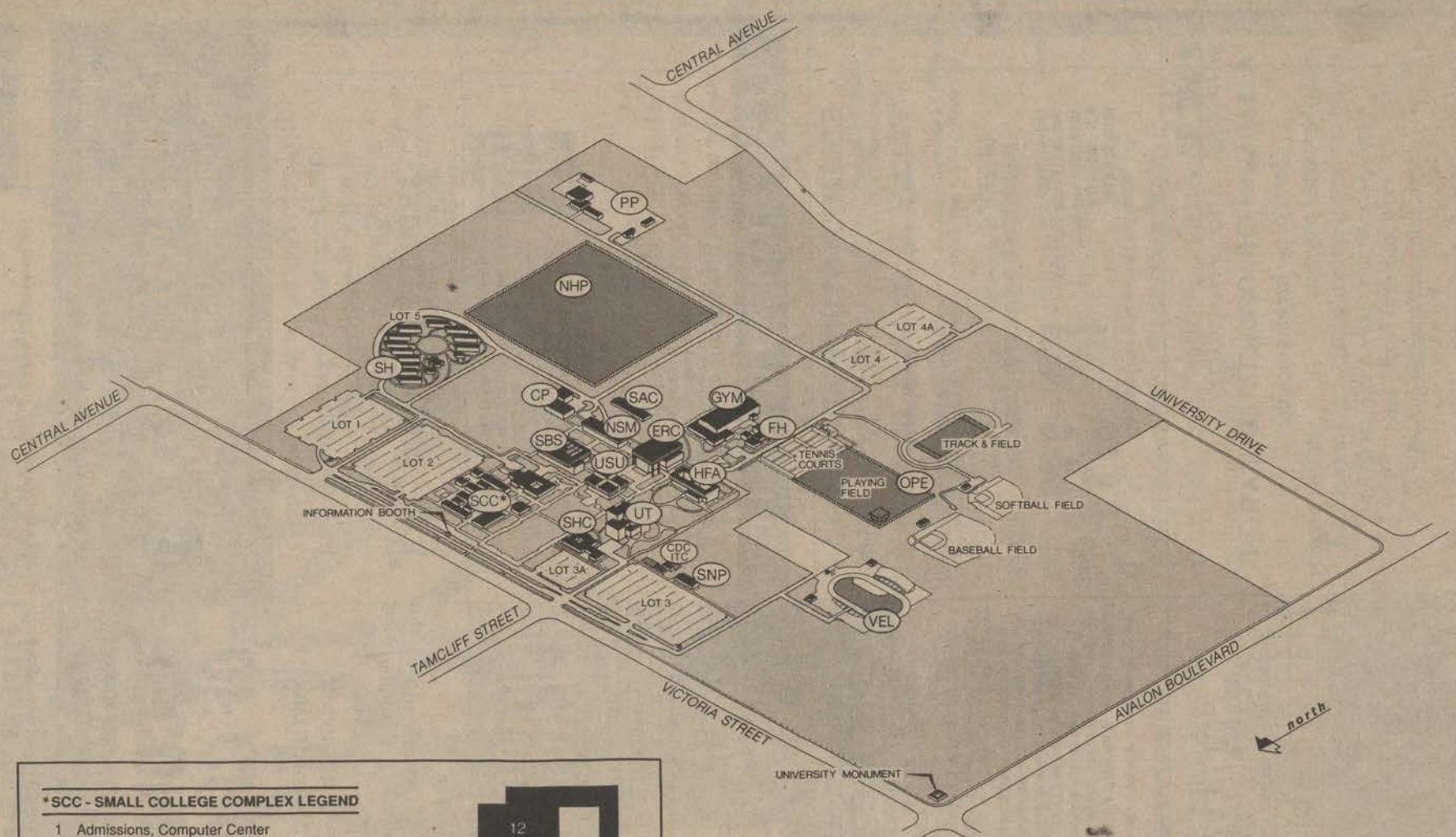

Special English requirements

- 71 Students must have taken the CSU English Placement Test. Students with EPT scores designated by the Chancellor's Office as indicating eligibility in the Intensive Learning Experience Program must enroll in ENG 088.
- 72 Special section for students in the Intensive Learning Experience program. EPT scores must be between 120 and 141 inclusive.
- 73 Students must have taken the CSU English Placement Test.
- 74 All students must meet the prerequisites: passing score on the competency in writing requirement (GWE) or English 350 or other courses listed in the University catalog; also English 110 and 111 or their equivalents. Written verification (transcripts/score reports, etc.) is required at registration.
- 75 Prerequisite: All students must have taken the EPT before they can be enrolled in English 110. In addition, students must score a T-151 or above on the EPT, meet one of the exceptions, or have successfully completed ENG 099 and/or 088 as needed. Please present score reports or grade slips, whichever is applicable, at registration.
- 76 Prerequisite: completion of ENG 110 or equivalent. Written verification (grade slip, transcript, evaluation form) must be presented to the instructor at the first class meeting.
- 77 Completion of lower division composition requirement required. Written verification (grade slip, transcript) must be presented to the instructor at the first class meeting.
- 78 Prerequisite: Completion of ENG 111 or equivalent.

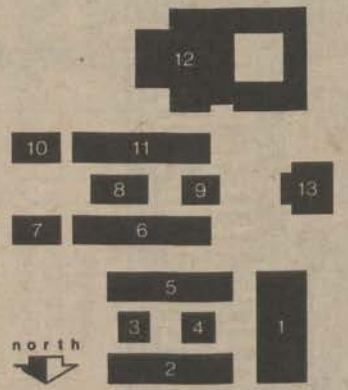

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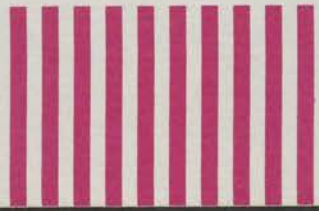
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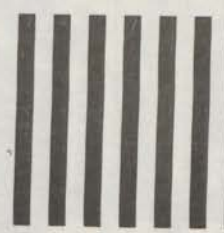
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
