What is a CV?

# A CV documents your professional path

CV = curriculum vitae, which translates to mean “course of one’s life”

A good CV should show:

- The education
- The training
- The experience
- The accomplishment

That make you a good candidate for the opportunity

# Most school / job applications will include

- A written document
  - Personal statement
  - Statement of purpose and / or
  - Cover letter
- CV or résumé
- Letter of recommendations / references (sometimes)
- College transcripts (sometimes)

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Aspect	CV	Résumé
Length	Unlimited (within reason)	1 page

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Audience	Other academics (e.g., other researchers in your field)	Hiring managers for jobs

# Sections of a CV

(for someone at your career stage)

- Basic Personal Details - email, phone #, website
- Education - undergrad + community college
- Research Experience
- Other Experience
- Grants & Fellowships - travel or supplies grants count  
- McNair, LS-AMP, RISE, OVR
- Publications - peer-reviewed publications
- Presentations - SRC @ DH or national, SACNAS, ABRCMS  
(both posters + oral)
- Skills & Qualifications  
↳ lab skills, languages, computational skills → graphic design

# What should I include in my CV?

Details on my community college education?	Depends. Yes if you graduated. If you didn't, your choice.
A list of relevant coursework?	Do not do it, instead list your skills
Activities that I did only during high school?	Typically no. Exceptions - if you are early in your time at DH - or - really meaningful experience
Work experience I have that is not academic (e.g., retail, restaurant)?	Include it.
Non-work experience that I have that is not academic (e.g., church volunteering, student groups on campus, sports)?	Include it.
Presentations / reports I wrote for class?	Almost never include.

What makes a CV good?

# I found 10 CVs online (non-DH students)

- On average, people only look at a CV for ~30 seconds
- I am going to give you 5 minutes to look at all 10
- As you look, identify aspects of the CV that work well
- As you look, identify aspects of the CV that don't work well

# CV: Do & Don'ts

## Things that worked well

- using bold (or underline) to direct the reader's eye
- providing detail
- no grammar or spelling issues

## Things that did not

- different font styles
- too much color
- having too much blank space
- being too crowded
