
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Visit the new

Extended Education Building

In early 2000, California State University, Dominguez Hills will open the Extended Education building, a brand new, state-of-the-art instructional facility.

The building, located near the intersection of Victoria and Avalon, northeast of the Olympic Velodrome, will serve campus and community groups as a location for new credit and non-credit instructional programs offered by the Division of Extended Education.



Spurred by the fast-growing demand for new Extended Education programs, the 25,000 square foot facility will feature 10 classrooms, each with the newest available classroom technology, a large lecture facility; conference space and offices. Students will be able to register and take classes all in the same complex, and nearby parking is available. Designed by the award-winning architectural firm of Dougherty & Dougherty, the structure is financed entirely through revenues from Extended Education programs. No taxpayer dollars have been expended in construction of the building.



The Hope Scholarship Tax Credit

The Hope Scholarship tax credit is available only to students in their first two years of postsecondary education who are enrolled at least half-time in an eligible program. The tax credits are based on the amount of qualified tuition and fees, less grants and other tax-free educational assistance and the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income.

Hope credits apply to fees paid after December 31, 1997.

The Lifetime Learning Tax Credit

The Lifetime Learning tax credit is available to students at all educational and enrollment levels who are enrolled at an eligible educational institution. As with the Hope Scholarship tax credit, this opportunity is based on the amount of qualified tuition and fees, less grants and other tax-free educational assistance and the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income.

The Lifetime Learning credit applies to fees paid after June 30, 1998.

To earn the revised P&IC Certificate students will continue to complete five courses (15 credit units):

PIX 319 Basics of Supply Chain Management (formerly Introduction to Materials Management) and four courses chosen from:

PIX 320 Inventory Management (formerly Inventory Management & Master Planning)

PIX 321 Material and Capacity Requirements Planning (formerly Material Requirements Planning & Purchasing)

PIX 322 Production Activity Control and Constraints Management (formerly Capacity & Priority Management)

PIX 324 Just-In-Time/Total Quality Management (formerly Just-In-Time/Total Quality Control) and the two new courses

*PIX 325 Master Planning and PIX 326 Manufacturing Management Systems and Technology

*These two new courses will be offered only on the Internet

The new Certificate format will allow students the flexibility to complete the Certificate as it existed prior to January 1998 (PIX 319, 320, 321, 322, and 324) or choose courses which better fit individual career interests and job-site requirements. In addition to leading to the well-known and Industry respected CSUDH Production and Inventory Control Certificate, the courses continue to be excellent preparation for students studying to take their CPIM certification exams.

Students must also achieve a minimum total grade point average (GPA) of 2.3 or better. The courses are offered during three 13-week trimesters. Students may enter the program at the beginning of any trimester.

Who Should Enroll

The Certificate program in Production and Inventory Control is designed for those who wish to gain a broad education in the principles of supply chain management as well as assist Production and Inventory Control professionals planning on qualifying for CPIM certification.

The Cost

The tuition fee for a three-unit course taken on the CSUDH campus is \$405. (If taken over television-away from campus, there will be an additional fee of \$90). The tuition for courses taken over the Internet is \$450 per class. The Program

Students who have completed the LAPICS program at California State University, Dominguez Hills, are invited to apply the credits earned to a bachelor's degree program as part of a unique program entitled Special Major. Through this program, students can integrate their studies in Production and Inventory Control with at least two other disciplines to obtain the degree. Working with an advisory committee, participants design a path that best suits their individual and career objectives. Working adults and their employers will appreciate the career-specific approach of this innovative course of study.

Getting Started

Students should contact the Director of University Advisement approximately six months prior to the beginning of the semester they wish to enter California State University, Dominguez Hills. The Director will assist the student in contacting an appropriate program advisor, who will help the student apply for admittance, prepare the required program proposal and assemble the student's program advisory committee. Contact: Director, University Advisement Center. California State University, Dominguez Hills, 1000 East Victoria Street, Carson, CA 90747, (310) 243-3538.

University Admission

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Formal admittance to the University is not required for participation in the LAPICS Certificate program, but is required for participation in the balance of the Bachelor's Degree

Program. All students are required to pay extension tuition for LAPICS courses. Students desiring to enter the University to earn a Special Major BA must follow standard University application procedures as outlined in the University Catalog

Special Major Bachelor of Arts

The Special Major Bachelor of Arts degree requires the completion of 124 semester hours including both lower and upper division course work. Participating students must complete all general studies program requirements (52-59 semester units) and integrate at least one other discipline outside of the School of Management with the LAPICS units to achieve a total of 24 units of upper division credit to complete the Special Major. Students must also complete an acceptable University minor. Other graduation requirements are listed in the general University Catalog.

Important Academic Information

A student working towards the Special Major LAPICS degree is subject to university-wide policy relative to admission, scholastic standards and graduation requirements (please refer to the University Catalog). A maximum of 24 semester units through extension, correspondence and the United States Armed Forces Institute may be accepted toward a bachelor's degree. Each LAPICS course successfully completed counts as 3 of the 24 acceptable units.

Residence Requirements

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A minimum of 30 semester units (of which 24 must be upper division units) must be completed in residence at CSU Dominguez Hills. This does not include the credits earned as part of the LAPICS certificate program because credits earned through extension are not considered residence credit. Please see the University Catalog for other residence and transfer credit requirements.

The Advisory Committee

Each Special Major student has a specially-appointed Faculty advisory Committee. The committee works with and gives special attention to the student. In addition to the LAPICS advisor, each student has faculty advisors over each area of concentration and in their minor.

The Special Major

The minimum requirement for the Special Major is 24 semester units of approved upper division work. The credit hours earned while completing the Production and Inventory Control Certificate serve as the foundation for the Special Major. The remaining upper division credit hours, in consultation with the student's advisory committee, should be chosen from at least one other department outside the School of Management. Although not limited to these fields, possible areas of upper division course work might include:

Labor studies, computer science, communication, health care/medical technology, statistics, Chicano/a studies, Spanish, sociology/anthropology, adult education, applied studies (industrial technology—in development), and public relations.

Students should remember that proposed upper division course work may have prerequisites that must be met prior to enrolling in class. Please check the University Catalog for further information.

CERTIFICATE AWARD IN PROFESSIONAL SUPERVISION

Offered in Summer, 2000

Who Should Attend

This series is especially designed for men and women in first-line supervisory positions in production and service industries who want to improve their supervisory skills and achieve greater job effectiveness and satisfaction.

The Certificate

Each course in Professional Supervision meets two evenings per week, a total of five hours. Enrollment is accepted on an individual basis, and a **certificate of achievement is awarded upon the completion of any six courses**, which can be completed in four month's time. Individual courses may be attended. All courses award Continuing Education Units (CEUs).

The Courses BUX 973 Success Skills in Supervising Cultural Diversity .5 CEUs

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Each participant will learn to: understand cultural diversity as a positive difference in age, languages, gender or ethnic backgrounds and learn to avoid stereotyping strangers by giving everyone an opportunity to contribute to the work effort. Learn to recognize diversity of cultures as a source of new skills, valid perspectives and performance. Overcome preconceived opinions and bias that limit opportunities for full employee's team participation. Learn to recognize and avoid assumptions, cultural symbols. slang, acronyms, and non-verbal signals which act as barriers to communication. Also, learn to perform employee selection, work assignments, coaching, training, communicating, motivating, appraisal with a sensitivity to the impact of cultural diversity.

BUX 974 Delegation Techniques & Strategies

.5 CEUs

Learn techniques to share responsibility, assign authority and extract commitment for improved performance. Reduce the barriers to delegation. Develop accountability through improved personal organization, setting priorities and communicating for measurable results. Recognize characteristics for improved group actions and individual performances.

Participate in a lively workshop to practice delegation skills.

BUX 975 Intro to the Role of Supervision .5 CEUs

Transition skills for a successful career in management are covered. Learn how to identify and meet the needs of your employees. Recognize six specific responsibilities: to organize, plan, communicate, control, train and motivate. Recognize how to avoid the mistakes made by most supervisors, and learn to give clearly understood, complete work assignments. Enjoy effective transition into supervision. Learn how to successfully exchange the realities for the myths of supervision.

BUX 976 Communication & Listening Skills Workshop .5 CEUs

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This course provides detailed ideas for communication skills required by the supervisor. Learn how to give meaningful work assignments. Listening skills will enable you to be more helpful to others and build personal confidence. Recognize communication filters, temperament clues, verbal and nonverbal skills. Review list of effective techniques including questioning strategies for improved interviewing. This workshop will help you write work objectives and conduct dialogue to gain subordinate commitment to clearly stated work assignments.

BUX 977 Team-Building Concepts & Strategies .5 CEUs

Learn to recognize elements that create team effort and develop characteristics of effective team action. Create a climate for positive team participation and design an environment for creative team decisions. Analyze workshop team leadership profiles, and apply individual team-building skills balance sheets. Separate myth from reality in a team-building scenario. Learn to recognize specific characteristics of effective team actions.

BUX 978 Coping with Stress & Reducing Organizational Conflict .5 CEUS

Recognize work stressors and how to cope with stress on the job. Be aware of both negative and positive ways of responding to stress. The strengths of the formal and informal organization, the application of actions that put motion into motivation and the "self-fulfilling prophecy" concept will be discussed. Traditional vs. emergency concepts, specific productivity "empowerment" of employees and teams, and the development of personal skills in creating a self-motivating work environment will be consid-

BUX 985 Time Management Strategies Workshop .5 CEUs

Identify time-wasters and how to avoid them, apply strategies for setting goals and assigning priorities. Recognize ideas on accomplishing the vital few versus the many trivial tasks. Consider key organizational and delegation skills to improve the use of time. Apply the blocking concept to plan time effectively. Complete evaluation instruments to self-test and self-score individual time effectiveness. Case study analysis of real situations in time management. Handle, reduce and manage interrup tions and improve team building between management and

BUX 994 Conducting Effective Employee Interviews .5 CEUs

Each participant will learn how to conduct seven types of employee interviews and also learn to match the employee to the right job by an employment interview. The coaching interview will inspire participants to become more career-oriented, while the counseling interview will help participants solve productivity problems. Meaningful feedback will be provided in the appraisal interview, changes in behavior can be effected in the discipline interview, and valuable improvement information can be gleaned from exit interviews. Interviewing focus, documentation, force-field analysis, listening skills and flexibility will also be covered.

BUX 995 Legal Aspects of Supervisory Actions -Legal I .5 CEUs

Learn to understand legal aspects such as federal and state laws covering protected classes, current immigration laws regarding employment, what to say and what to avoid saying in an employment interview, including legal and illegal pre-employment questions. Proper structure of a correct job ad, employee requisition and how to use the job description and application form in the employment interview will also be covered.

BUX 986 Legal Aspects of Supervisory Actions -Legal II .5 CEUs



CERTIFICATE IN TECHNICAL WRITING

The Program

The Technical Writing Certificate Program introduces students to the many aspects of contemporary technical writing practice and helps them develop the skills and confidence to communicate complex technical concepts effectively.

The Certificate

A certificate is awarded upon the completion of all eight courses. All courses provide Continuing Education Units (CEUs). Courses may be taken individually by those not wishing to earn a certificate. A Certificate reflecting 14.4 Continuing Education Units is awarded upon successful completion of the program.

Who Should Enroll

Career opportunities are available in every industry: financial, industrial, construction, electronics, nuclear, automotive, medical, computer, international business, agricultural, aerospace and petrochemical, to name a few. Engineers, scientists, and businessmen everywhere understand that they can improve effectiveness and boost productivity through improved writing ability.

BUX 900-01 Presentation Skills

1.5 CEUs

This course helps students to increase their confidence and proficiency in structure and delivery of presentation, whether one-onone or before an audience. Participants will experience the current impact of individual voice production, body energy and word choice. They will acquire skills they can implement at once to make their voice stronger, their body language more effective and their verbal presentation more powerful.

BUX 905 Writing Technical Instructions

1.5 CEUs

Participants will learn how to apply the Technical Writing principles to the writing of simple procedures. Discussions cover presentation, grammar, syntax, punctuation, and sentence structure as well as proper use of mood and voice in writing step-by-step procedures. Chapters in the textbook are assigned for reading, and for participants to interactively question and share ideas in class.

BUX 927 Fundamentals of Technical Writing 2.7 CEUs

Before one can practice technical writing, one must know what it is, how it works, why people write it, and who reads it. This introductory course examines the basic requirements of technical style and organization as used in reports, proposals and presentations. Students learn and practice how to pack extensive information into few words without sacrificing readability in their writing. Individually and in groups, students study their own technique to improve conciseness and clarity. The class explores the varieties of technical writing and the requirements of the various audiences for each of them. Finally, students may make a technical presentation to the class on a topic of their own choosing.

BUX 931 Information Design

2.7 CEUs

Students will learn about the principles of information management, design and presentation and be able to apply them to the design of print and online documents as well as multimedia presentations.

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BUX 932 People Skills for Technical Writers

1.5 CEUs

Technical writers work with people as well as words. This course prepares students for interactions with prospective consumers of technical writing, with technical experts, and with audiences. Students practice and workshop with each other on meeting the needs of all three groups. Participants learn to listen and ask questions so as to correctly interpret the needs of business and industry customers, to present technical information in an engaging and clear way, and to translate technical talk into comprehensible, everyday language.

BUX 948 Proposal Preparation & Writing

The marketplace is lean and mean, and companies cannot afford proposals that fail. Students learn the importance of effective proposal writing in the business. They learn what every proposal must have. They acquire writing skills that demonstrate their understanding of the sales tone in proposals. Hands-on exercises guide them in writing resumes, project descriptions, and persuasive arguments, turning narrative into graphics, and judging whether a proposal responds to client expectations.

BUX 949 Graphics for Technical Writing

1.5 CEUs

Graphic design and visual communication principles are essential in producing effective technical publications. The Certificate Program in Telecommunications at California State University, Dominguez Hills is designed for those already making their mark within the industry who want to move into supervisory or management positions. The curriculum enhances your own knowledge and expertise by following the trends--it is virtually a living program which advances along with current technology so you won't be left behind.

Courses are scheduled at times and locations that take into account the needs of working adults. Whenever possible, the Certificate Program in Telecommunications courses will be delivered to work sites using telecommunications technology, taking in account the needs of working adults. 



CSUDH offers a three-course Certificate in Community College Teaching for those who would like to explore the option of a career teaching in a community college.

The Certificate

The certificate program is designed to enhance the skills, and thereby the employability, of the potential community college instructor. Students must either be enrolled in a graduate program, possess a master's degree in a subject area taught at the community college level, or be currently employed as an instructor in a community college.

This Certificate Program will prepare individuals to fully understand and implement these state and federal mandates.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND

Educational administrators. teachers, and anyone who has the desire or professional need to lcarn the federal and state requirements for serving the disabled within their organizations, including:

To enter the teaching profession, you must maintain a GPA of 3.0 or better throughout the program, pass the CBEST and related content area examinations, and complete the requirements for either a preliminary or professional clear credential. Course fees are \$195 per unit, which includes application for admission, the costs of all books and materials, two semesters of parking fees and one administration of the California Basic Educational Skills Test (CBEST), and either the Multiple Subject Assessment for Teachers (MSAT) and RICA, the written exam for competency in teaching reading for elementary teachers or the Single Subject Assessment for Teachers (SSAT/PRAXIS).

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Multiple Subject Credential: Cross-Cultural, Language & Academic Development (CLAD) Emphasis

The Credential

Designed for the Emergency or Internship credentialed, fulltime teacher who is assigned to a regular classroom in the Los Angeles Unified, Long Beach Unified, Compton Unified, Hawthorne or Lennox School Districts, as well as other school districts and private schools within the university service area (south of the Santa Monica Freeway). The Multiple Subject CLAD credential authorizes the holder to teach all subjects in a self-contained classroom (usually K-6) which includes students for whom English is a second language. The program requires a minimum of three semesters to complete.

Administrative Services Credential

The Program

Designed to prepare educators for leadership positions in elementary and secondary schools and certain district level positions. The program is comprised of two tiers. The first tier, the Preliminary Administrative Services
Credential, authorizes service in positions serving grades K-12 and is valid for a period of five years from date of issuance or three years from date of initial employment as an administrator, whichever is later. This credential is not renewable.

The second tier, the Professional Administrative Services
Credential, which also authorizes service in grades K-12, is valid for a period of five years and is renewable. A valid Preliminary Administrative Services Credential is required for admission to the second tier (Professional Administrative Services Credential program).

Before the candidate is permitted to undertake the fieldwork portion of the program and before the Professional Administrative Services Credential can be granted, the candidate must be employed in a position requiring a a valid Administrative Services Credential. Every effort is made to integrate credential and master's degree program for the benefit of the students.

Preliminary Credential (34 units)

This program is a competency based program for the schools, particularly elementary, junior and senior high school principals and vice-principals, and certain district level positions. Students should consult with their advisors concerning the second level of training which is additional training beyond the first level described below.

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Master of Arts in Education: Physical Education, Administration Option

This is a new graduate program for physical education teachers who are interested in furthering their education and professional development.

Graduates of this program will receive a Master of Arts in Education with an emphasis in Physical Education Administration. The Physical **Education Administration option** is designed to provide advanced studies in physical education, as well as knowledge and understanding of the basic foundations and theories of educational administration. The curriculum objectives promote a blending of theory and practice to assist students who seek advancement within their chosen field in education, public service, or the private sector. Graduates from this program will meet requirements necessary for teaching physical education at the community college level, as well as meeting requirements for various school administrative positions.

The Master of Arts in Education, Physical Education Administration Option is structured as a differential tuition program, with graduates completing a total of 30 units. Students will complete 18 units (graduate education curriculum) under state support and 12 units (physical education courses) through Special Sessions. Students will be enrolled as regular university students for the extent of the program, but will pay the current Special Sessions fees for the 12 physical education units.

THE AMERICAN LANGUAGE & **CULTURE PROGRAM**

ENGLISH LANGUAGE COURSES FOR

BEGINNING, INTERMEDIATE AND ADVANCED INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

The American Language and Culture Program at California State University, Dominguez Hills has courses for international students, business people and new residents who wish to improve their English language skills. Maximum enrollment in most classes is 15 students to ensure sufficient student practice and attention from the teacher.

Work-Site Programs (WSP)

ALCP can offer English language and culture programs at the work-site for non-native speakers of English. Programs can be developed for a wide range of work needs: on-the-line employees who need basic communication skills and orientation to an Englishspeaking work environment; executives who need high-level communication skills to negotiate business and operate in social environments or other special situations. English-for-Special-Purposes (ESP) programs are often offered in industries such as hospitality, tourism and travel, import/export, banking and manufacturing. ESP programs can include safety English, industryspecific terminology and jargon, company-specific terminology and jargon, writing skills (forms, memos, reports), oral communication/pronunciation, asking questions, giving/receiving directions, clarifying, expressing opinions, and expressing safety concepts.

Intensive English Program (IEP)

ALCP offers an eight-week intensive English language program six times a year for students with academic or professional goals, including passing the TOEFL for entrance into an American university. The 20-hour per week IEP (9am-1pm daily) offers a coordinated program of conversation. grammar, writing, reading/vocabulary, pronunciation and listening. Students from all over the world enroll in this multi-level program and can continue to improve their skills by advancing from session to session. Qualified students from outside the U.S. are eligible for a student visa. Individual courses may also be taken. A certificate of achievement is awarded after successful completion of at least one session. Language skills studied are:

Listening & Conversation This class offers extensive individual student practice in both speaking and listening. Students learn to use authentic language in situations related to work, school, leisure and social life. Classroom assignments utilize pair work, small-group discussions and information-sharing activities. Face-to-face discussions simulate real-life social interaction, encouraging the use of eye contact and accurate intonation. Furthermore, each student is given the opportunity to participate in a variety of in-class activities using tapes, videos, and guest speakers. Each listening exercise allows students to progress from controlled listening activities to more complex ones.

Conversation Skills offers extensive individual student practice in speaking. Students learn to use authentic language in situations related to work, school, leisure and social life. They are encouraged to express their thoughts and ideas, plus their wants and needs, in classroom situations that make extensive use of pair work, small-group discussions. and information-sharing activities. These face-to-face discussions simulate real-life social interaction, encouraging the use of eye contact, exclamations, questions, accurate intonation and emotional tone. 24 meetings per session.

Writing

Writing Skills emphasizes the process of writing and highlights the various strategies writers can use in the process. The class teaches such organizational patterns as generalizing, describing, defining, talking about differences and similarities, and expressing cause and result. Although the focus is on content-based writing, other language skills are integrated, and practice writing is combined with speaking and listening activities. In order to gather data for their writing, students share ideas, opinions, and suggestions in pair, small group, and wholeclass discussions. These brainstorming activities lead to teacher and peer analyses of student essays where the focus is on topic sentences, supporting facts, discourse markers, and concluding sentences. 24 meetings per ses-

Grammar

The Grammar class presents the important grammatical structures in English through a process of observing, describing and using the structures in written and spoken language. Controlled and open-ended exercises and tasks are practiced in class to help the students increase their mastery over the forms. Special attention is given to grammar points that are most difficult for students. Additionally, the ways in which grammar is tested in the TOEFL are examined and practice TOEFL exercises are done. 16 meetings per session.

Reading & Vocabulary

The focus of Reading & Vocabulary is to help students increase their vocabulary within the context of meaningful, highinterest readings. Each student will learn the skills needed to find the meanings of unfamiliar words and then incorporate them into active, everyday use. Reading and vocabulary skills will be practiced through an integrated approach that uses a variety of topics, genres, moods and styles. Interesting subjects will be read and then examined through paired discussions, small group work and whole-class activities. 16 meetings per session.

The Certificate

The Certificate Program in Alcohol/Drug Counseling consists of 9 courses designed to prepare individuals for entry into the field at a professional level. ADX 301 Introduction to Counseling Techniques

3 ext units

Prerequisite for program * ADX 300 and 301 must be taken before any other courses

This course introduces the skills and techniques necessary for counseling. Students will learn to use active listening skills and to develop a high empathy level. The course is both theoretical and experiential.

ADX 302 Counseling the Individual

3 ext units

Prerequisite: ADX 300, 301

This course develops an understanding of the psychological factors of alcoholism and drug abuse and their implications for treatment. Counseling techniques are examined and practiced including assessment, perception and communication skills required for various stages of treatment, prognosis and termination.

ADX 303 Perspectives on Drug Abuse: Counseling the Substance Abuser

3 ext units Prerequisite 300, 301

This course is an introduction to a major social/psychological problem. Students learn the basic pharmacology of the commonly-encountered street drugs and behavioral and physiological consequences of drug abuse. Polyaddiction and treatment modalities are also covered.

ADX 304 Group **Counseling Techniques**

3 ext units

Prerequisite 300, 301

This course provides an understanding of group dynamics, defenses, problems, goals and growth. The roles of the group facilitator and group members are examined and practiced in class.

ADX 305 Introductory Practicum

2 ext units Prerequisite 300, 301

This course introduces the students to the applied counseling experience. They become knowledgeable about community resources, learn documentation techniques, charting, and case studies. Issues related to grief, loss, stress, and counselor burn-out are addressed.

ADX 306 Family **Dynamics**

3 ext units Prerequisite 300, 301

This course introduces theories of the effects of substance abuse (alcohol and/or drugs) as they relate to the family system. Students gain insight into the identification and solution of problems of the pathologic family and the individual roles and behavior patterns that exist within it.

ADX 307 Advanced Practicum

2 ext units Prerequisite 300, 301, 305

This course demonstrates how to link clients with community resources. The student learns charting techniques, becomes aware of the needs of special populations and develops a further understanding of the counselor-client relationship, including confidentiality and legal aspects. The student learns about the multi-disciplinary treatment team, how to take histories and make psychosocial evaluations. The various alcoholism treatment agencies and program modalities--their staffing, funding, operational procedures--are studied.

ADX 308 Treatment of **Eating Disorders**

3 ext units Prerequisite 300, 301

An introduction to the treatment of eating disorders such as anorexia nervosa, bulimia, compulsive eating, and obesity, biological, psychoanalytic, behavioral, psychosocial, and other theoretical perspectives will be highlighted. The history of the interrelationship of alcohol and food as substances often abused is explored. Multidimensional treatment techniques will be explored for a comprehensive understanding of this illness.

CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS IN ORTHOTICS - PROSTHETICS

The Orthotics and Prosthetics Program in the Health Science Department at California State University, Dominguez Hills now offers two Certificate Programs consisting of a nine-month curriculum in Prosthetics, and a sevenmonth curriculum in Orthotics. Is it a full-time program?

How many students are admitted per semester?

The program is impacted, which means that there are more students eligible than there are fieldwork sites. This makes the program competitive. The goal of the program is to admit up to 30 qualified students per semester.

Is the program fully accredited?

How long is the program?

Once admitted to the major (the final two years) the program takes four semesters and two 3-month clinical affiliations to graduate.

What degree will I have when I finish the coursework?

Upon successful completion of two 3-month affiliations, students will graduate with a B.S. degree in occupational therapy. They will be eligible to sit for the NBCOT certification exam to earn the title, OTR.

- have submitted three letters of recommendation, including one from the director of the physician assistant training program where graduated and one from a supervising physician (applicants who have graduated from a postgraduate physician assistant program must also submit a letter of recommendation from the postgraduate program director); and
- have completed a successful interview with the pro gram's Graduate Coordinator and representatives form the department faculty.

How to Apply

To apply for admission, an applicant must obtain and complete a Health Science External Degree Application and a Supplemental Health Science External Degree Application. A \$55 application fee must be submitted with the completed application forms. Make checks payable to CSUDH. Two official copies of all transcripts are required from the institution granting the baccalaureate degree and those institutions where you have received academic credit for graduate work.

Confirmation/Receipts

You are considered officially enrolled when your registration fees are paid and your registration form has been received. Refund of Fees

You must file appropriate forms in the Extended Education Office in order to receive a refund. Students must officially drop their courses. For credit courses, students must file the appropriate "drop" and "request for refund" forms in the Office of Extended Education. The effective date of the refund is the day the forms are received by the Office of Extended Education. To receive a refund of fees for a noncredit class, or a class offering Continuing Education or Professional Units, you must notify the Division of Extended Education between the hours of 9am and 4pm at least two working days before the course begins. You will be asked to send a written request for a refund of fees to our office. If you need to withdraw on or after the day of the first class meeting, notify the Extended Education office immediately. Refunds are granted in accordance with the State refund schedule.

- If an Extended Education course is cancelled, the entire course fee will be refunded
- If you withdraw prior to the first class meeting, 100 percent of the course fee will be refunded (less a \$5 processing fee for credit courses)
- If you withdraw after the first class and before the first 25 per cent of the course has elapsed, 65 percent of the total fee will be refunded

Schedule Changes

Although care is taken to ensure the accuracy of all information in this Bulletin, there may be unintended errors and changes or deletions without notification. In situations when our office has sufficient advance notice, we will make every attempt to notify preenrolled students about changes in class dates, time or location.

The Division of Extended Education at CSUDH offers a variety of credit and noncredit courses.

Extended Education Courses

Academic credit is awarded for successful completion of formally recognized institutional extension courses. A maximum of 24 units of extension credit may be applied toward a baccalaureate degree and up to 6 units toward a master's degree, subject to departmental approval.

Special Sessions

Resident academic credit is given for Special Sessions classes through Extended Education. Registration is open to both matriculated students and to the community. For the course numbering system, see the University catalog.

Professional Credit

A few courses in the Bulletin are offered for Professional Credit. Professional Credit is designed for professionals who benefit from credit for salary or step advancement. The awarding of Professional Credit requires completion of outof-class assignments. One Professional Credit equals 15 hours of participation in lecture. Professional Credit is not degreeapplicable. Course numbering is 800-899 for educational professional credit. Course numbering is 601-699 for business professional credit.

Official Withdrawal from Credit Courses

Courses less than 1 week

Prior to the first class meeting a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. An administrative grade of "W" will be assigned if a student withdraws at any time during the course.

One Week Courses

During the first day of the week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. An administrative grade of "W" will be assigned if a student withdraws at any time after the first day of the week.

Two Week Courses

During the first three days of the first week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. An administrative grade of "W" will be assigned if a student withdraws at any time after the first three days of the week.

Three Week Courses

During the first week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. Prior to the last two days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W". During the last two days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W" for serious and compelling reasons only.

Four and Five Week Courses

During the first week a student may withdraw and no no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. Prior to the last four days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W". During the last four days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W" for serious and compelling reasons only.

Six, Seven, and Eight Week Courses

During the first two weeks a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. Prior to the last week of the session a student may withdraw with a "W" . During the last week of the session a student may withdraw with a "W" for serious and compelling reasons only.

Courses of more than Eight Weeks

For courses longer than eight weeks, refer to the withdrawal policy in the University catalog.

Final Exams

Once final examinations begin, no drops or withdrawals are allowed. A student who does not officially withdraw shall receive "F" or "U" grades for all courses on his/her official record.

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Many of the short courses, workshops and seminars in this bulletin are noncredit. These are designed to respond to the various educational interests and needs of those living and working in the University's service area. Course abbreviation is as follows:

Course Numbering System

The course numbering system for the University is based upon three-digit numbers as follows: 000-099 Sub-collegiate courses, not for baccalaureate credit.

100-199 Lower division courses, normally taken in the freshman year.
200-299 Lower division courses, normally

taken in the sophomore year.
300-399 Upper division courses, normally

taken in the junior year.
400-499 Upper division courses, normally taken in the senior year.

500-599 Graduate courses, normally limited to graduate students.

Continuing Education Units (CEUs)

Some extension workshops and courses award Continuing Education Units (CEUs). The CEU is nationally recognized for relicensure, promotion or career advancement. One CEU equals ten hours of participation in lecture. CEUs are not degree-applicable. A cumulative permanent transcript of all CEU study undertaken is provided to Extension students upon written request. Course numbering is 900-999. CEU grades are for credit or no credit only (C/NC).

Extended Education Grading Procedures

Unless a course is offered for a grade of credit/noncredit only, all extension credit courses are offered for letter grades.
However, an undergraduate student in an extension class offered for a letter grade may choose to be graded on a credit/noncredit basis by informing the instructor in writing at the beginning of the class. For Special Sessions classes, follow University procedures.

Grade Reports

Grade reports will be sent approximately three weeks after the term ends. Official transcripts with current grades will not be available for at least five weeks after the end of the term. To learn your grade for any graded class, including Extension, Special Sessions, Summer Sessions and Winter Session, call (310) 516-4308.

Transcripts

A student may obtain an official transcript of his/her record by completing a Request for Transcript form, available from the Records and Registration Office (Small College Complex, J103). A fee of \$4 is charged for each transcript. Additional copies of transcripts prepared at the same time (up to 10) are \$2 each. (310) 243-3600.

Class Cancellation

Occasionally an extension class must be cancelled because of insufficient pre-enrollments. If a decision to cancel is made, we will make every effort to notify by telephone all persons who have pre-enrolled, and their fees will be refunded by check from the University. When you pre-enroll, therefore, please give us a daytime telephone number so that you will not be inconvenienced if the class must be cancelled.

The Division of Extended Education is an equal opportunity/affirmative action institution and does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, sexual preference, age, disability or veteran status. This policy is applicable to employment and student admissions, and to all educational programs and activities.

Registration Information

Use of Social Security Number

Students are required to provide the university with their correct social security numbers (individual taxpayer identification numbers) pursuant to the authority contained in Section 41201. Title 5. California Code of Regulations, and Section 6109 of the Internal Revenue Code. The University uses the social security number to identify records pertaining to the student and, if needed, to collect debts owed the University. Also, the Internal Revenue Service requires the University to file information returns that include the student's social security number and other information such as the amount paid for qualified tuition, related expenses, and interest on educational loans. That information is used to help determine whether a student, or a person claiming a student as a dependent, may take a credit or deduction to reduce federal income taxes. Students who do not have a social security number at the time of enrollment will be required to obtain a social security number and submit it to the University within sixty days. Failure to furnish a correct social security number may result in the imposition of a penalty by the Internal Revenue Service.

Standards

Degree credit courses in Extended Education adhere to the academic standards of the University. All activities usually associated with regular University course work are integral parts of the degree credit instruction program. It is our aim, through course review, planning and the selection of quality, experienced Extended Education faculty, to provide you with meaningful learning experiences. We realize, however, that on rare occasions your expectations and the course do not match. Should this occur, let us know. It is through your feedback that we are able to make changes and adjustments for future courses.

Disabled Student Services

Students with verified disabilities, which are permanent or temporary (e.g., broken bones, strained back, other sprains, etc.) are eligible for a variety of support services from the Disabled Student Services Office. Information regarding special facilities and services available to students with a disability may be obtained from the Director of Disabled student Services Office, located in the Student Health Center, Room A-106, (310) 243-3660 (voice) or 243-2028 (TDD).

Immigration Requirements for Licensure

On August 27, 1996, Governor Pete Wilson issued Executive Order W-135-96 which requested that the CSU and other state agencies implement "as expeditiously as reasonably practicable" the provision of The Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRAWORA) of 1996 (P.L.104-193). The Act, also known as the Welfare Reform Act, included provisions to eliminate eligibility for federal and state public benefits for certain categories of lawful immigrants as well as benefits for all illegal immigrants.

Students who will require a professional or commercial license provided by a local, state, or federal government agency in order to engage in an occupation for which the CSU may be training them must meet the immigration requirements of the new Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act to achieve licensure. Resources for Students Computer Labs

Student identification cards -- available at the Extended Education Office -- will entitle those enrolled to full use of the CSUDH Computer Labs.

Library Services

Student identification cards will entitle those enrolled in credit courses to use of the CSUDH Library.

Unless otherwise noted, textbooks may be purchased at the University Bookstore, (310) 243-3829. The Bookstore hours during regular semesters are Mon-Thu 8am-7:30pm, Fri 8am-4pm, Sat 10am-2pm. Call for January Intersession and Summer Sessions hours. Registration fees do not include textbooks unless noted.

Loker Student Union

Hours are 7:30am to 8pm Monday through Thursday, from 7:30am to 2pm Friday, and from 8am to 2pm on Saturday. Breakfast is served from 8am - 10:30am.

Other food areas open at 10am.

There is no food service on Sundays. Food vending machines are available on the first floors of the Social and Behavioral Sciences building and the Educational Resources Center.

Parking

Redondo Beach Community Center (RBCC): Free parking. Franklin Community Center (FCC): Free parking in lot and on Fisk and Inglewood Avenues. Inglewood One-Stop Center: Free Parking in City Hall lot. CSUDH: Parking permits are required for all on-campus classes. They are available from the machines at the entrance to each parking lot and cost \$2.00 per day or \$63 per semester. Open University

Students may enroll in regular CSUDH classes through a program called Open University. To enroll in a course you need the consent of the instructor and you must have completed any prerequisites for the course. You will earn special sessions credit that may be used toward a degree at our campus or most other colleges or universities. Course fees are \$140 per semester unit (\$420 for a three-unit class).

To register for Open University classes, follow the instructions below:

- 1. Pick up an Open University registration form from the Division of Extended Education (located on the CSUDH campus, Building 2, room B141 in the Small College Complex).
- 2. Complete the student information on the registration form, including the course information.
- 3. If you have been assigned a CSUDH student identification number, please be sure to indicate it on the form.
- 4. Take the Open University registration form to the first session of each course and ask the instructor to sign the form, permitting you to enroll. All enrollments through Open University are on a space-available basis. Remember, all prerequisites for a course must be completed before you will be permitted to enroll.
- 5. Bring the signed and completed registration form to the Extended Education office and pay the required fees. Payment may be by check, money order or VISA, Discover or MasterCard draft, payable to CSUDH in the exact amount required. Registration will not be complete until all fees are paid. You must complete registration by February 18, 2000. For a complete schedule of classes, please call (310) 243-3741.
