Global Logistics Certificate of Completion

The Program

The Global Logistics program is designed to provide training for operational staff in freight forwarding companies, small to medium size shipping department supervisors and export/import office staff. Additional exposure to warehouse operations, trucking operations and the handling of hazardous material procedures as well as international finance provides for a pragmatic program, with immediate, applicable job skills.

What You Will Learn

The curriculum is based upon a sequence of courses that cover the body of knowledge to enter the field of logistics or improve current job skills for individuals already employed in the field. An overview of logistics, designed to introduce and define terms leads to specific courses that will enrich knowledge of how transportation plays such a major role in the world economy. The program will explore all modes of transportation both domestic and international and provide the groundwork to identify and handle commodities that require special attention, including security, dangerous goods and government compliance. The curriculum is focused on the operational level of logistics.

Who Should Attend

Individuals who desire an entry level position or improved job skills with a freight forwarder, small package company, trucking company or warehouse. Additionally, many small to medium size manufacturing and distribution firms depend upon a shipping supervisor to be familiar with the many facets of logistics; the various topics of the courses in this program would satisfy that need.

Upon completion the student should be able to arrange and coordinate the transportation of goods globally.

Special Major Bachelor of Arts Degree

A Special Major degree for those who have completed the Production and Inventory Control Certificate Program

The Program

Students who have completed the Production and Inventory Control program at California State University, Dominguez Hills, are invited to apply the credits earned to a bachelor's degree program as part of a unique program entitled Special Major. Through this program, students can integrate their studies in Production and Inventory Control with at least two other disciplines to obtain the degree. Working with an advisory committee, participants design a path that best suits their individual and career objectives. Working adults and their employers will appreciate the career-specific approach of this innovative course of study.

Eligibility Requirements

Formal admittance to the University is not required for participation in the Production & Inventory Control Certificate program, but is required for participation in the balance of the Bachelor's Degree Program. All students are required to pay extension tuition for these courses. Students desiring to enter the University to earn a Special Major BA must follow standard University application procedures as outlined in the University Catalog

Program Requirements

The Special Major Bachelor of Arts degree requires the completion of 120 semester hours including both lower and upper division course work. Participating students must complete all general studies program requirements (52-59 semester units) and integrate at least one other discipline outside of the College of Business and Public Policy with the PIX units to achieve a total of 24 units of upper division credit to complete the Special Major. Students must also complete an acceptable University minor.

Other graduation requirements are listed in the general University Catalog.

The minimum requirement for the Special Major is 24 semester units of approved upper division work. The credit hours earned while completing the Production and Inventory Control Certificate serve as the foundation for the Special Major. The remaining upper division credit hours, in consultation with the student's advisory committee, should be chosen from at least one other department outside the School of Management.

Residence Requirements

A minimum of 30 semester units (of which 24 must be upper division units) must be completed in residence at CSU Dominguez Hills. This does not include the credits earned as part of the PIX certificate program because credits earned through extension are not considered residence credit. Please see the University Catalog for other residence and transfer credit requirements.

The Minor

In addition to the Special Major, participating students are required to complete a regular academic minor.

University Requirements

A student working towards the Special Major PIX degree is subject to university-wide policy relative to admission, scholastic standards and graduation requirements (please refer to the University Catalog). A maximum of 24 semester units through extension, correspondence and the United States Armed Forces Institute may be accepted toward a bachelor's degree. Each PIX course successfully completed counts as 3 of the 24 acceptable units.

In addition to providing a comprehensive introduction to supply chain management, the coursework is designed to help students prepare for the national CPIM Certification Exams or ISM (NAPM) Purchasing CPM Certification Exams.

Requirements

Courses are offered three trimesters each year and provide three (3) units of upper division degree-applicable academic credit. Solar PV Entry Level Installer

The Program

About half of all solar PV installers work in California, a State that provides many incentives for solar electric power. Because solar power requires a large upfront investment, tax credits and other government incentives help make it a more affordable option for individuals and businesses. Given the trend in favorable government incentives, analysts expect that the solar-power industry will continue to grow rapidly. Course is designed to prepare students to

work as entry level installers who assemble, install and maintain solar photovoltaic (PV) systems on roofs or other structures in compliance with site assessment and schematics. Part of the job requirements include measuring, cutting, assembling, and bolting solar modules to structural framing, as well as perform minor electrical work such as current checks.

As part of the course, students will be prepared and eligible to test for the Electronics Technicians Association's (ETA) level one installer's exam. ETA is one of the leading organizations in Solar PV training. Individuals with residential construction experience are best suited for this course: however there are no prerequisites or experience required.

Employment Outlook

According to the Occupational Labor Handbook, job prospects are expected to be excellent, particularly for those who have completed training from an accredited technical school or a formal apprenticeship.

The Program

This is a graduate program for physical education teachers who are interested in furthering their education and professional development.

What You Will Learn

Graduates of this program will receive a Master of Arts in Education with an emphasis in Physical Education Administration. The Physical Education Administration option is designed to provide advanced studies in physical education, as well as knowledge and understanding of the basic foundations and theories of educational administration. The curriculum objectives promote a blending of theory and practice to assist students who seek advancement within their chosen field in education, public service, or the private sector. Graduates from this program will meet requirements necessary for teaching physical education at the community college level, as well as meeting requirements for various school administrative positions.

The Master of Arts in Education, Physical Education Administration Option is structured as a differential tuition program, with graduates completing a total of 30 units. Students will complete 18 units (graduate education curriculum) under state support and 12 units (physical education courses)

through Special Sessions. Students will be enrolled as regular university students for the extent of the program, but will pay the current Special Sessions fees for the 12 physical education units.

Degree Requirements

The following courses (A-C) constitute the program of study for the Master of Arts in Education: Physical Education Administration Option. Students enrolling in these courses must have a degree in Physical Education, Kinesiology, Exercise Science, or Human Performance or have completed the prerequisite courses (outlined in part II below). All students receiving this degree must successfully complete these courses.

MS in Health Sciences, 0&P Option

Orthotics and prosthetics is a specialized health care profession, which combines a unique blend of clinical and technical skills to care for patients who have neuromuscular and musculoskeletal disorders and/or patients who have a partial or total absence of a limb. Orthotists and prosthetists provide treatment that allows these individuals to lead more active and independent lives by collaborating with other members of the healthcare team. This work requires substantial clinical and technical judgment.

The principles of biomechanics, pathomechanics, gait analysis, kinesiology, anatomy and physiology are crucial to the practitioner's ability to provide comprehensive patient care and a positive clinical outcome. Patient assessment, treatment and education are part of the practitioner's responsibility and require collaborative communication skills.

In addition to performing orthotic and prosthetic procedures, the orthotist and prosthetist is involved in clinical decision-making and patient education. The scope of practice for the orthotist and prosthetist includes, but is not limited to:

- Patient Assessment Perform a comprehensive assessment of the patient to obtain an understanding of the patient's orthotic/prosthetic needs
- Formulation of the treatment plan Create a comprehensive orthotic/prosthetic treatment plan to meet the needs and goals of the patient
- Implementation of the treatment plan Perform the necessary procedures to deliver the appropriate orthotic/prosthetic services, which include fabrication of the devices required.
- Follow-up treatment plan Provide continuing patient care and periodic evaluation to assure/maintain/document optimal fit and function of the orthosis/prosthesis
- Practice management Develop, implement and/or monitor policies and procedures regarding human resource management, physical environment management, business/financial management and organizational management
- Promotion of competency and enhancement of professional practice

 Participate in personal and professional development through
 continuing education, training, research and organizational
 affiliations.

GRE

The GRE General Test scores provide a common measure for comparing the qualifications of applicants. To meet the University writing proficiency standards for graduate admission, applicants are required to achieve a minimum Analytic Writing score of 4 on the GRE. The GRE needs to be taken within the last 5 years. Admission to the M.S. Option is not solely based on GPA and GRE scores; it also includes letters of recommendation, letter of intent, and the student's background and knowledge of the orthotic and prosthetic profession.

In addition, the following courses are recommended but not required: Ethics, Business Management.

Admission Requirements

Due to the limited laboratory space, a maximum of 24 students can be accommodated in the Orthotics and Prosthetics Option.

Applicants must apply to both CSU Dominguez Hills Graduate Studies Office and the M.S. in Health Science, Orthotics and Prosthetics Option. Applications are available online: Graduate Studies application is available at www.csumentor.edu and the supplemental M.S. in Health Science, Orthotics and Prosthetics Program Application is available at http://portal.opcas.org. Applications to the program are accepted one time each year. Students planning to seek admission should submit both applications including all supporting materials no later than January 31 preceding a summer semester admission to the program. Applications received after January 31 will be considered only if class space is available.

To be eligible for consideration as a candidate in this option, an applicant must meet the following minimum requirements:

- Individuals with a bachelor's degree, preferably in an allied health or related major and a GPA of 3.0 or above in the last 60 semester or 90 quarter units of upper division coursework from any accredited college or university may apply.
- 2. Facility with hand tools, light duty power equipment, and knowledge of materials used in Orthotics and Prosthetics; prior

- working or volunteer experience is an important selection criterion. A minimum of 100 hours of volunteer work is required prior to admission.
- Successful completion of all orthotic and prosthetic option prerequisite courses with a grade of "B" or better.
- 4. Completed Graduate studies application, available at: www.csumentor.edu. The University Application is completed onlineusingCalifornia State University's CSU Mentor. Note: a \$55 application fee is charged by the CSU campus.
- 5. Completed OPCAS Program Application and subsequent in-person or telephone interview by a panel consisting of orthotics and prosthetics faculty. Program applications are available online athttp://portal.opcas.org. Applicants must submit the O&P application by January 31st for admission in the subsequent summer semester.

M.S. Program Requirements

Students must complete the program with a GPA of at least 3.0. All courses taken to fulfill the requirements for the master's degree must be passed with a grade of "B-" or better. All other university requirements for the master's degree in this University Catalog must be met (see the Graduate Degrees and Post baccalaureate Studies section).

HEA 445, Material Science and Laboratory Skills (2 units) and HEA 455, Applied Anatomy (1 unit) must be passed prior to Fall semester of year 1 to continue in the program sequence; if not passed, the student will have one additional chance to retake the course with a passing grade, and restart the course sequence in Fall semester of the following year.

Capstone Activities

Degree students must complete a series of comprehensive exams/activities. The Capstone Activities involve creative application of theory and practice with real life clients who require orthotic or prosthetic intervention. The comprehensive exams are given over a 4-week period. They involve patient interaction and treatment, laboratory practical, written simulation, oral defense,

gait analysis and written exams. Failure to achieve a passing score, after the third attempt, will result in a dismissal from the program.

Admission Requirements

- Completion of a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited institution with an upper division major in nursing (BSN) and a NLNAC or CCNE accredited nursing program or the equivalent as determined by the School of Nursing Student Affairs Committee.
- Overall grade point average of 3.0 (on a four-point scale) or higher in the last 60 semester (90 quarter) units attempted.
- Current registered nurse license in the United States, unencumbered, unrestricted, with no disciplinary action pending or imposed.
- Completion of statistics (descriptive and inferential) and upper division research courses. Students who have not taken these courses in the undergraduate program may enroll in them concurrently with graduate coursework. They must be completed prior to MSN 530.
- The Graduate Writing Examination (GWE) requirement (or equivalent) must be met prior to admission OR during the first semester of coursework with a score of 8 or better.
- Submission of a professional resume and 100-200 word essay describing the congruence of the applicant's educational goals with the CSUDH MSN program.

Degree Requirements

All students admitted to the major must be currently, actively licensed as a registered nurse (RN) in the United States, unencumbered, unrestricted, with no disciplinary action pending or imposed. It is the students' responsibility to immediately report in writing any change in licensure to the Chair or the Program Coordinator. Prior to enrolling in Role Performance (clinical) courses, students are responsible for obtaining and showing evidence of the items below. Graduate students will submit these documents with the Role Option Entry Eligibility Checklist which must be submitted the semester prior to the first role performance course:

- Current, active license as a registered nurse (RN) in the United States, unencumbered, unrestricted, with no disciplinary action pending or imposed
- Rubella, rubeola, and varicella immunization or serum titer showing immunity within the past 5 years
- Negative PPD or chest x-ray, if positive 5

- Current CPR certification(annually) -American Heart Association- need front and back of card
- Hepatitis B titer showing immunity or evidence of 3 vaccinations or waiver
- Blood-borne Pathogen/universal precautions and HIPAA Training annual
- *Affiliating clinical agencies may have additional requirements.

Courses should be completed in the suggested sequence as noted in the MSN curriculum charts and handbooks on the School of Nursing website. Students wishing to accelerate their study or pursue full time study should seek advice and approval from the Graduate Coordinator.

All students conclude their 30-52 units of master's preparation with a culminating activity (see the School of nursing website). Nurse educators develop expertise in a nursing clinical practice area by selecting a three-unit elective in an advanced clinical focus related to parent-child or gerontology nursing. The course should be taken prior to entry into role-emphasis courses.

The MSN program consists of 15 units of core courses, plus role emphasis courses. The total number of units varies according to the role option:

- Nurse Administrator (30 units)
- Nurse Educator (36 units)
- Clinical Nurse Specialist (40 units)

Master of Social Work

The Program

The Master of Social Work Program at California State University, Dominguez Hills is strategically located to focus on the diverse social service needs and problems particular to the South Bay area of Los Angeles County. a large metropolitan area, populated by a wide range of socially and culturally diverse people. Because of the diversity of the various ethnic groups and cultures, the program will prepare social work students for contextually competent social work practice, inclusive of issues of culture, race, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, class and gender differences, religion and the effects of bias, prejudice and institutionalized racism. These issues and concerns often obscure helping efforts if they are not appropriately recognized and dealt with in practice and in social policy development and implementation. Thus, the program aims at increasing students' understanding of the underlying causes resulting from intersecting effects of prejudice, discrimination, and stereotyping and teaches ways of identifying strategies and interventions for addressing these concerns and problems in social work practice.

The CSUDH MSW program has set several goals in the preparation of professional social workers applying cultural and contextually competent practice. The program aspires to prepare graduates to:

- Engage in autonomous professionally competent practices that are culturally appropriate interventions tailored to enhance the well-being of individuals, families, and the successful functioning of groups, organizations and communities in diverse urban environments.
- Be able and willing to promote economic and social justice through the practice of culturally and contextually competent interventions at all levels, including policy practice, advocacy and direct intervention.
- Be analytically skilled to identify and understand the destructive patterns of institutionalized poverty, discrimination and oppression using scientifically valid

research methodologies and critical analyses to identify, assess and change aspects of competing economic, political and social systems, as well as harmful interactions among and between them.

- Engage in community based research on social issues, focusing on those variables affecting individuals, families, groups, organizations and communities in diverse pluralistic urban environments that can be directly applied to the education of students and reflect evidence-based culturally and contextually competent social work intervention.
- Establish and maintain professional relationships that enable cooperation and collaboration with members of the social service community that mitigate/ameliorate complex social challenges through shared leadership and partnerships.
- Be committed to the profession of social work that includes maintaining the highest ethical standards embodied in professional ethics, development of a life-long-learning philosophy based on ongoing evaluations of one's own practices informed by regular access to and consumption of appropriate scholarly research.

The Program as a comprehensive entity aspires to:

 Contribute to the social work profession locally, within the state and nationally through collaborating with social service agencies to promote their endeavors through implementation of contextually culturally competent programs, evaluation of practice and research.

These goals are accomplished through the following program objectives. Upon completion of the MSW program at California State University, Dominguez Hills students will be able to:

Communication Sciences & Disorders Certificate

The Program

The Certificate in Communication Sciences and Disorders is a pre-professional program offering students the prerequisite knowledge that is required for education leading to a career as a Speech-Language Pathologist. Students will be prepared to enter MA/MS programs in Communication Sciences and Disorders or meet the academic requirements for state licensure as a Speech-Language Pathology Assistant. Classes are offered only in the evening and on Saturdays to accommodate students who work full or part time. The program offers students the opportunity to observe certificated, licensed, and credentialed speech and language pathologists in clinical and school settings. Students are trained within a cohort model and are mentored though out the certificate program.

The online Master's Degree program in Negotiation, Conflict Resolution and Peacebuilding at California State University, Dominguez Hills teaches participants valuable negotiation, conflict resolution and peacebuilding skills, techniques and knowledge that may be applied directly to law enforcement work, counseling, education administration, human resources management, labor relations, law, business negotiations, supervision and administration, government and the foreign service.

Other career applications include alternative dispute resolution (ADR) services such as mediation, negotiation, arbitration, public policy advising, social work, teaching, non-profit organization management, resolution of inter-cultural and community conflicts, corporate contracts and purchasing.

Additionally, participants will improve their computer, listening, speaking, writing, critical thinking and problem solving skills. This is a 36-semester unit graduate program, which can be completed in two years without coming to the Dominguez Hills campus. Courses run 12 weeks each term. Students complete a portfolio as a culminating event (unless the program director approves a special topic for a thesis).

The program involves a comprehensive study

of the practical skills, techniques, methods, theory, and research needed to be an effective mediator, negotiator and conflict manager. The degree addresses many needs of beginning and mid-career professionals in law enforcement, government, business, and non-profit organizations, and those interested in a career change.

Admission Requirements

- 1. A bachelor's degree with any major and a GPA of 3.2 or above (4-point scale) in the last 60 semester or 90 quarter units from any accredited college or university;
- 2. Three letters of recommendation; and
- 3. A 500-word biographical essay. The biographical essay and letters of recommendation must address:
 - what in the applicant's background indicates this subject matter is appropriate for the applicant,
 - why applicant desires this degree program, and
 - what does applicant plan to do with this degree once obtained.

Personal interviews may be required.
Students are admitted only once a year on a cohort basis. Applicants will be considered for Fall admission only. Completed applications and supporting documentation must be received no later than May 1st preceding the Fall semester of the academic year for which admission to the program is sought.

Special Features

The degree can be completed without ever coming to the campus by anyone anywhere in the world with access to the Internet. Any student with a PC Pentium II and reliable access to the Internet should be able to attend class online. Classes are asynchronous (tasks completed on- or off-line at the student's convenience), with on

demand video lectures for students to view. Additional features include home pages for students and instructors, chat and discussion rooms, electronic submission and return of papers, and individual, secure, access to personal course records at all times.

Students who cannot complete the course of study in two years have up to five years from date of admission to finish the program. Students must remain in continuous enrollment from first enrollment to program completion.

Degree Requirements

- A. Required Courses (24 units) To be taken in the order listed in sequence NCR 500, 503, 504, 507, 508, 522, 525 and 544.
- B. Elective Courses: (9-12 units, depending on whether a thesis is the approved culminating event.)
- C. The Graduate Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR) must be taken and passed during the first semester of enrollment.
- D. Capstone (Successful Culminating Event)
 Portfolio (3 units)/ Thesis (6 units but only
 available after the approval of program
 director.) NOTE: Culminating Event Course
 (NCR 591) must be the last required
 course in the program for the student, and
 may be taken together with only one
 remaining elective course.

Cost

Current fees are \$275 per unit, or \$9,000 for the entire degree. Additional expenses (at current rates, subject to change) are a \$35 examination fee(for the Graduation Writing Exam if needed), a \$35 diploma fee, books estimated at \$1200 total, and whatever the student's personal Internet fees cost.

Master of Business Administration (MBA) Online

The Program

The MBA at CSUDH provides a solid qualification in business management with courses that are wide-ranging in content, covering the essential areas of knowledge and skills required in today's competitive business environment. The curriculum is focused on providing students with the tools for solving business problems and making decisions within the framework of a strategic plan. The MBA is designed not only to impart the knowledge of accounting, economics, finance, management, and marketing but also to equip graduates with the foundation for effective team building, quantitative and qualitative decision making, and creative problem solving.

Special Features

The MBA can be completed entirely online through the MBA Online Program. Courses feature a high level of interaction between faculty and students. Each class combines text materials, lecture videos, case studies, group interaction among students, threaded discussions, interactive netmeetings and video conferencing.

The 30-33 unit MBA curriculum can be completed online within 18 months through the CSUDH MBA Online Program. All MBA courses are three (3) credit units each and are offered on a twelve (12) week schedule. The program is offered in four (4) terms or sessions each year. Students can enroll and begin studies in the Spring and Fall sessions. The curriculum consists of the following components:

Students who hold an undergraduate degree in business administration, commerce, or a related field from an accredited institution

may be deemed to have acquired competency in the core areas and if the core courses were completed with a grade of "C" (or equivalent) or higher.

Students who hold an undergraduate degree in a field other than business administration or in a related area will be required to demonstrate competency in the business core areas. Competency can be demonstrated by completing necessary coursework at an accredited institution prior to beginning graduate studies at CSUDH or by completing appropriate bridge courses offered through the MBA Online Program.

Master of Public Administration (MPA)

Online

The Online MPA Program is designed to meet the needs of adult learners who work in the public, nonprofit and private sectors

The Program

The Master of Public Administration (MPA) program is designed to provide a quality graduate professional education for individuals entering or currently employed in public service and non-profit professions.

What You Will Learn

The MPA program prepares students for careers as professional managers of public sector or non-profit organizations as well as for research, consulting, and teaching careers. The MPA curriculum is developed on a theoretical foundation for the practice of effective public management in a wide range of public service functional areas at all levels of government.

The MPA Online Program is offered in four or six sessions each year. Students can enroll and begin studies in the Spring and Fall sessions. The 36-unit MPA curriculum consists of core and elective courses (3 credit units each) offered in an eight week or twelve week schedule.

Special Features

Program Delivery System

All Online MPA courses are offered online. After meeting prerequisite requirements, students may complete all other program requirements within one year by taking two (2) courses per session during a four session timeframe.

Eligibility Requirements

Applicants for admission to the MPA Online Program must meet the California State University Dominguez Hills admission requirements for post-baccalaureate or graduate study and the graduate admission requirements of the Department of Public Administration. - Attain a minimum score of 550 paperbased, 213 CBT or 80 IBT. The TOEFL or the ILETS (minimum score of 6.5 for the ILETS) is required for all applicants who have received all, or a significant portion, of their education in a language other than English

Students who have no prior public administration related coursework or who have limited public agency administrative experience (as determined by the MPA program department) will be required to take one to three undergraduate bridge courses.

Costs

Tuition for all MPA Online courses is \$600 or \$460 per unit. Tuition is based on the 8 week or 12 week schedule. Course fees are the same for both resident and international students. All fees are subject to change.

Accreditation

The Master of Public Administration Program is additionly accredited by the National Association of Schools of Public Affairs and Public Administration. The MPA program is also WASC accredited through the University

Students will learn how to successfully plan, manage and coordinate construction projects and activities including an understanding of project budgets, scheduling, construction contracts and law, and construction safety.

Who Should Attend

This innovative and timely program is designed for construction personnel, architects, engineers, property owners, developers and those who wish to develop and expand their managerial skills in construction.

Eligibility Requirements

There are no prerequisites required for the program. A background in construction, architecture, engineering or real estate is desirable.

Special Features

All program instructors are experienced practitioners in their field of expertise. They bring practical application of project management practices to their classes. All classes are scheduled in the evenings or on Saturdays on the CSUDH campus at the Extended Education complex to meet the needs of working adults.

Courses are offered for Continuing Education Units (CEUs). Nationally recognized standards govern attendance requirements to earn CEU credit. A permanent record of attendance is established and students may obtain a copyof their transcripts by calling the Records Office at (310) 243-3621.



Who May Register

Extension classes are open to the public. You do not need a college degree to be registered in a degree program at the University. Please note, however, that registration in the College of Extended & International Education does not constitute admission to California State University, Dominguez Hills.

In Person: You can register in person at the College of Extended & International Education Registration Office located on the CSU Dominguez Hills campus, EE 1100. The Office accepts checks, money orders, Visa, MasterCard and Discover Card (no cash). Hours are 8am-8pm Monday-Thursday, 8am-5pm Friday and 8am-1:30pm Saturdays.

For credit courses, click on Student Center, and then on link "Add a Class". Students enrolling in non-credit and CEU courses click on Non-Credit Enrollment first and then enroll. To complete the online registration process, students must pay in full at the time of registration. Fees MUST be paid at the time of registration. After adding a course, be sure to click on "Account Inquiry" from the pull down menu, then click on "Make a Payment" from the pull down menu, select appropriate term, and pay with VISA, MasterCard, or Discover Card. Acceptable forms of

payment are Visa Card, MasterCard, or Discover 'Card. Students will be disenrolled from classes by 8am next business day if payment is not received at the time of registration.

Early Registration

Fee Payment

Students are required to pay in full for their courses at the time of registration. The fees for courses are listed in this bulletin. Please note that there is an additional \$30 per unit charge for TV courses. The fees are the same for residents and nonresidents. Payment may be made by check, money order, or Visa, Mastercard or Discover card payable to CSUDH in the exact amount required. Registration will not be considered complete until all fees are paid. Fees and refunds are subject to change.

Confirmation/Receipts

You are considered officially enrolled when your registration fees are paid and your registration form has been received. You will receive confirmation of enrollment via e-mail, provided we have a valid e-mail address for you on record. Additionally, you should receive a confirmation letter within two weeks after we have received your registration and fees. This letter is your receipt for fees paid. Please read the letter carefully because any changes in the course meeting time or place will be indicated in the letter. Changes which occur after the confirmation is mailed will be posted on the door of the scheduled classroom. If you do not receive a confirmation letter, REPORT TO THE FIRST CLASS MEETING. The instructor will have a roster and, if your registration is complete, your name will be on the roster. If it is not on the roster, contact the College of Extended & International Education's office at your earliest convenience.

Returned Checks

There is a \$25.00 service charge for checks returned for any reason.

Refund of Fees

You must file appropriate forms in the College of Extended & International Education Office in order to receive a refund. Students must officially drop their courses. For credit courses, students must file the appropriate "drop" and "request for refund" forms in the Office of College of Extended & International Education. The effective date of the refund is the day the forms are received by the Office of the College of Extended & International Education. To receive a refund of fees for any course, you must notify of College of Extended & International Education in writing

between the hours of 9am and 4pm at least two working days before the course begins. You will be asked to submit a written request to our office for a refund of fees. If you need to withdraw on or after the day of the first class meeting, notify the Extended Education Registration office immediately. Refunds are granted in accordance with the State refund schedule.

- If a course is cancelled, the entire course fee will be refunded
- If you withdraw prior to the first class meeting, 100 percent of the course fee will be refunded (less a \$10 processing fee for credit courses)
- If you withdraw after the first class and before the first 25 percent of the course has elapsed, 65 percent of the total fee will be refunded
- After 25 percent of the course time has elapsed, no refund will be made
- Courses of four meetings or less, or four weeks or less, no refund will be made.

Above refund policies do not apply to courses that are offered in partnership with other educational entities. These include, but are not limited to, the following partners: UCSD, Gatlin, Ed2Go, VESI, SHRM, WITS, CCI and the Center for Legal Studies.

Do not put a stop payment on a check to withdraw from a course. This results in a financial obligation to the University for the course fee; you will be assessed a \$25.00 dishonored check fee plus an additional \$25 late registration charge.

Official Withdrawal from Credit Courses

A student may request to withdraw with a "w" grade by submitting a change of program form with the signatures of their instructor, department chair and dean, as well as a petition for exception with attached documentation supporting the reason for withdrawal.

One Week Courses

On the first day of the week of the session, a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's transcript. Drops or complete withdrawals may be processed via MyCSUDH during this period. After the first day of the week of the session, a student may request to withdraw for serious and compelling reasons only. A student may request to withdraw with a "w" grade by submitting a change of program form with the signatures of their instructor, department chair and dean, as well as a petition for exception with attached documentation supporting the reason for withdrawal.

SPRING 2014

Two Week Courses

During the first three days of the first week, a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's transcript. After the first three days of the first week, a student may request to withdraw for serious and compelling reasons only. A student may request to withdraw with a "w" grade by submitting a change of program form with the signatures of their instructor, department chair and dean, as well as a petition for exception with attached documentation supporting the reason for withdrawal.

Three Week Courses

During the first week, a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's transcript. After the first week, and prior to the last two days of the session, a student may request to withdraw for serious and compelling reasons only. A student may request to withdraw with a "w" grade by submitting a change of program form with the signatures of their instructor, department chair and dean, as well as a petition for exception with attached documentation supporting the reason for withdrawal. During the last two days of the session, a student may withdraw with a "w" grade by submitting a change of program form with the signatures of their instructor, department chair and dean, a petition for exception with attached documentation supporting the reason for withdrawal, and documentation of illness or accident.

Four And Five Week Courses

During the first week, a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned. No signatures are required if a four or five week course is dropped during the first week. Prior to the last four days of the session, a student may withdraw with a "W" with the signatures of the instructor and school dean. During the last four days of the session, a student may withdraw with a "W" grade for serious and compelling reason, with the signatures of the instructor and school dean.

Six, Seven, and Eight Week Courses

During the first two weeks a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. Prior to the last week of the session a student may withdraw with a "W". During the last week of the session a student may withdraw with a "W" for serious and compelling reasons only.

Courses of more than Eight Weeks

Withdrawal from classes during final exam week (last week of session) is not permitted, except in such cases as accident or serious illness where circumstances causing the withdrawal are clearly beyond the student's control, and the assignment of a grade of Incomplete is not practical. A student may withdraw with a "w" grade by submitting a change of program form with the signatures of their instructor, department chair and dean, a petition for exception with attached documentation supporting the reason for withdrawal, and documentation of illness or accident.

A student who does not officially withdraw shall receive "F" or "WU" grades for all courses on his/her official record.

Extended Education Grading Procedures

Unless a course is offered for a grade of credit/no-credit only, all extension credit courses are offered for letter grades. However, an undergraduate student in an extension credit class offered for a letter grade may choose to be graded on a

credit/no-credit basis by informing the instructor in writing at the beginning of the class. For Special Sessions classes, follow University procedures.

Grade Reports

Extended Education Courses

Academic credit is awarded for successful completion of formally recognized institutional extension courses. A maximum of 24 units of extension credit may be applied toward a baccalaureate degree and up to 6 units toward a master's degree, subject to departmental approval.

Special Sessions

Resident academic credit is given to matriculated students for Special Sessions classes through Extended Education.
Registration is open to both matriculated students and to the community. For the course numbering system, see below.

Continuing Education Units (CEUs)

Some extension workshops and courses award Continuing Education Units (CEUs). The CEU is nationally recognized for relicensure, promotion or career advancement. One CEU equals ten hours of participation in lecture. CEUs are not degree-applicable. A cumulative permanent transcript of all CEU study undertaken is provided to extension students upon written request. Course numbering is 900-999. CEU grades are for credit or no credit only (CR/NC).

Noncredit

Many of the short courses, workshops and seminars in this bulletin are noncredit. These are designed to respond to the various educational interests and needs of those living and working in the University's service area.

Course Numbering System

The course numbering system for the University is based upon three-digit numbers as follows:

- 000-099 Sub-collegiate courses, not for baccalaureate credit.
- 100-199 Lower division courses, normally taken in the freshman year.
- 200-299 Lower division courses, normally taken in the sophomore year.
- 300-399 Upper division courses, normally taken in the junior year.
- 400-499 Upper division courses, normally taken in the senior year.
- 500-599 Graduate courses, normally limited to graduate students.

Privacy Information

The University complies with Federal and State Laws concerning privacy rights of students. These rights are summarized in the University catalog. Immigration Requirements for Licensure

On August 27, 1996, Governor Pete Wilson issued Executive Order W-135-96 which requested that the CSU and other state agencies implement "as expeditiously as reasonably practicable" the provision of The Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRAWORA) of 1996 (P.L.104-193). The Act, also known as the Welfare Reform Act, included provisions to eliminate eligibility for federal and state public benefits for certain categories of lawful immigrants as well as benefits for all illegal immigrants.

Students who will require a professional or commercial license provided by a local, state, or federal government agency in order to engage in an occupation for which the CSU may be training them must meet the immigration requirements of the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act to achieve licensure. Information concerning the regulation is available from the Vice President of Student Affairs, (310) 243-3784.

Use of Social Security Number

CSUDH provides all students with generic 9 digit student ID numbers. These ID numbers are used to identify student records, registration, and to conduct all University business. However, students are still required to provide the University with their correct social security numbers (individual taxpayer identification numbers) pursuant to the authority contained in Section 41201, Title 5, California Code of Regulations, and Section 6109 of the Internal Revenue Code. The University may, if necessary, use the social security number to collect debts owed the University. Also, the Internal Revenue Service requires the University to file information returns that include the student's social security number and other information such as the amount paid for qualified tuition, related expenses, and interest on educational loans. That information is used to help determine whether a student, or a person claiming a student as a dependent, may take a credit or deduction to reduce federal income taxes. Students who do not have a social security number at the time of enrollment will be required to obtain a social security number and submit it to the University within sixty days. Failure to furnish a correct social security number may result in the imposition of a penalty by the Internal Revenue Service.

Important Tax Credit Information

If you are enrolled in an eligible degree or certificate program or are taking courses to acquire or improve job skills, you may qualify for a Hope Scholarship or Lifetime Learning Tax Credit.

The Hope Scholarship Tax Credit

The Hope Scholarship tax credit is available only to students in their first two years of postsecondary education who are enrolled at least half-time in an eligible program. The tax credits are based on the amount of qualified tuition and fees, less grants and other tax-free educational assistance and the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income. Hope credits apply to fees paid after December 31, 1997.

The Lifetime Learning Tax Credit

The Lifetime Learning tax credit is available to students at all educational and enrollment levels who are enrolled at an eligible educational institution. As with the Hope Scholarship tax credit, this opportunity is based on the amount of qualified tuition and fees, less grants and other tax-free educational assistance and the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income. The Lifetime Learning credit applies to fees paid after June 30, 1998.

Americans with Disabilities Act

It is the policy of California State University, Dominguez Hills to comply with the Section 504 Regulations [now, Americans with Disabilities Act] adopted by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Accordingly, any student at California State University, Dominguez Hills who believes that there has been a violation of the Regulations is encouraged to discuss the matter with the Dean of their College and the campus Handicapped Regulations Coordinator and/or the Handicapped Services Coordinator and such persons as may be identified by the Handicapped Regulations Coordinator in order to resolve the matter in a prompt and equitable manner. Sexual Harassment Policy

It is the policy of California State University, Dominguez Hills, that the campus maintain a working and learning environment free from sexual harassment of its students, employees, and those who apply for student or employee status. - Submission to or toleration of the conduct is an explicit or implicit term or condition of appointment, employment, admission or academic evaluation:
- Submission to, or rejection of such conduct is used as a basis for a personnel decision or an academic evaluation:

The conduct has the purpose or effect of interfering with an employee's work performance, or creating an intimidating, hostile, offensive or otherwise adverse learning environment, or adversely affecting any student.

In determining whether conduct actually constitutes sexual harassment, the circumstances surrounding the conduct will be carefully considered. However, where the facts support the allegations, all appropriate measures including disciplinary action will be taken. Campus Smoking Policy

California State University, Dominguez Hills has a responsibility to its students and employees to provide a safe and healthful learning and working environment. The University recognizes the harmful effects of involuntary contact with smoke. It also recognizes the need to preserve the reasonable individual rights of smokers as long as doing so does not interfere with the right of the non-smoker to a smoke-free environment.

The following policy shall be effective immediately:

Smoking is prohibited in all campus buildings; including offices, work areas, classrooms, lecture halls, laboratories, libraries, theaters, practice rooms, listening rooms, gymnasiums, kitchens, hallways, stairwells, elevators, eating areas and restrooms. Certain areas external to buildings which do not have adequate ventilation (e.g. patios, stairways and walkways) may also be designated as nonsmoking areas by the Director of Environmental Health and Safety.

Smoking is prohibited in all State automobiles, vans and trucks.

Members of the campus community who willfully violate the University smoking policy will be subject to disciplinary action through recognized administrative channels and/or in accord with the applicable collective bargaining agreement.

Appropriate signs designating no smoking and smoking areas shall be posted. At least one copy of this policy shall be posted in each campus building.

Computer Labs

Student identification cards are available at the Extended Education Office. These entitle enrolled students to full use of the CSUDH Computer Labs.

Library Services

Student identification cards will entitle those enrolled in credit courses to use of the CSUDH Library.


