Who May Register

College students, graduates of high school, or individuals sufficiently knowledgeable to profit from college courses may register for Summer Sessions. High school juniors and seniors, with letters of recommendation, may enroll in lower-division courses (see details on page 6).

If you are a visiting student, it is especially important that you read the section on classification and numbering of courses. Descriptions of the courses are available in the University Catalog found in the University Bookstore.

Registration in CSUDH Summer Sessions courses does not constitute admission to the University as a regular student. If you are interested in admission to the University, inquire or apply at the University Information and Service Center, Small College Complex A-130, (310) 516-3696.

How to Register

Registration in CSUDH Summer Sessions is simple, and in most cases can be completed entirely through a mail-in procedure. Formal application to the University is not necessary, and transcripts are not required.

Some Summer Sessions courses, however, have prerequisites or special qualifications which are noted in the Schedule of Courses. In certain cases, before the request to register can be processed, permission to enroll in a course must be obtained from the instructor or department office, or students may be asked to provide proof of completion of prerequisites.

To attend Summer Sessions classes, registration for courses must be completed, including full payment of fees, by the appropriate deadline dates (refer to Calendar on page i). If you are registering for both Summer Sessions and University Extension courses, please use separate registration forms and write separate checks.

Late Registration

(For adding courses to a program, see ADD Instructions.)

The late registration period begins June 4, and concludes June 14 for the First Session. Late registration begins June 25 and concludes July 5 for the Second Session. Completion of late registration is dependent upon availability of seats for each class and is subject to a \$25.00 late registration processing fee.

Non Standard Date or Intensive Courses

In order to register for a course which begins after the first week of either Session, the student must complete the late registration procedure by the second day of this class.

Tuition

Total course fees are listed in the Schedule with the course information. Some courses, such as laboratory or activity courses, have higher costs and may have fees that are higher than the standard instructional fee.

Parking

All vehicles, including motorcycles, parked on this campus, must have a valid parking decal. Returned Checks

All returned checks, whether for insufficient funds or stop payments, are considered to be enforceable debts, and are subject to a \$10.00 fee. If your check is returned, your registration will not be processed.

Adding Courses

To add a course before the start of the Session, submit your completed Add / Drop Form and the additional tuition to the registrar in the Summer Sessions Office.

To add a course after the start of the Session, you must file a Change of Program form available in the Summer Sessions Office and have it signed by the professor for the class you want to add.

Six-week courses may be added during the first two weeks of the session. Students wishing to add an Intensive of one week or less may only add on the first day of class.

For two to three-week courses they may only add during the first two days, and for four to five-week courses students may only add during the first week of the course.

The deadline for adding courses is June 14 for the First Session and July 5 for the Second Session. Provided that you are enrolled in a Summer Sessions course at the time you choose to add an additional course, you will not be charged a late fee.

Students may exchange one class for another within the same Session without penalty, if the unit and tuition value is the same.

If you will exceed a maximum unit load by adding courses, you must also submit a Petition to Exceed Maximum Units, available in the Summer Sessions Office (refer to policy on Maximum Unit Load).

Dropping / Withdrawing

Non-attendance in class, notifying the instructor, or stopping payment on a check does NOT officially constitute dropping or withdrawing from a course. The Summer Sessions Office must be notified and appropriate form must be filled.

Dropping a Course

If you decide to drop a course, you must file a Change of Program Form with the Summer Sessions Office. (If you are dropping all courses you enrolled in, follow withdrawal procedures.) Refer also to Refund Policies.

Drop, prior to first day of Session.

To drop a six-week course before a Session begins, file a Change of Program form and an Application for Refund of Fees in the Summer Session Office.

Drop, during the first two weeks of the Session.

Summer Sessions students may drop or withdraw from any six-week course prior to and during the first two weeks of a Session without permanent record of enrollment or "W" on transcript, and without the instructor's signature.

Drop, third through fifth weeks of the Session.

During the third and until the final week of the six-week Session, the instructor's and the school dean's or associate dean's signatures for each course are required on the Change of Program form in order to drop. Non-matriculated or Summer-only students need the signatures of the instructor and the Dean of Extended Education.

If a student drops or withdraws after the second week of a six-week Session, a grade of "W" for the course(s) will appear on the student's permanent transcript.

Courses less than 1 week

Prior to the first class meeting a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned: the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. An administrative grade of "W" will be assigned if a student withdraws at any time during the course.

One Week Courses

During the first day of the week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned: the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent

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transcript. An administrative grade of "W" will be assigned if a student withdraws at any time after the first day of the week.

Two-Week Courses

During the first three days of the first week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. An administrative grade of "W" will be assigned if a student withdraws at any time after the first three days of the first week.

Three-Week Courses

During the first week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. Prior to the last two days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W". During the last two days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W" for serious and compelling reasons only.

Four and Five-Week Courses

During the first week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. Prior to the last four days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W". During the last four days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W" for serious and compelling reasons only.

Complete Withdrawal from Session

To withdraw from all courses, complete and submit a Withdrawal form, and, if you are eligible for a refund, an application for a refund of fees. Withdrawal forms are available in the Summer Sessions Office.

Complete withdrawal, prior to first day of Session. If you find it necessary to drop all courses before a Session begins, you must cancel your registration and you may be eligible to receive a full refund of fees, less a non-refundable processing fee. A completed Withdrawal Form and a

refund Application must be received by the Summer Sessions Office by June 2 for First Session or by June 23 for Second Session.

Complete withdrawal, during the first two weeks of the Session. You may withdraw during the first two weeks without a record of enrollment and without the instructor's signature. Complete a Withdrawal Form and a Refund Application and submit these forms to the Summer Sessions Office by the end of the second week.

Complete withdrawal, third through fifth week of the Session. A grade of "W" for each course appears on the permanent transcript if the student withdraws after the second week of the Session and is doing passing work. To withdraw from all courses after the second week of instruction, complete a Withdrawal form, obtain the signatures of the instructor and school dean (or Dean of Extended Education, if you are not a regular student) on the Withdrawal form. Submit these completed forms to the Summer Sessions Office.

Withdrawal from classes during final exam week (last week of Session) is not permitted, except in such cases as accident or serious illness where circumstances causing

the withdrawal are clearly beyond the student's control, and the assignment of a grade of Incomplete is not practical. Such requests require a Petition with the signature and approval of the instructor and school dean (Dean of Extended Education for Summer-only or non-matriculated students). The form is available in the Summer Sessions Office and must be filed in the Summer Sessions Office with documentation by the last day of the Session in which the student was enrolled.

Refund of Tuition Fee

Refunds are not automatic. Even if the University cancels a scheduled course, you must make an application to have your tuition fees refunded. Refunds are subject to change without notice by the Trustees of California State University System. Amounts of refund are calculated according to the Formula for Refunds established in Title 5 of the California Administrative Code. Refund Applications are available from the Summer Sessions Office. This form must be filed in person with the Summer Sessions Office. Your Schedule Confirmation and the tear off receipt from the Change of Program form (if applicable) must accompany the written request. No transaction will be

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made without a receipt. Students must submit refund requests by the published deadlines (refer to Calendar and Refund Schedule). The effective date of the refund request, for purposes of calculating amount refunded, is the day it is received by the Summer Sessions Office. Allow approximately six weeks from the date the request is received for processing refunds.

Refund of Parking Fees

Written application for a refund of parking fees must be accompanied by a permit or decal which the University has issued. Applications for refund is determined by the following policy: 50% of all remaining full weeks; however no refund for remaining periods of less than two weeks.

Refund Schedule

The formula used for calculating the amount of fees refunded for five week or longer sessions is as follows. If you apply for a refund prior to the first day of the Session, May 31 or June 21, you may receive total tuition minus \$10.00. If you apply for a refund on the first or second day of the Session, you may receive total tuition minus the fee for one unit. During the remainder of the first week of the Session, if you apply, you may receive total tuition minus one unit times 65 percent. During the second week of the Session, if you apply, you may receive total tuition minus one unit times 25 percent. After the second week, none of the fee may be refunded. The late registration fee is non-refundable. Please note that tuition refunds are based upon the start date of the Session and not upon the first day a particular course meets.

Cancelled Course Policy

If you are enrolled in a course that is cancelled for any reason, you must complete an Application for Refund or arrange for another course by completing a Change of Program form. The University does not refund fees automatically in the event of a course cancellation.

Summer Sessions Office

Small College Complex SCC B-141, 310/516-3741,

Processing of general registration, late registration, adds, drops withdrawals, and other academic transactions related to Summer Sessions enrollment will take place in the Summer Sessions Office.

The office hours are 8:00 a.m.- 7:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday during the first week of both sessions and 8:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. throughout the remainder of the summer. The office closes on Fridays at 5:00p.m., and will be closed on weekends and on July 4.

Maximum Student Unit Load

The total units a summer student may earn:

Session 1.....	7 units
Session 2.....	7 units
Sessions 1 and 2.....	10 units

Exceptions to the above are based on proven academic ability and the feasibility of the student's schedule. Students wishing to exceed these unit limits must obtain and complete a special petition available in the Summer Sessions Office and request permission from the dean of the school governing their major. Visiting students or non-matriculated students must request permission from the Dean of Extended Education.

General Studies

The General Studies program is the nucleus of the undergraduate curriculum at CSUDH, deliberately structured to provide the intellectual and effective foundation required of a well-educated person. The philosophy underlying General Studies offerings is that they are courses for non-specialists, presenting subject matter related to wider context of knowledge and stimulating interest in lifelong learning. General Studies courses present breadth, deal with representative concepts, and provide some integration of concepts. Several of the courses which comprise this curriculum are offered in

Summer Sessions. These General Studies courses are designated by the "GS" symbol next to the Schedule number. For an overview of the General Studies program consult the University Catalog, pages 80 - 87 available in the University Bookstore.

University Advisement Center

Regularly enrolled students may obtain academic advisement for their summer schedules during Spring Semester when faculty and advisors are available. The Summer Sessions Office does not provide academic advisement. Many questions are answered in the University Catalog which includes course descriptions and course prerequisites in addition to policies and programs of the University. The Catalog is sold at the University Bookstore. In addition, the University Advisement Center is available for information advisement at (310) 516-3538. School of Management Advisement Center

Social & Behavioral Sciences Building A-306 310/516-3561

Summer Sessions students who wish to enroll in any undergraduate business courses must obtain approval to enroll from the Business Advisement Center. Visiting or non-matriculated students are asked to bring transcripts, grade reports, and/or college records to the Center before seeking approval. Call 310/516-3561 for days and hours of advisement. Any student wishing to enroll in a School of Management 500-level course must receive approval and signature from the MBA Program Office located in SBS B-306.

Course Numbering System

The course numbering system for the University is based upon three-digit numbers as follows:

- 000-099 Sub-collegiate courses, not for baccalaureate credit.
- 100-199 Lower division courses, normally taken in the freshman year.
- 200-299 Lower division courses, normally taken in the sophomore year.
- 300-399 Upper division courses, normally taken in the junior year.
- 400-499 Upper division courses, normally taken in the senior year.
- 500-599 Graduate courses, normally limited to graduate students.

High School Students

Qualified high school students who will enter the junior or senior year in Fall 1996 can register for Summer Sessions lower division (100 level) courses with a letter of recommendation from the school principal or counselor and written authorization from the parents. Address letters to the Dean of Extended Education, California State University, Dominguez Hills. Students pay regular summer fees, and the course credit they earn may be applicable to a degree from CSUDH or another institution.

Grade Reports and Transcripts

Student performance in each course is reported at the end of the Session by one of the following grades (with grade points earned):

The following grades are to be used for approved courses only:

CR Credit (not counted in grade average, but units allowed). Undergraduate level only.

SP Satisfactory Progress (credit is deferred until completion of course sequence).

NC No Credit (not counted in GPA, no units allowed).

A report of final grades assigned in classes will be mailed to you about 3 weeks after the end of the session.

A student may obtain an official transcript of enrollment and grades upon completing a Request for Transcript available at the office of Records and Registration. This request should be filed no earlier than the last week of the session in which the student is enrolled. Allow at least three weeks after the end of the session for delivery of the transcript copy. A fee of \$4.00, payable at the Cashier's Office, is charged for the first transcript request. Transcripts are not issued to a student whose record indicates financial obligation to the University. Grades for nonstandard-date courses will be posted with standard course grades at end of Session.

Summer students may audit a course on a space available basis with the permission of the instructor. Auditors pay regular course fees. To enroll as an auditor, the student must submit a Change of Program form with the instructor's signature to the Summer Sessions Office.

Students must officially change their status in a course from credit to audit by the end of the first week of instruction.

Credit / No Credit Grading

In accordance with the current Credit / No Credit policies, the undergraduate Credit (CR) grade is the equivalent of an A, B or C letter grade, and the No Credit (NC) grade is the equivalent of a C-, D or F. CR / NC grades are recorded on student transcripts. An undergraduate may elect to be graded CR/NC in particular courses, subject to conditions which are described

in the University Catalog. To receive a Credit / No Credit grade in a Summer Sessions course (except when the course is graded solely on Credit / No Credit basis), the student must complete the Credit / No Credit form, available in the Summer Sessions Office by the end of the second week of instruction.

Independent Study

Independent or directed study courses are intended for the regularly enrolled, matriculated students in order to enhance or supplement their curriculum. To enroll for independent or directed study, the student must obtain a contract from the Summer Sessions Office. This contract must be completed, including the signature of Dean, and submitted with student's registration. A student will not be registered for independent or directed study unless a completed contract has been submitted. Only course numbers listed with departments may be used; be sure the correct Session and number of units are on the contract. The same registration deadlines and policies apply to independent study.

Final Examinations

Final examinations are administered during the final week the course is scheduled to meet. Usually the examination is given on the last day the the course meets. No adds or drops are accepted during or after the last week the class meets.

Entry Level Mathematics (ELM) Requirement

CSU students wishing to enroll in any Summer Sessions mathematics classes will have to provide evidence of having satisfied the ELM requirements. This requirement can be satisfied by any of the following methods.

1. Having an ELM score which meets the minimum for placement in a particular class.

2. Satisfactory test score on ACT / SAT test.
3. A transcript showing passing grades on a college level mathematics course above the level of Intermediate Algebra.

Evidence of any of the above should be sent to the Summer Sessions Office. California State University, Dominguez Hills graduates can have their records verified by the Office of Records and Registration.

Visitors from other Universities / Colleges should bring evidence that they have met the prerequisites for the course they wish to take.

Vehicles are to park "head in" using marked stalls only.

This "static" type permit can be removed and transferred to another vehicle if the need arises. Permits must be displayed in plain view without obstruction. Car covers are not recommended. Motorcycles, scooters, and mopeds have special areas for parking: SW corner of Lot 2, SE corner of Lot 3 and NW corner of Lot 4.

Visitor parking areas are located in the front of the Small College Complex, outside of Lot 3a on the north perimeter road, and the gymnasium lot. These stalls are free, no permit required for 30 minutes. Loading zones are located adjacent to major campus buildings. No permit is required for 30 minute parking.

Those who receive parking citations are reminded that pursuant of Sec. 40202 and 40500 CVC, these citations cannot be cancelled or rescinded by the University Police. Should there be significant error on the part of an officer or campus official, the issuing officer will request the court to rescind the citation.

Failure to resolve a parking citation will result in difficulty with renewal of the vehicle's registration.

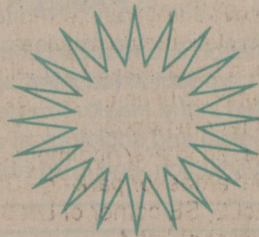

Courses offered to satisfy requirements of the following areas during Summer Session '96

ONE YEAR OF ORGANIC CHEMISTRY IN A SINGLE SUMMER

Designed for premedical and pre-dental students, this ten-week program corresponds to a full year of organic chemistry with lab. The two sequential courses offer 8 semester units the required chemistry for professional schools. The course is helpful in preparing for the DAT and MACT.

THE AMERICAN LANGUAGE & CULTURE PROGRAM

ENGLISH LANGUAGE COURSES FOR BEGINNING, INTERMEDIATE AND ADVANCED INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

The American Language and Culture Program at California State University, Dominguez Hills, has courses for international students, business people and new residents who wish to improve their English language skills. Maximum enrollment in most classes is 15 students to ensure sufficient student practice and attention from the teacher.

WORK-SITE PROGRAMS (WSP)

ALCP can offer English language and culture programs at the work-site for non-native speakers of English. Programs can be developed for a wide range of work needs: on-the-line employees who need basic communication skills and orientation to an American work environment; executives who need high-level communication skills to negotiate business and operate in social environments or other special situations. English-for-Special-Purposes (ESP) programs are often offered in industries such as hospitality, tourism and travel, import/export, banking and manufacturing. ESP programs can include safety English, industry-specific terminology and jargon, company-specific terminology and jargon, writing skills (forms, memos, reports), oral communication/pronunciation, asking questions, giving/receiving directions, clarifying, expressing opinions, and expressing safety concepts.

INTENSIVE ENGLISH PROGRAM (IEP)

IEP offers an eight-week intensive English language program five times a year for students with academic or professional goals, including passing the TOEFL for entrance into an American university. The 20-hour per week IEP (9am-1pm daily) offers a coordinated program of conversation, grammar, writing, reading/vocabulary, pronunciation and listening. Students from all over the world enroll in this multi-level program and can continue to improve their skills by advancing from session to session. Qualified students from outside the U.S. are eligible for a student visa. Individual courses may also be taken by students. A certificate of achievement is awarded after successful completion of at least one session. Language skills studied are:

Conversation

Conversation Skills offers extensive individual student practice in speaking. Students learn to use authentic language in situations related to work, school, leisure and social life. They are encouraged to express their thoughts and ideas, plus their wants and needs, in classroom situations that make extensive use of pair work, small-group discussions, and information-sharing activities. These face-to-face discussions simulate real-life social interaction, encouraging the use of eye contact, exclamations, questions, accurate intonation and emotional tone. 24 meetings per session.

Writing

Writing Skills emphasizes the process of writing and highlights the various strategies writers can use in the process. The class teaches such organizational patterns as

generalizing, describing, defining, talking about differences and similarities, and expressing cause and result. Although the focus is on content-based writing, other language skills are integrated, and practice writing is combined with speaking and listening activities. In order to gather data for their writing, students share ideas, opinions, and suggestions in pair, small group, and whole-class discussions. These brainstorming activities lead to teacher and peer analyses of student essays where the focus is on topic sentences, supporting facts, discourse markers, and concluding sentences. 24 meetings per session.

Pronunciation

The Pronunciation class helps develop clear pronunciation and American English intonation patterns for increased spoken comprehension. Students learn acceptable pronunciation of single vowel and consonant sounds, groups of sounds, stress patterns in words, and intonation patterns in sentences. Students have the opportunity to listen and practice with tapes and to express their own views and opinions under the teacher's guidance. Students receive personal attention and special homework assignments focused on their specific pronunciation and intonation problems. Further pronunciation work can be done in the University's learning laboratory. 24 meetings per session.

Grammar

The Grammar class presents the important grammatical structures in English through a process of observing, describing and using the structures in written and spoken language. Controlled and open-ended exercises and tasks are practiced in class to help the students increase their mastery over

the forms. Special attention is given to grammar points that are most difficult for students. Additionally, the ways in which grammar is tested in the TOEFL are examined and practice TOEFL exercises are done. 16 meetings per session.

Reading & Vocabulary

The focus of Reading & Vocabulary is to help students increase their vocabulary within the context of meaningful, high-interest readings. Each student will learn the skills needed to find the meanings of unfamiliar words and then incorporate them into active, everyday use. Reading and vocabulary skills will be practiced through an integrated approach that uses a variety of topics, genres, moods and styles. Interesting subjects will be read and then examined through paired discussions, small group work and whole-class activities. 16 meetings per session.

Listening Skills

The Listening Skills class allows students to develop their aural skills in a supportive, active environment. Each student is given the opportunity to participate in a variety of in-class activities using tapes, videos and guest speakers. Students listen to and learn how to appropriately respond to questions presented in meaningful language contexts. Each listening exercise allows students to progress from controlled listening activities to more complex ones. Each student will be expected to strengthen his listening skills outside the classroom through assignments involving TV, radio and community service projects that require interaction with American speakers. Additional practice is available through tapes in the University's Learning Labs. 16 meetings per session.

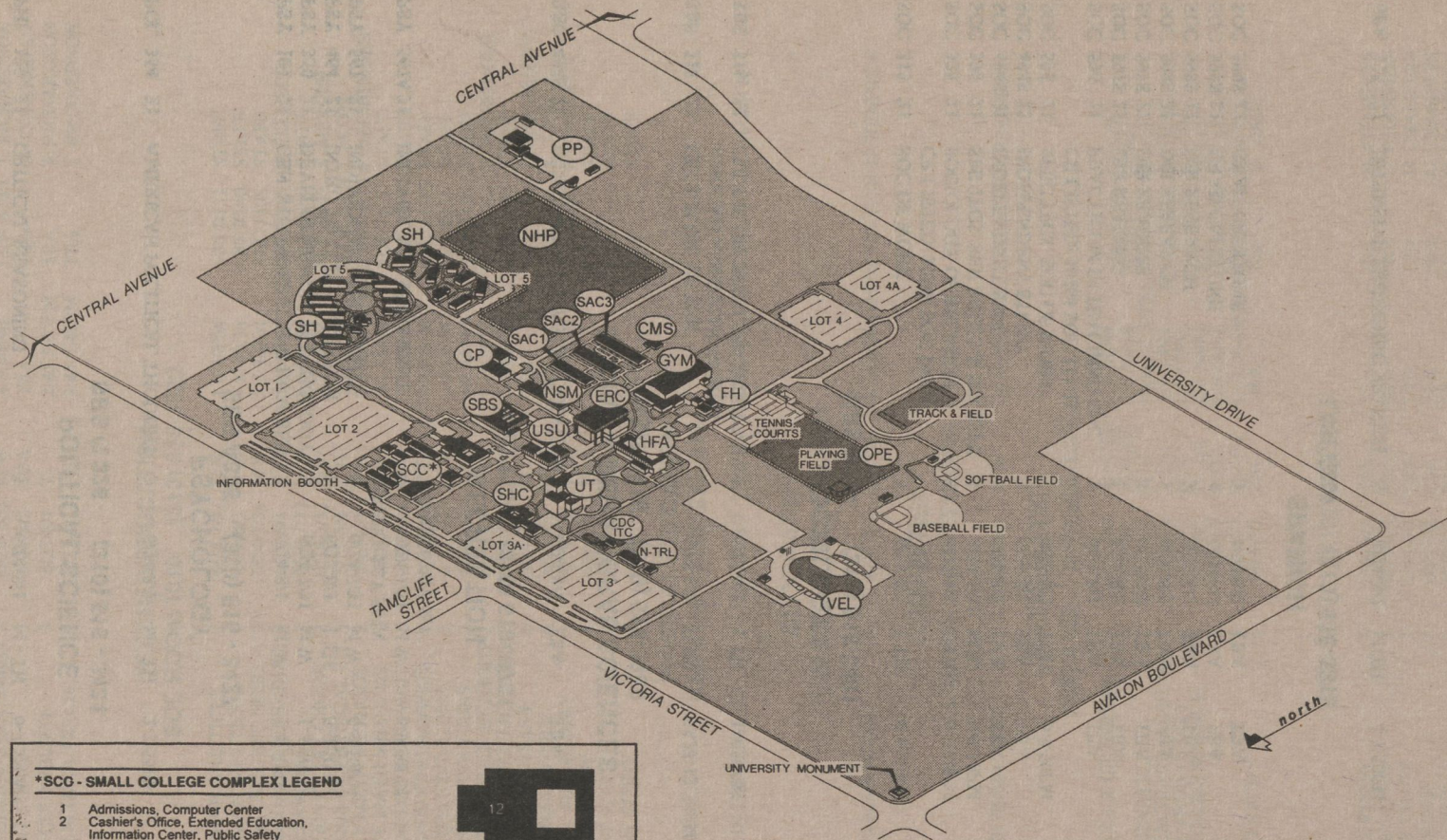

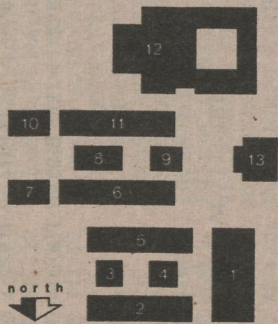
