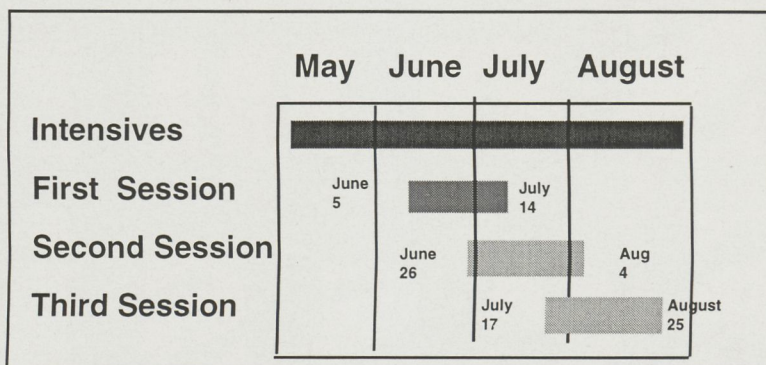

SUMMER TOUCHTONE REGISTRATION DATES

1st Session: April 3-June 4 • 2nd Session: April 3-June 25 • 3rd Session: April 3-July 16

Touchtone will be up between 6am-midnight, Monday-Saturday. If you need additional assistance, you may select the option to transfer to an operator during office hours.

Welcome to T.O.R.O.S., the Division of Extended Education at California State University Dominguez Hills Touchtone Registration and Billing System. During the Fall and Spring semesters, you may register and drop courses by Touchtone up to the day before the course begins. During the Winter and Summer Sessions, you may register and drop courses only up to the day before the session begins. Touchtone Registration for Extended Education courses is available only to students paying in FULL at the time of registration by credit card, and/or students with approved Financial Aid Award from CSUDH. You may pay by VISA, DISCOVER CARD, OR MASTERCARD. You will receive written confirmation of your registration within seven days from the date of registration.

Failure to pay in full for your classes at the time of registration may result in the immediate cancellation of your courses. If a Third Party pays your fees, please call (310) 243-3741 to register and make payment arrangements. All continuing students and students who have prior records at CSUDH are eligible to register via Touchtone. If you are enrolling for the first time at CSUDH, please call the Division of Extended Education at (310) 243-3741 to register if paying by credit card. First time enrollees may register by mailing their registration forms to the address provided in the catalog or by faxing their registration to (310) 516-3971. Access to grades and GPA information is now available on a separate line. Please call (310) 516-4308 to listen to your grades.

T.O.R.O.S. Checklist

- √ Read the information and instructions in your catalog.
- √ Note enrollment restrictions, prerequisite and co-requisite requirements.
- √ Complete the Registration Worksheet before attempting to register.
- √ Prepare a list of alternate sections in case your first choice classes are not available.
- √ Call T.O.R.O.S. (310) 516-3409 -3416 from any Touchtone telephone.
- √ Change your PIN (for security reasons).
- √ Make your entries permanent before exiting the system. Failure to do so will result in cancellation of your course requests.
- √ Refer to the "Troubleshooting" section if you encounter difficulty.
- √ Call back to add, waitlist, drop or review your schedule at any time after registering for your courses.
- √ Check your account balance to confirm that your payment has been received and credited to your account.

Student Identification Number (SID)

Your 9-digit Social Security Number is your Student Identification number.

Personal Identification Number

Your personal identification Number is your birth date (DDMMYY). For example, if you were born on April 12, 1972, your initial PIN number will be 041272. You are urged to change your PIN for security reasons and to keep your PIN in a safe place. Do not write your PIN in your Class Schedule. You may change your PIN by dialing T.O.R.O.S. and making the appropriate selection at the main menu. The recorded voice will guide you.

T.O.R.O.S. Information Making your Entries

Permanent: It is very important to make your entries permanent before exiting T.O.R.O.S. Failure to do so will result in cancellation of your request(s).

Co-requisites: Some courses require concurrent enrollments in laboratory or activity sections as well as in lecture or seminar sections, or concurrent enrollment in one or more other courses. Failure to add/waitlist both or all co-requisites will result in being dropped from your original request.

Enrollment restrictions: Some courses are restricted to students in specific degree programs, to specific class levels (e.g. seniors) or to certain student levels (e.g. graduates).

Some departments may choose not to print course reference numbers (CRN's) in the Course Listing section of the Class Schedule in order to screen students for eligibility. Other courses may not be available through T.O.R.O.S. but may be added with the instructor's approval.

Students who are not eligible for restricted courses may be able to obtain approval from the department in special circumstances. A signature of approval must be obtained from the appropriate department representative

Time conflicts: T.O.R.O.S. checks for time conflicts and will not allow registration in classes meeting at the same time. Students with permission from both instructors to enroll in classes with time conflicts will need to register in-person.

Full classes: If you attempt to register for a class that is already full, you will be given two options:

- 1) to check for open sections of the same course.
- 2) to place yourself on a waitlist for the requested section.

In order to secure a seat in the class, it is recommended that you check for open sections first and register for an open section, if any. If no open sections exist, you may wish to place yourself on a waitlist for the full section of your choice.

Cancelled classes: If you register for a course that is subsequently cancelled, you will receive written notification from the Division of Extended Education and should register for an alternate class or section as soon as possible. If you do not wish to enroll for an alternate class, you will be automatically issued a full refund for the canceled class.

Schedule adjustment/Schedule review: Remember, you may call back any time during the Registration period to change or review your schedule. If you choose to exchange one class for another, add the new class before dropping the other class (unless you have reached the maximum enrollment limit.)

11 STEPS TO REGISTER

Step 1

Call T.O.R.O.S. @ (310) 516-3409 through 3416.

Step 2

Press 1 for registration information.

Step 3

Press 1 to register for classes.

Step 4

Enter your 9-digit Student I.D. Number (Social Security Number).

Step 5

Enter PIN (personal I.D. number). Your PIN Number is your birth date (MMDDYY). Example: 041272 (April 12, 1972).

Step 6

Press 1 to register or drop classes, or 2 to review your schedule or 9 to return to main menu.

Step 7

If you entered 1 in Step 6, select one of the following options:

- √ Press 1 to add (go to step 8) or,
- √ Press 2 to drop.
- √ Press 3 to make your entries permanent (REQUIRED FOR ALL REGISTRATIONS AND DROPS).
- √ Press 4 to check course availability.
- √ Press 5 to list (review) your current schedule.
- √ Press 9 to return to main menu.

Step 8

Enter Course Reference Numbers from your registration worksheet. T.O.R.O.S. will announce the course and section. T.O.R.O.S. will prompt you to enter additional course reference numbers, or enter * and # to end this option and return to the previous menu (1 to add, 2 to drop, 3 to make your entries permanent and pay by credit card, etc.).

Step 9

If the course is full, Press 1 to Check for Open Sections or 2 to Waitlist.

Step 10

When you have entered all your Course Reference Numbers, press the * key followed by the # key to return to step 7. Press 3 to make your entries permanent. Do not hang up without completing this step. Failure to make your entries permanent will result in the cancellation of your registration and in losing all your entries. Stay on the line until the system completes this step and confirms the courses you are enrolled in. Once completed, press 1.

Step 11

If you have finished adding classes, press the * key and the number 6 to go back to the main menu. YOU MUST NOW PAY FOR YOUR COURSES BY CREDIT CARD. FAILURE TO PAY IN FULL FOR YOUR COURSES WILL RESULT IN THE IMMEDIATE CANCELLATION OF ALL YOUR COURSE ENTRIES. To proceed, press 2.

- √ To end this call at any time, press the * key followed by the 9 key.
- √ To return to the selections you heard at the beginning of the call, press the * followed by the 6 key.
- √ To have a prompt or selection repeated, press the * key followed by the 7 key. √ For menu help, press the * key followed by the 4 key at any time

Important Information:

Whenever you adjust your schedule, call back and review your schedule. Verify your entries against your worksheet. Verify your worksheet against the Schedule of Classes. You are responsible for dropping any unwanted courses and ensuring that you are properly registered.

Waitlist Instructions

Follow steps 1 - 6.

At step 7, press 1 to Register or Add. If the course is full, you will hear:

Example: "Ted 411, section 72, course request number 12345 is closed. To check for open sections of this course, press 1. A waiting list is open for this course; there are currently _ people on the waitlist. If you would like to be put on the waitlist, press 2, otherwise press 3."

Press 1 to check for open sections of the course and register for an alternate section if possible, to maximize your enrolled units. If you decide to register for an alternate section, follow steps 9 and 10.

If there are no available alternate sections or if you choose not to register for one, press the * star key followed by the # pound key to go back to the previous menu. You are now back at step 8.

To waitlist your first choice section:

At step 7, press 1 to Register or Add. Follow Step 9.

Press 2 to Waitlist.

You will hear:

Example: " When you make

your entries permanent, you will be waitlisted for TED 411, section 72, course request number 12345." Complete your registration and follow step 10. You will not be on the Waitlist if you do not to make your entries permanent.

Note: After the third invalid entry or if there are system problems, you will be transferred to an operator for help. For additional assistance, call the Registration help line (310) 243-3741.

Credit Card Payment Instructions

Press 1 for Account Balance. Select the term for which you would like billing information. Enter your nine digit Student ID Number (social security number).

Enter your Personal Identification Number (PIN).

1. Press 1 to review your balance (the current account balance will be spoken).

2. Press 2 to pay by credit card. Select type of credit card you will use to pay:

Press 1 for Visa.

Press 2 for MasterCard.

Press 3 for Discover Card

3. Enter your credit card number (The number you have entered will be spoken back for verification).

Press 1 if the number repeated is correct.

Press 2 if the number is incorrect and reenter the credit card number.

4. Enter your credit card Expiration Date ((The expiration date you have entered will be spoken back for verification)

Press 1 if the expiration date repeated is correct.

Press 2 if the expiration date is incorrect and reenter the expiration date.

5. Select the amount you wish to pay.

Press 1 to pay the full amount you currently owe.

Press 1 if the amount entered is repeated correctly.

Press 2 to enter a different amount.

The system will place you on hold while your credit card is authorized. The system will inform you that your credit card has been accepted and will instruct you to hold while your payment is applied to your account. If you credit card is denied, you may start over with a different credit card. (Note: you will need to contact your credit card issuer if you wish to find out why your card has been denied.)

When the payment is applied to your account, the system will indicate the remaining amount due for the account, if any. Press 9 to exit the main menu.

Troubleshooting

√ Can't access T.O.R.O.S.?

Check you are dialing the correct number. Are you using a true touch tone telephone? Not all push-button telephones are touchtone. Further, programmable telephones using the "#" or "*" key in programming cause access problems. Try another phone. To register while on campus, you may use the campus pay phones or the courtesy phones located throughout the campus.

√ T.O.R.O.S. not available?

Check date and hours of operation. If the system is not available during scheduled hours, try again later.

√ Busy signal? All lines are busy: Try again later.

√ Made a mistake?

Do not hang up: Wait for the recorded voice to prompt you.

√ Not able to register for a specific course?

Check for footnotes in the course offerings section. The course may:
 1) be full. Select Option 4 to listen to alternate open sections or place yourself on the waitlist;
 2) be a duplicate section of a course in which you are already registered;
 3) have a conflict with another course in which you are already registered;
 4) be restricted to certain majors, class levels or student levels;

5) require screening in the department (CRN may not be printed);
 6) require one or more co-requisite sections.

√ Unable to get on a Waitlist?

Check to make sure course is closed. You may only waitlist for courses that are closed or that are open with existing waitlists.

Who May Register

College students, graduates of high school, or individuals sufficiently knowledgeable to profit from college courses may register for Summer Sessions. High school juniors and seniors, with letters of recommendation, may enroll in lower-division courses (see details on page 11).

If you are a visiting student, it is especially important that you read the section on classification and numbering of courses. Descriptions of the courses are available in the University Catalog found in the University Bookstore.

Registration in CSUDH Summer Sessions courses does not constitute admission to the University as a regular student. If you are interested in admission to the University, inquire or apply at the University Information and Service Center, Small College Complex A-130, (310) 243-3696.

How to Register

Registration in CSUDH Summer Sessions is simple, and in most cases can be completed entirely through a mail-in procedure. Formal application to the University is not necessary, and transcripts are not required. Some Summer Sessions courses, however, have prerequisites or special qualifications which are noted in the Schedule of Courses. In certain cases, before the request to register can be processed, permission to enroll in a course must be obtained from the instructor or department office, or students may be asked to provide proof of completion of prerequisites. To attend Summer Sessions classes, registration for courses must be completed, including full payment of fees, by the appropriate deadline dates (refer to Calendar on page 2). If you are registering for both Summer Sessions and University Extension courses, please use separate registration forms and write separate checks.

Late Registration

(For adding courses to a program, see ADD Instructions.)

The late registration period begins June 6, and concludes June 16 for the First Session. Late registration begins June 27 and concludes July 7 for the Second Session. Late registration for the Third Session begins July 18 and concludes July 28. Completion of late registration is dependent upon availability of seats for each class and is subject to a \$25.00 late registration processing fee.

Non Standard Date or Intensive Courses

In order to register for a course which begins after the first week of any session, the student must complete the late registration procedure by the second day of this class.

Tuition

Total course fees are listed in the Schedule with the course information. Some courses, such as laboratory or activity courses, have higher costs and may have fees that are higher than the standard instructional fee.

Parking

Returned Checks

All returned checks, whether for insufficient funds or stop payments, are considered to be enforceable debts, and are subject to a \$25.00 fee*. If your check is returned, your registration will not be processed.

Adding Courses

To add a course before the start of the session, submit your completed Add / Drop form and the additional tuition to the registrar in the Summer Sessions Office.

To add a course after the start of the session, you must file a Change of Program form available in the Summer Sessions Office and have it signed by the professor for the class you want to add.

Six-week courses may be added during the first two weeks of the session. Students wishing to add an Intensive of one week or less may only add on the first day of class. For two to three-week courses they may only add during the first two days, and for four to five-week courses students may only add during the first week of the course.

The deadline for adding courses is June 16 for the First Session, July 7 for the Second Session, and July 28 for the Third Session. Provided that you are enrolled in a Summer Sessions course at the time you choose to add an additional course, you will not be charged a late fee.

Students may exchange one class for another within the same session without penalty, if the unit and tuition value is the same.

If you will exceed a maximum unit load by adding courses, you must also submit a Petition to Exceed Maximum Units, available in the Summer Sessions Office (refer to policy on Maximum Unit Load).

Dropping / Withdrawing

Non-attendance in class, notifying the instructor, or stopping payment on a check does NOT officially constitute dropping or withdrawing from a course. The Summer Sessions Office must be notified and appropriate form must be filed.

Dropping a Course

If you decide to drop a course, you must file a Change of Program form with the Summer Sessions Office. (if you are dropping all courses you enrolled in, follow withdrawal procedures.) Refer also to Refund Policies.

Drop, prior to first day of session.

To drop a six-week course before a session begins, file a Change of Program form and an application for Refund of Fees in the Summer Sessions Office.

Drop, during the first two weeks of the session.

Summer Sessions students may drop or withdraw from any six-week course prior to and during the first two weeks of a session without permanent record of enrollment or "W" on transcript, and without the instructor's signature.

Drop, third through fifth weeks of the session.

During the third and until the final week of the six-week session, the instructor's and the school dean's or associate dean's signatures for each course are required on the Change of Program form in order to drop. Non-matriculated or Summer-only students need the signatures of the instructor and the Dean of Extended Education.

If a student drops or withdraws after the second week of a six-week session, a grade of "W" for the course(s) will appear on the student's permanent transcript.

Courses less than 1 week

Prior to the first class meeting a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned: the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. An administrative grade of "W" will be assigned if a student withdraws at any time during the course.

One Week Courses

During the first day of the week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned: the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent

transcript. An administrative grade of "W" will be assigned if a student withdraws at any time after the first day of the week.

Two-Week Courses

During the first three days of the first week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. An administrative grade of "W" will be assigned if a student withdraws at any time after the first three days of the first week.

Three-Week Courses

During the first week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. Prior to the last two days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W". During the last two days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W" for serious and compelling reasons only.

Four and Five-Week Courses

During the first week a student may withdraw and no grade is assigned; the enrollment does not appear on the student's permanent transcript. Prior to the last four days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W". During the last four days of the session a student may withdraw with a "W" for serious and compelling reasons only.

Complete Withdrawal from session

To withdraw from all courses, complete and submit a Withdrawal form, and, if you are eligible for a refund, an application for a refund of fees. Withdrawal forms are available in the Summer Sessions Office.

Complete withdrawal, prior to first day of session. If you find it necessary to drop all courses before a session begins, you must cancel your registration and you may be eligible to receive a full refund of fees, less a non-refundable processing fee. A completed Withdrawal form and a

Refund Application must be received by the Summer Sessions Office by June 2 for First Session, June 23 for Second Session and July 14 for the Third Session.

Complete withdrawal, during the first two weeks of the session. You may withdraw during the first two weeks without a record of enrollment and without the instructor's signature. Complete a Withdrawal form and a Refund Application and submit these forms to the Summer Sessions Office by the end of the second week.

Complete withdrawal, third through fifth week of the session. A grade of "W" for each course appears on the permanent transcript if the student withdraws after the second week of the session and is doing passing work. To withdraw from all courses after the second week of instruction, complete a Withdrawal form, obtain the signatures of the instructor and school dean (or Dean of Extended Education, if you are not a regular student) on the Withdrawal form. Submit these completed forms to the Summer Sessions Office.

Withdrawal from classes during final exam week (last week of session) is not permitted, except in such cases as accident or serious illness where circumstances causing

the withdrawal are clearly beyond the student's control, and the assignment of a grade of Incomplete is not practical. Such requests require a Petition with the signature and approval of the instructor and school dean (Dean of Extended Education for Summer-only or non-matriculated students). The form is available in the Summer Sessions Office and must be filed in the Summer Sessions Office with documentation by the last day of the session in which the student was enrolled.

Refund of Tuition Fee

Refunds are not automatic. Even if the University cancels a scheduled course, you must make an application to have your tuition fees refunded. Refunds are subject to change without notice by the Trustees of California State University System. Amounts of refund are calculated according to the Formula for Refunds established in Title 5 of the California Administrative Code. Refund Applications are available from the Summer Sessions Office. This form must be filed in person with the Summer Sessions Office. Your Schedule Confirmation and the tear off receipt from the Change of Program form (if applicable) must accompany the written request. No transaction will

be made without a receipt. Students must submit refund requests by the published deadlines (refer to Calendar and Refund Schedule). The effective date of the refund request, for purposes of calculating amount refunded, is the day it is received by the Summer Sessions Office. Allow approximately six weeks from the date the request is received for processing refunds.

Refund Schedule

The formula used for calculating the amount of fees refunded for five week or longer sessions is as follows. If you apply for a refund prior to the first day of the session, June 2, June 23, or July 14, you may receive total tuition minus \$10.00. If you apply for a refund on the first or second day of the session, you may receive total tuition minus the fee for one unit. During the remainder of the first week of the session, if you apply, you may receive total tuition minus one unit times 65 percent. During the second week of the session, if you apply, you may receive total tuition minus one unit times 25 percent. After the second week, none of the fee may be refunded. The late registration fee is non-refundable. **Please note that tuition refunds are based upon the start date of the session and not upon the first day a particular course meets.**

Cancelled Course Policy

If you are enrolled in a course that is cancelled for any reason, you must complete an Application for Refund or arrange for another course by completing a Change of Program form. The University does not refund fees automatically in the event of a course cancellation.

Refund of Parking Fees

Written application for a refund of parking fees must be accompanied by a permit or decal which the University has issued. Applications for refunds are determined by the following policy: 50% of all remaining full weeks; however no refund is issued for remaining periods of less than two weeks.

Processing of general registration, late registration, adds, drops, withdrawals, and other academic transactions related to Summer Sessions enrollment will take place in the Summer Sessions Office.

The office hours are 8am - 7pm, Monday through Thursday during the first week of both sessions and 8am - 6pm throughout the remainder of the summer. The office closes on Fridays at 5pm, and is open on Saturdays from 8am-1:30pm and will be closed on July 4.

Maximum Student Unit Load

The total units a summer student may earn:

Session 1.....	7 units
Session 2.....	7 units
Session 3.....	7 units
Sessions 1, 2 and 3.....	10 units

Exceptions to the above are based on proven academic ability and the feasibility of the student's schedule. Students wishing to exceed these unit limits must obtain and complete a special petition available in the Summer Sessions Office and request permission from the dean of the school governing their major. Visiting students or non-matriculated students must request permission from the Dean of Extended Education.

General Studies

The General Studies program is the nucleus of the undergraduate curriculum at CSUDH, deliberately structured to provide the intellectual and effective foundation required of a well-educated person. The philosophy underlying General Studies offerings is that they are courses for non-specialists, presenting subject matter related to wider context of knowledge and stimulating interest in lifelong learning. General Studies courses present breadth, deal with representative concepts, and provide some integration of concepts.

Several of the courses which comprise this curriculum are offered in Summer Sessions. For an overview of the General Studies program consult the University Catalog, pages 73-78 available in the University Bookstore.

Course Numbering System

The course numbering system for the University is based upon three-digit numbers as follows:

- 000-099 Sub-collegiate courses, not for baccalaureate credit.
- 100-199 Lower division courses, normally taken in the freshman year.
- 200-299 Lower division courses, normally taken in the sophomore year.
- 300-399 Upper division courses, normally taken in the junior year.
- 400-499 Upper division courses, normally taken in the senior year.
- 500-599 Graduate courses, normally limited to graduate students.

High School Students

Qualified high school students who will enter the junior or senior year in Fall 2000 can register for Summer Sessions lower division (100 level) courses with a letter of recommendation from the school principal or counselor and written authorization from the parents. Address letters to the Dean of Extended Education, California State University, Dominguez Hills. Students pay regular summer fees, and the course credit they earn may be applicable to a degree from CSUDH or another institution.

The following grades are to be used for approved courses only:

CR Credit (not counted in grade average, but units allowed). Undergraduate level only.

SP Satisfactory Progress (credit is deferred until completion of course sequence).

NC No Credit (not counted in GPA, no units allowed).

A report of final grades assigned in classes will be mailed to you about 3 weeks after the end of the session.

A student may obtain an official transcript of enrollment and grades upon completing a Request for Transcript available at the office of Records and Registration. This request should be filed no earlier than the last week of the session in which the student is enrolled. Allow at least three weeks after the end of the session for delivery of the transcript copy. A fee of \$4.00, payable at the Cashier's Office, is charged for the first transcript request. Transcripts are not issued to a student whose record indicates a financial obligation to the University. Grades for nonstandard-date courses will be posted with standard course grades at end of session.

Summer students may audit a course on a space available basis with the permission of the instructor.

Auditors pay regular course fees. To enroll as an auditor, the student must submit a Change of Program form with the instructor's signature to the Summer Sessions Office.

Students must officially change their status in a course from credit to audit by the end of the first week of instruction.

Students may learn their grades by calling the Grades Hotline: (310) 516-4308 or by using the kiosks on campus (see page 9).

Credit / No Credit Grading

In accordance with the current Credit / No Credit policies, the undergraduate Credit (CR) grade is the equivalent of an A, B or C letter grade, and the No Credit (NC) grade is the equivalent of a C-, D or F. CR / NC grades are recorded on student tran-

scripts. An undergraduate may elect to be graded CR/NC in particular courses, subject to conditions which are described in the University Catalog. To receive a Credit / No Credit grade in a Summer Sessions course (except when the course is graded solely on Credit / No Credit basis), the student must complete the Credit / No Credit form, available in the Summer Sessions Office by the end of the second week of instruction.

Independent Study

Independent or directed study courses are intended for the regularly enrolled, matriculated students in order to enhance or supplement their curriculum. To enroll for independent or directed study, the student must obtain a contract from the Summer Sessions Office. This contract must be completed, including the signature of the dean, and submitted with student's registration. A student will not be registered for independent or directed study unless a completed contract has been submitted. Only course numbers listed with departments may be used; be sure the correct session and number of units are on the contract. The same registration deadlines and policies apply to independent study.

Final Examinations

Final examinations are administered during the final week the course is scheduled. Usually the examination is given on the last day the course meets. No adds or drops are accepted during or after the last week.

Entry Level Mathematics (ELM) Requirement

CSU students wishing to enroll in any of the following Summer Sessions mathematics classes will have to provide evidence of having satisfied the ELM requirements: MAT 009, 105, 107, 131, 153 and 207. This requirement can be satisfied by any of the following methods.

Summer 2000

1. Having an ELM score which meets the minimum for placement in a particular class.
2. Satisfactory test score on ACT / SAT test.
3. A transcript showing passing grades on a college level mathematics course above the level of Intermediate Algebra.

Evidence of any of the above should be sent to the Summer Sessions Office. California State University, Dominguez Hills graduates can have their records verified by the Office of Records and Registration. Valid approval stamps to enroll in MAT 009, 105, 107, 131, 153 and 207 may be obtained at the University Advisement Center or at the Math Department Office. Visitors from other Universities / Colleges should bring evidence that they have met the prerequisites for the course they wish to take.

Students can now print their own schedule confirmations, grades, and unofficial transcripts without having to visit the Office of Extended Education for these services. To access these features, students will need an ID number and a pin number. The ID number is their Social Security number, and the initial PIN number is the student's birthdate. (Students are encouraged to change this PIN number after the initial log-in.)

Privacy Information

The University complies with Federal and State laws concerning privacy rights of students. These rights are summarized in the University Catalog. Questions about privacy rights may be directed to the Dean of Extended Education at (310) 243-3737 or the Vice President for student Affairs at (310) 243-3784.

Use of Social Security Number

Students are required to provide the university with their correct social security numbers (individual taxpayer identification numbers) pursuant to the authority contained in Section 41201, Title 5, California Code of Regulations, and Section 6109 of the Internal Revenue Code. The University uses the social security number to identify records pertaining to the student and, if needed, to collect debts owed the University. Also, the Internal Revenue Service requires the University to file information returns that include the student's social security number and other information such as the amount paid for qualified tuition, related expenses, and interest on educational loans. That information is used to help determine whether a student, or a person claiming a student as a dependent, may take a credit or deduction to reduce federal income taxes. Students who do not have a social security number at the time of enrollment will be required to obtain a social security number and submit it to the University within sixty days. Failure to furnish a correct social security number may result in the imposition of a penalty by the Internal Revenue Service.

Important Tax Credit Information

If you are enrolled in an eligible degree or certificate program or are taking courses to acquire or improve job skills, you may qualify for a **Hope Scholarship or Lifetime Learning Tax Credit**. The Hope Scholarship tax credit is available only to students in their first two years of postsecondary education who are enrolled at least half-time in an eligible program. The tax credits are based on the amount of qualified tuition and fees, less grants and other tax-free educational assistance and the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income. Hope credits apply to fees paid after December 31, 1997. **The Lifetime Learning Tax Credit** The Lifetime Learning tax credit is available to students at all educational and enrollment levels who are enrolled at an eligible educational institution. As with the Hope Scholarship tax credit, this opportunity is based on the amount of qualified tuition and fees, less grants and other tax-free educational assistance and the taxpayer's modified adjusted gross income. The Lifetime Learning credit applies to fees paid after June 30, 1998. Consult IRS Publication 970 or your tax preparer for additional information on both programs.

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973

California State University, Dominguez Hills is an equal opportunity/affirmative action institution. On August 27, 1996, Governor Pete Wilson issued Executive Order W-135-96 which requested that the CSU and other state agencies implement "as expeditiously as reasonably practicable" the provision of The Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRAWORA) of 1996 (P.L.104-193). The Act, also known as the Welfare Reform Act, included provisions to eliminate eligibility for federal and state public benefits for certain categories of lawful immigrants as well as benefits for all illegal immigrants.

Students who will require a professional or commercial license provided by a local, state, or federal government agency in order to engage in an occupation for which the CSU may be training them must meet the immigration requirements of the new Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act to achieve licensure. A detailed study of organic molecular structure, reaction mechanisms stereochemistry, and synthesis with emphasis on a aliphatic and aromatic systems. Three hours of lecture per week.

**CHE 301 Organic Chemistry
Laboratory I
(1) (Summer Only)**

Prerequisites: CHE 112 or 1 year of general chemistry; concurrent enrollment in CHE 300.

Basic experimental techniques of organic chemistry. Three hours of laboratory per week.

**CHE 302 Organic Chemistry II
(3) (Summer Only)**

Prerequisites: CHE 300 and CHE 301. Concurrent enrollment in CHE 303.

Continuation of CHE 300 with emphasis on the chemistry of organic compounds containing oxygen and nitrogen. Three hours of lecture per week.

**CHE 303 Organic Laboratory II
(1) (Summer Only)**

Prerequisites: CHE 112 or 1 year of general chemistry; concurrent enrollment in CHE 302.

Preparation of organic compounds and qualitative organic analysis. Three hours of laboratory per week.

THE AMERICAN LANGUAGE & CULTURE PROGRAM

ESL

ENGLISH LANGUAGE COURSES FOR Beginning, Intermediate and Advanced International students

The American Language and Culture Program at California State University, Dominguez Hills, has courses for international students, business people and new residents who wish to improve their English language skills. Maximum enrollment in most classes is 15 students to ensure sufficient student practice and attention from the teacher.

WORK-SITE PROGRAMS (WSP)

ALCP can offer English language and culture programs at the work-site for non-native speakers of English. Programs can be developed for a wide range of work needs: on-the-line employees who need basic communication skills and orientation to an American work environment; executives who need high-level communication skills to negotiate business and operate in social environments or other special situations. English-for-Special-Purposes (ESP) programs are often offered in industries such as hospitality, tourism and travel, import/export, banking and manufacturing. ESP programs can include safety English, industry-specific terminology and jargon, company-specific terminology and jargon, writing skills (forms, memos,

reports), oral communication/pronunciation, asking questions, giving/receiving directions, clarifying, expressing opinions, and expressing safety concepts.

INTENSIVE ENGLISH PROGRAM (IEP)

IEP offers an eight-week intensive English language program five times a year for students with academic or professional goals, including passing the TOEFL for entrance into an American university. The 20-hour per week IEP (9am-1pm daily) offers a coordinated program of conversation, grammar, writing, reading/vocabulary, pronunciation and listening. Students from all over the world enroll in this multi-level program and can continue to improve their skills by advancing from session to session. Qualified students from outside the U.S. are eligible for a student visa. Individual courses may also be taken by students. A certificate of achievement is awarded after successful completion of at least one session. Language skills studied are:

Conversation

Conversation Skills offers extensive individual student practice in speaking. Students learn to use authentic language in situations related to work, school, leisure and social life. They are encouraged to express their thoughts and ideas, plus their wants and needs, in classroom situations that make extensive use of pair work, small-group discussions, and information-sharing activities. These face-to-face discussions simulate real-life social interaction, encouraging the use of eye contact, exclamations, questions, accurate intonation and emotional tone.

Writing

Writing Skills emphasizes the process of writing and highlights the various strategies writers can use in the process. The class teaches such organizational patterns as generalizing, describing, defining, talking about differences and similarities, and expressing cause and result. Although the focus is on content-based writing, other language skills are integrated, and practice writing is combined with speaking and listening activities. In order to gather data for their writing, students share ideas, opinions, and suggestions in pair, small group, and whole-class discussions. These brainstorming activities lead to teacher and peer analyses of student essays where the focus is on topic sentences, supporting facts, discourse markers, and concluding sentences.

Pronunciation

The Pronunciation class helps develop clear pronunciation and American English intonation patterns for increased spoken comprehension. Students learn acceptable pronunciation of single vowel and consonant sounds, groups of sounds, stress patterns in words, and intonation patterns in sentences. Students have the opportunity to listen and practice with tapes and to express their own views and opinions under the teacher's guidance. Students receive personal attention and special homework assignments focused on their specific pronunciation and intonation problems. Further pronunciation work can be done in the University's learning laboratory.

Grammar

The Grammar class presents the important grammatical structures in English through a process of observing, describing and using the structures in written and spoken language. Controlled and open-ended exercises and tasks are practiced in class to help the students increase their mastery over the forms. Special attention is given to grammar points that are most difficult for students. Additionally, the ways in which grammar is tested in the TOEFL are examined and practice TOEFL exercises are done.

Reading & Vocabulary

The focus of Reading & Vocabulary is to help students increase their vocabulary within the context of meaningful, high-interest readings. Each student will learn the skills needed to find the meanings of unfamiliar words and then incorporate them into active, everyday use. Reading and vocabulary

skills will be practiced through an integrated approach that uses a variety of topics, genres, moods and styles. Interesting subjects will be read and then examined through paired discussions, small group work and whole-class activities.

Listening Skills

The Listening Skills class allows students to develop their aural skills in a supportive, active environment. Each student is given the opportunity to participate in a variety of in-class activities using tapes, videos and guest speakers. Students listen to and learn how to appropriately respond to questions presented in meaningful language contexts. Each listening exercise allows students to progress from controlled

listening activities to more complex ones. Each student will be expected to strengthen his listening skills outside the classroom through assignments involving TV, radio and community service projects that require interaction with American speakers. Additional practice is available through tapes in the University's Learning Labs.
