2023 Zero Waste Action Plan Update

Updated August 1, 2024



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2023 Calendar Year Update

Since the implementation of the Zero Waste Action Plan in 2020, volumes from Republic Services currently tracked by the Office of Sustainability were used for the purposes of internal and state recycling reporting. The service level varied throughout the calendar year due to ongoing right-sizing efforts in alignment with campus activities. Each monthly invoice took account of the number of trash bins at each location.

Based on the available data compared to 2021, CSUDH generated the following tonnages in 2023:

In order to achieve a 90% diversion rate assuming similar waste generation volumes year by year, CSUDH would need to identify solutions that would divert or avoid 595 more tons of trash from ending up in the landfill.

Types of Waste Generated on Campus

Styrofoam, plastic straws, plastic cutlery, plastic film, saran wrap, compostable ware, foil, paper towels, food wrappers, waxy paper beverage cups are common landfill items on campus. Republic Services, the campus waste hauler, does not accept 100% plant-fiber based materials at this time. Much of this waste is generated from food or beverage packaging imported in by commuter students and staff as CSUDH does not have a dining hall (only a commercial food court). The in-house Dining provider attempts to use compostable ware, however, Republic Services does not accept compostable ware or non-food organics (including food soiled paper) unlike other haulers which limits diversion opportunities.

Waste Prevention/ Re-use

Infrastructure

- The Office of Sustainability created a Zero Waste Training video in December 2023 that became required, assigned, training for all employees via CSU Learn in January 2024. This helps support <u>SB 1383</u> annual training requirements for all employees.
- The Office of Sustainability worked with Campus Dining to remove remaining single-use plastic utensils and straws and replaced them with wooden cutlery and paper straws throughout the 2023 calendar year. Campus Dining also phased out all non-compliant food service packaging per <u>SB 1335</u>.
- Campus Dining continues to use the Toro Token program, which was launched Fall
 of 2019, where any customer can buy a \$5 token and exchange it to get a clean
 reusable container instead of a disposable container for their meals. Dining collects
 and washes the dirty/returned containers and hands back the token to the user
 which they can exchange for a clean container on their next visit. Approximately 500
 reusable containers are now in circulation as a result.
- Campus Dining also has a "bring your own coffee mug" program, which incentivizes the consumer with 10 cents off each time someone brings their own reusable mug for coffee or tea.
- The Office of Sustainability worked with the Farmers Market organizer to phase out single-use plastic, such as bags, straws, cutlery, and plastic water bottles provided by vendors, making the Farmers Market zero waste.
- A Zero Waste Punch Card was also launched at the Farmers Market to assist and reward campus users for bringing reusable items, such as water bottles, bags, straws, and cutlery sets.
- In 2023, Campus Dining recovered and delivered 1,091.70 lbs of food to the food pantry.

Contamination

Although new bin infrastructure was implemented in 2022, similar contamination trends were found in all three waste streams in 2023. The items listed below were commonly found in various dumpster locations on campus, which do not belong to that specific waste stream:

Although signage is picture based and lists items not accepted in each waste stream, confusion on certain items continues to be an issue. Further diversion education is needed as well as prioritizing reduce and reuse measures to assist with contamination issues.

2023 Calendar Year Activities

To support the goals of the Zero Waste Action Plan, the Office of Sustainability implemented various programs to help CSUDH further adopt zero waste practices.

- In 2023, Pop-Up Thrift events were expanded from being held only at the beginning and end of each semester to taking place on the first Tuesday of every month during active school semesters to encourage reuse of donated items from campus.
- CleanCity Network sensors, which are placed on every hauler waste bin and detect fullness, are still in use and have assisted with right-sizing the campus. The enclosure located by the Library and Theater were right sized from 3x/week to a permanent 2x/week schedule based on this live sensor data.
- Housing updated their policy to mandate placement of internal recycle and organics containers in addition to trash to assist with diversion. Housing also implemented organics service at every other enclosure in Phases I and II to make composting more accessible.
- Since January 1, 2019, the CSU has mandated a CSU Single Use Plastics Policy which assures, to the maximum extent economically feasible, the purchase of single-use plastics including plastic straws, plastic water bottles, and plastic bags are eliminated. Purchase preference shall be given to reusable products, followed by locally compostable and/or recyclable products. Procurement, auxiliaries, and all relevant stakeholders continue to work with campus sustainability staff to assess and select the most sustainable alternatives.
- The Farmers Market Zero Waste Punch Card was launched as part of a userbehavior campaign to encourage bringing reusable items to campus. Anyone who completed the card was entered in an opportunity drawing for a reusable notebook

- called a Rocket Book. While engagement was low, plans to relaunch the program in 2024 are in place.
- Custodial and Grounds training are conducted semesterly to ensure proper waste separation and review updates to services.
- Zero waste educational activities were hosted at the Farmers Market every Tuesday during the academic semester in efforts to engage and educate the campus community on zero waste practices and campus initiatives.
